Happy Easter! As you read this, we shall be entering Holy week and getting ready to celebrate Easter. Our second social distanced Easter, but this year we celebrate that we can meet together in our buildings but for many this still will not be an option. For example, my family know we still don't feel ready to go back into our buildings (containing three under 7's in a pew with me at the front) is too challenging. Yet we celebrate in all the different ways that we can that Christ has risen.



Easter is a season of hope and joy. It is what our faith is built on. We are broken, sinful people who are forgiven on Good Friday and celebrate in the resurrection of Jesus who comes back with a promise and invitation to us all.

How do you receive that invitation? You are invited into a living relationship with our loving God. If ever our community needed to know that invitation it is now.

We celebrate the restrictions are slowly being lifted but need to acknowledge these next six months are going to be challenging. Many will lose jobs, business will close, relationships will struggle, pressures on our schools, pressure on our personal finances and here at the Church our finances are at such a critical moment, which if not turned around we will see the closure of so many churches across the UK because we just have not got the money, not because of Covid, but because we have struggled for the last 40 years. We need a season of generosity locally and nationwide. Giving is a biblical discipline as we explored last month. We could easily just be in tears and filled with fear as restrictions are lifted.

Yet what we have is hope, the hope of the good news of Jesus. We have a huge job on our hands these next six months, to be good news. Creating places to gather, to chat, to pray, to wrestle with some of big questions of life.

Where do we start? A praying church makes a difference. We could put on 120 different things a week but if we don't start in prayer it is pointless. Where the church has grown both in numbers and in finances it always starts in a place of prayer.

I encourage you personally, as friends at larger safer gatherings to begin in prayer. As a Parish we shall be running a new Prayer course by Pete Greig, both online and later in the year in person. A course that invites us to be people of prayer.

Prayer is what Jesus did before his death, it is what He went to do after His resurrection.

With the restrictions in place, we have a real gift to begin to meet. What better time to meet on that bench, soon in a building and gather with friends and pray together.

I challenge you to pray for each other, pray for our community, pray for our Parish.

I promise you when we commit to prayer, we will see transformation.

Next month we hope to be able to share where we see the Parish going in what and when different things will begin, which will be exciting and I can't wait for that moment when there will be no bookings, no thinking of deep cleaning and we can

come and sing our praises. However, as we wait for that moment I believe God is asking us to come in prayer.

Not only to pray, but to be listening to Him in what He might be asking of us.

Why? Because our community needs people of prayer and good news.

Guess what? We have good news!

We celebrate it on Easter day, we celebrate every day. We are invited to come and follow and go out and shout that we have GOOD NEWS!

Jesus is Alive, Jesus invites us.

What do you say to this invitation?

I pray for a blessed Easter and a season of prayer for you, your family and our community and Parish of West Wigan.

PGS Digital Service is now Live

Dear Parish Representative,

Good news – as from the 1st March it is now possible for new donors to set up their regular giving online to any PGS-Registered parish!

During the last few days, we have begun briefing member dioceses on the new service and telling them about the resources available to support them, and you as you introduce the service to your church community.

You will now find a range of 'guides' and resources to download when you log into your 'My PGS' area of the website. You will find the link at the top of your 'Parish Details' page.

Resources to Support you

This pack includes 'step-by-step' guides for parishes, so that you are best placed to help guide your donors, and FAQs. There are also materials which you can pass on to donors to use themselves, if needed. In addition, there are templates you can personalise to your parish, which outline the three ways to give via PGS: online, by phone, or by using the gift form.

Action to prepare for roll out

Every parish has a unique 'landing page' on the PGS website. Donors will begin their online giving journey on this page. They simply use the search tool on the website, or a QR code provided by the parish, to go to the page of their church and click on the 'donate' button.

It's obviously important that the information on this page is accurate, and that it delivers the

message

you'd like to give your potential donors as they prepare to make a gift. We recommend that all parishes check (and edit where necessary) their unique parish landing page before widely publicising the service to donors.

We've prepared a step-by-step guide of how to update your parish landing page, as part of the resource pack.

It's time to activate your account

At least three of four parish Statement Receivers have already activated their online account and are making good use of the facility to view their monthly statements securely online.

If you're among those who haven't activated your online account yet, now's the ideal time to do so. It will take a few minutes. Simply go to 'MY PGS' page <u>www.parishgiving.org.yk/my-pgs</u> and follow the onscreen instructions. Once activated, you will be able to view the resources for roll out, as well as your parish statements. As a reminder, for everyone's security, it's

important that you never share your PGS login details with others. If there are additional people that you would like to add as administrators, please contact us and we will set them up with a separate log-ins.

Cross and Resurrection

The Ancient Romans were famous for their roads. One of the most famous was the Appian Way, running from Rome to south-east Italy. If you had been on the Appian Way, near Rome, in 71 BC, you might have been confronted by a scene of appalling horror. The slave revolt led by Spartacus had been successful for a time, but now the slave army had been defeated and captured. The 6000 rebel slaves who survived the battle were crucified along the Appian Way. Mile after mile of human beings slowly tortured to death.

Crucifixion wasn't just a death penalty. It was deliberately painful, horrific and humiliating. It was the penalty reserved for the lowest in society who had ideas above their station. There was nothing that seemed heroic about it. It was utter degradation.

There is a lot of pain and suffering in the world. Walk along the streets in the middle of Wigan, and you will see many people who seem to have it all worked out. Most of them look confident and secure, getting on with their lives without much fuss. Don't believe it. Every person has his or her own joys and sorrows. Each has regrets and guilts and resentments. And more sinister evil lies just out of sight. People trafficking abuse; domestic violence; and exploitation of the vulnerable. And then there are the evils which are easier to ignore: the international injustices which keep the poor, poor and the oppressed, oppressed.

We believe that God loves his creation. Yet he does not deny that evil is evil. Combating the forces of evil is not something God has done by remote control. In the person of his Son, Jesus, God came into the world and suffered the worst that the world could do to him. In a mysterious way which we can never fully understand, he came and took the **6**

weight of the world on his own shoulders. His loving death defeated all the powers of hell.

Whatever life throws at us, we are not alone. Jesus has been there, and he is with us, not as Superman, effortlessly putting things right, but as one of us, as a real human being who knows the joys and sorrows of life first-hand. In all the trials of life, we know that God in Jesus is with us.

On the first Good Friday evening, Jesus seemed to be as beaten as Spartacus and his companions. All the hopes and dreams, all the preaching and healing, everything had come to nothing.

On Easter morning, God turned the tables. What seemed like defeat turned out to be victory. Love had triumphed over hate.

Do you believe that death and evil will win in the end? Or do you believe that, ultimately, love is stronger even than death?

Easter does not undo Good Friday. Jesus's death remains real, all that he went through remains real. But it is not the final chapter. On Good Friday, we remember that Jesus died for our sins. On Easter Sunday, we celebrate the triumph of God's love, of life over death.

There is a tradition that, at funerals, bells are rung half muffled. One side of each bell clapper is muffled with a pad, the other side is left free. So the bells sound alternate rounds, muffled, then loud. As Christians, we acknowledge the reality of death and of sin, we mourn with those who are bereaved and those who are hurt. But we insist that neither death nor sin will have the last word. Christ is risen indeed! Alleluia!

What is an Assistant Church Warden?

An assistant Church Warden is a role that has come about since the reforming of the Wigan Deanery Parish system. Under the previous system, each of the 30 churches had their own two wardens, now each of the newly formed seven parishes have two church wardens. We are delighted that we have Ann Birch and Martin Gaskell as our Church Wardens for the Wigan West Parish. As the parish has increased in size, the workload for two people would be almost impossible, hence the creation of the role of the assistant warden. The aim of the team of assistant wardens is to enable the smooth running of the three churches (there is no limit to the amount of assistant wardens).

The benefits we see with the workings of the new system are that we are working together as a parish team, not individual churches. A good example of this is the cooperation of all the assistant wardens during this pandemic. When churches have been closed or we have been limited to what buildings could be open or services diverted at the last minute everybody has rallied together and worked across the whole parish. The thought of being on our own in this pandemic is terrifying, it would have been truly overwhelming.



Cliff and I feel that it has been a huge privilege that we can work closer together doing God's work and sharing God's grace and enabling God's Kingdom to prosper, under the old system, husband and wife could not be Wardens together.

It is such a good feeling and spiritually encouraging to see new people coming forward and getting involved instead of having to rely on the same half a dozen or so volunteers. To us, this is an exciting time for Church Wigan and we hope that all parishes see the advantages and opportunities as we do. We have yet to attend an event or meeting when we do not see the benefits of working together.

In conclusion, this new way of working is benefitting a lot more than just Wardens and assistant Wardens. Take the magazine that you are reading, this is a culmination of three



editors coming together from three completely different ways of working to produce this excellent new format of a Parish magazine.

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Local Missional Leaders

The project, *Transforming Wigan*, has changed the structure of the Church of England in Wigan. We all know the background. A much smaller proportion of the population attends their local Church of England parish church than twenty, forty or sixty years ago. At one time, each rector or vicar ministered to a congregation numbering hundreds, and the traditional pattern of parish life continued to reflect that, long after congregations had shrunk. By the middle of the 20th century, many clergy were ministering to reduced congregations, but the momentum of tradition, and the buffer of money given by parishioners now long in the churchyard, meant that we could carry on as if nothing had changed.

That is now no longer an option. We could respond to the situation by managing decline. We could close down churches, combine congregations, and, for a while, enjoy life much as it was, but in fewer buildings.

In Wigan, we have decided on a different path. Rather than closing down worshipping communities, we are establishing new ones, and some of them are growing. But that means that we have many more worshipping communities than we have paid clergy. If we expected a vicar to run 10 worshipping communities as if each were the only one, then we would planning for failing congregations and broken-down vicars. But it is important that each worship community has a person who is the designated leader. That person is not a lay vicar. She or he does not necessarily have gifts in preaching or leading worship, or in pastoral care, though some may have. The local missional leader (LML) is charged rather with enabling and encouraging the gifts of all the members of the congregation, and in identifying and supporting new leaders in their turn.

I am LML for the congregation of St James' with St Thomas'. The role of LML for an established congregation is in practice rather different from that of LML of a new worship community. My focus has been to begin refreshing the worship of our community and to encourage links with other associated worshipping communities, especially those led by Alison Brown: Tom's Pantry, Jim's Kitchen and Lifelines.

We in Wigan West are committed to be an outward-looking parish, engaging with those who have never been introduced to the gospel of Jesus Christ. We have rejected the option of managed decline, in favour of joining deliberately in God's mission in His world. LMLs are called to play their own distinctive part in enabling that mission.


Water is Life


