



A CHURCH WARDEN'S NOTES

It's the 21st October, and another anniversary has passed in my life. Yesterday happened to be the 59th anniversary of my joining the Army, courtesy of the National Service Act of 1948, which said that I should serve my country for a period of eighteen months. As it happened, I actually did so for over 23 years, but that's another story!

I was thinking about that just now when, as I was putting the car into the garage, a gentleman asked if I could show him how to get to Parrock Street. It turned out that he had been an orphan in the Milton Mount orphanage which occupied the side of Windmill Hill overlooking Echo Square. The orphanage was run by the Roman Catholic Southwark Rescue Society. He began reminiscing about his days there: the walks they used to take, the boys' games they used to play over at the quarry in Northfleet, the days out to Allhallows-on-Sea ("Allhallows-on Mud' we used to call it"). He recalled the farms where now there are houses; and walking down past the old Christ Church, through the little lane to the Promenade. He had a very uncomplimentary name for it, although its official name was (and is) Love Lane.

He described the orphanage grounds: the playing field at the top and the group of buildings lower down, grouped around a round flower-bed; the exact location of the nuns' accommodation. All now gone, replaced by Glen View (I have often wondered what sort of glen it was: the house at the top obviously had some sort of glen-like view!), but in his mind it was still there.

And all our minds are like that, aren't they? We have vivid recollections of places we left long ago; and yet when we get there - and at the best - they are always smaller or less imposing than we remember; or like him, they are entirely swept away. I suppose "... 'tis little joy/ To know I'm farther off from heaven/Than when I was boy"

Nancy has also brought back the picture of a basket of fruit from our last service, now beautifully coloured in. She writes her name on it and I carefully pin it up at the back of the church.

Some of the older children are now arriving with their mums and soon we have a lovely crowd. There are some of our well-known and much loved regulars as well as some new additions to our flock. Ella has come along for the first time, with little brother William and their Mum and Gretel has come all the way from Swanscombe with her two little boys, Chidi and Tobe. Our naughty little sheep is really pleased to see everyone. He is being very good standing on our little altar and trying hard not to jiggle about with excitement. He's also keeping a close eye on Tobe's furry rabbit to make sure he behaves himself too.



When everyone is settled with jingle bells we begin our service. Marian is very kindly playing the piano for us today. I light our candles as we sing the first verse of "Candle Time" and I light a special candle for Daniel because it is going to be his first birthday tomorrow. Of course we sing "Happy Birthday" to him, wishing him a lovely day. Then we think about "Homes and Families" singing "Thank you God for the people we Love". And when we sing, "I love eating", we think about the lovely things that we do with our families

like eating together, having fun together and caring for each other. We thank God for all of the wonderful things that he gives us each day.

When our service is over and Daniel's Nanny has helped him to blow out his candle, we all go through into the hall for a drink and a biscuit and some time to chat and play. Our naughty little sheep is standing quietly on the serving hatch. He whispers to me that he is rather hoping that someone will play with him or take him for a little walk, but the children are having such a good time playing with the toys and with each other that no one notices him standing there looking hopeful. Poor little chap!

Very soon it is time to go; the afternoon has flown by. The children are taking home a picture of a house, for them to colour in. We hope that it will remind them of the happy time we have spent together, thinking about our homes and families and Gods love for us all. I hope that we'll all be back again on the 12th November for our next First Steps service when we'll be hearing the story of Noah's Ark. I know that our naughty little sheep will be very interested in that and he tells me that he's hoping that Tobe will bring his rabbit to join us. So we'll look forward to seeing you there.

He dug up (literally) a huge stone which appears to be a memorial.

All of the borders round the back of the church have now been dug over and barrow loads of bricks and rubble have been removed. One of the interesting finds in the border was a large 1st World War Memorial tablet. Unfortunately weathering has made the writing illegible but we are hoping that somewhere in the archives we can find a copy of what the inscription and names on the tablet were. If anyone would like to look at it or can throw any light on it then please go round the back of the church to the border by the Garden of Remembrance.

The borders round the back contain poor quality soil and facing N.W. are constantly in the shade. Our aim is to fill them with spreading perennials whilst the shrubs mature and eventually fill the space. We hope to have a variety of colour (useful for our flower arrangers) as well as seasonal interest.

For the gardeners among you the following have so far been planted:-

Shrubs: Viburnum trees –
'Eve Price' and 'Purpwen'.
Aucuba Japonica (Laurel)
Photrea – 'Red Robin'
Vinca minor (Periwinkle)

Perennials: Chinese lanterns,
Japanese Anemones
and Perennial Clematis.



Other shrubs etc. will be planted in due course both in the back and in the side border. Opposite the hall, the digging of which is nearly completed.

Finally John would like to thank all those of you who use him as a volunteer driver as your contributions go towards the renovation of the church gardens.

Gardening Tips for November

Autumn's here, Winter is just around the corner the time when all gardeners must exhibit fortitude and undauntable character ! In spite of adverse weather, leaves and debris must be cleared especially from lawns and beds. Pots and other containers must be raised an inch or so to allow their drainage holes to work efficiently. Plants are not usually killed by cold but by their compost becoming waterlogged and drowning them.



This month is an ideal time to plant up or repot to larger containers. Drainage consideration must be paramount, plenty of crock or irregular shaped pieces of Polystyrene in the bottom, then a loam based, free draining John Innes No 2 compost for the plants to grow in . Don't forget, if lime hating shrubs are to be planted i.e. Rhododendron, Azaleas, Ericas , then an Ericaceous – lime free- compost must be used.
