





Gardening Tips for September

September is the time to be thinking about planting bulbs for the Spring garden.

Always buy good quality bulbs and suitable compost.

Daffodils always come to mind when considering which bulbs to choose. There are many different kinds available these days. For window boxes and small containers, Tete a Tete always look good.

Daffodils should be planted at one and a half times their own depth in Autumn in sun or partial shade in moist fertile well drained soil.

It is good idea to plant daffodils in containers which can be placed in window boxes so that after



flowering they can be taken out and replaced with other containers with bedding plants etc. This ensures that window boxes are always full of

seasonal plants.

A good tip is to feed daffodils when they are flowering to ensure that the bulbs will be in tip top condition for the following year.

All kind of bulbs give good value if planted in containers that can be moved around to fill gaps in the garden.

Some of the annuals will have died off and now need to be taken up, and general tidying around, cutting off dead foliage so as to keep pests and diseases to a minimum will keep your garden looking good. Adam
