



1st Windmill Scout Group



The 1st Windmill Scout Group is continuing to provide top quality Scouting from it's start in 1928 as 21st Gravesend (St Faith's) Boy Scout Group meeting in St Faith's Hall until it was demolished. Parents and friends (including Margot Edwards) supported the group by acquiring a piece of unused water board land in Sandy Bank Road – now known as 'The Waterhole'. The Waterhole has been the base for the Scout Group (and 3rd Milton Guide Company) since 1969. With the new headquarters came a new name 'Christ Church Scout Group'.

John and Julie Hill have had a long association with the scout group, Julie was Akela (Cub leader) and John was Skip (Scout leader). John and Julie's son Martin has been Akela and the family connection is still there with daughter Kathryn as Guide leader.

In the 1980's and 90's Scout groups everywhere were struggling to meet the needs of the young people, Christ Church Scout Group closed its second Cub Pack and the 33rd Gravesend Scout Group was having difficulty finding somewhere to hold its meetings. In 2001 Christ Church Scout Group and 33rd Gravesend Scout Group joined forces and 1st Windmill Hill Scout Group emerged stronger.

1st Windmill Scout Group comprises:

'Beaver Colony' for young people aged 6 to 8 years. The colony meets on a Thursday night with an energetic young man, Matthew Johnson, acting as Beaver leader.

'Cub Pack' for young people aged 8 to 10½ years. The pack meets on a Monday night with Akela Vi Rushbrook at the helm.

'Scout Troop' for young people aged 10½ to 14 years. The troop meets on a Friday night with 'Skip', Richard Painting, leading them in many different outdoor activities, including camping and overnight expeditions.

'Sputnik Explorer Scout Unit' for young people aged 14 to 18 years have their base at The Waterhole and meet on a Monday evening.

The Scout Group is led by Group Scout Leader Paul Rushbrook with the Group Executive, comprised of parents and friends of scouting, providing support. Christ Church as sponsor of 1st Windmill Hill Scout Group continues to support the group.

All sections of the scout group are thriving, but need adult support. I have written this as an overview of the scout group. If anyone would like to get involved then speak to me or Sue Brewer.

What are Beavers Scouts?



Beaver Scouts are young people usually aged between six and eight years old. They belong to the first and youngest Section in the Scouting family. Young people can join Beaver Scouts in the three months leading up to their sixth birthday. They can move to the next Section, Cub Scouts, between seven years and six months and eight years six months.

Easily recognised by their distinctive turquoise sweatshirts, Beaver Scouts enjoy making friends, playing games, going on visits and helping others. They usually meet together once a week in a Beaver Scout Colony. Some Beaver Scout Colonies also organise Sleepovers. These are often the first time a young person spends a night away from home. They take place in suitable buildings, often Scout centres.

Explorer Scout Unit



If you're 14 to 18 and want to enjoy Scouting you can do so by joining Explorer Scouting. As an Explorer Scout you get to take part in all the usual great Scouting activities such as kayaking, climbing, orienteering... as well as work on projects helping to support your local community. You can also, if you choose, get more closely involved in working with the younger Sections as a Young Leader.

What is Cub Scouting?



There are loads of fun things that you can do as a Cub Scout. You will get a chance to try lots of different activities like swimming, music, exploring, computing and collecting. If you do them properly you will get a badge which you can wear on your uniform.

Cub Scouts also get to go on trips and days out, to places like the zoo, theme parks or a farm. Sometimes you will be able to go camping with the rest of your Pack. This will mean you sleeping in a tent and doing loads of outdoor activities.



Scout Troop

Scouts is the third section in Scouting, and is for boys and girls aged 10½ to 14. Scouts take part in a wide range of activities from archery to expeditions as part of their programme. There are many awards that Scouts can work towards, completing Challenges to get the Chief Scout's Gold Award. However, taking part and having fun is just as important as what you achieve as a Scout.

The balanced programme of activities encourages Scouts to find out about the world in which they live, know their own abilities and the importance of keeping fit and develop their creative talents. There are also opportunities to explore their beliefs and attitudes.

Being outdoors is really important and Scouts love to learn new skills, such as camping, survival and cooking as well as the wide range of adventurous activities, anything from abseiling to yachting. Scouting is about being with friends, as part of a team, participating fully in the adventure and opportunities of life.

It was good to see a good sized congregation enjoying their worship and singing the hymns heartily. GARDENING TIPS FOR NOVEMBER

Last month's weather was very kind to the gardener and has possibly allowed you to clean up the garden and containerised plants. Complete this operation this month.

It is usual for November to have some good weather and reasonable temperatures but the clocks have gone back, the days are getting shorter and colder, wind and rain must be expected.

Complete winter planting of bulbs and annual plants in your flowerbeds and containers as soon as possible. Frozen roots in containers can kill the hardiest shrubs. Move them if possible to a sheltered area of the garden or wrap them in Bubble Wrap. Make sure that they cannot become waterlogged, clear all drainage holes and raise them an inch off the ground.

If you grow bush roses it is very important to reduce wind-rock. Do this by cutting each plant's summer growth by a third and in particularly vigorous types by a half. This is not pruning. Pruning will be done next spring to shape the bushes and encourage flowering wood.


Laptop

Church Grounds

Update

It has now been a year since we started planting the gardens and despite, or because of, the weather the plants have settled in well, but we still have lots to finish!!



Spring bulbs, which hopefully will give lots of colour, have been planted and by the time you read this, new bedding plants will be cheering up the front of the church.

The long border by the side of the hall is yet to be finished. The sunflowers will remain to feed the birds in the winter. We hope to continue planting either end with perennials and shrubs continuing to choose plants with the theme of colour and scent. Whilst the corner section is mainly pinks and red, the far end by the gate will be planted with yellows and oranges.

The round bed still looks bright and cheerful with the geraniums – at least until the first frosts appear!! We will then put in more plants for colour, scent and touch.

All the plants in the Pleasance have flourished and next year will fill out the area even more.

In the Pleasance we have also managed to complete one of our major projects. A new boundary fence has been erected behind the tree line. Some of the trees have been taken out whilst others have been shortened and trimmed and the area in front of the trees has been smartened up with the use of railway sleepers and bark. The construction of a sandpit and a digging area has also been included for the use of the pre-school children and others who use the Pleasance. The cost of the project has been met by those of you who use John's services whether it be gardening, decorating or driving you to the airport, hospital or somewhere else. Please continue to use his services as we have another project in mind for next year.

Finally we on the gardening committee would like to thank all of you for your encouraging comments on our first year's work.
