My goodness me, don't the weeks fly by? It seems hardly any time at all since our last First Steps service and it's that time again! The spring has truly burst into leaf and flower all around us now but the weather is still a bit iffy with a very chilly wind. It's hard to believe that it's May! Once again our naughty little sheep has invited some of his friends to join us for our service and they're planning to play a trick on the children, which is a bit cheeky! As soon as we arrive in the church they take themselves off to hide, so that the children won't be able to find them. We shall see!

Anne and Isabelle help me to get everything ready and we discover that Rachel, with Mollie and Olivia and Vicki with Grace and Elsie are picnicking in the Pleasance as they wait for our service to begin. That's rather brave! But it seems that it's warm when the sun comes out so perhaps summer is on its way, after all! Then other Mums and children begin to arrive and very soon we have a lovely, smiley crowd, with jingle bells at the ready. And those sneaky animals are keeping very quiet in their hiding places.

As our service begins we light our candles and sing "Candletime". "God is here with us, God is in the light." Today we are thinking about Jesus, the Good Shepherd who cares for us, his flock, and knows us all by name. The children each tell us their name and we know that each is precious to Jesus. And he goes to great lengths to find any of his flock when they go astray. Then I remember that our naughty little sheep and his friends are still missing and just like the Good Shepherd, the children rush off to see if they can find them. It isn't easy because they're keeping really quiet but the children

soon discover their hiding places and they are quickly brought back to the fold again, so to speak! We sing "Baa, baa black sheep" and the children sing it so nicely that we have to sing it again. And we say "Thank you" to God for sheep, which pleases our naughty little sheep very much!

Aren't we lucky? Our naughty little sheep and his friends are resting in church for the moment but I think they'll be sneaking into the hall in a little while to see if they can have some cake, too! CCADS

Spring Production:

"Two of a Kind"



CCADS production this year brought together a strong team of actors, who made this play come alive. It is a well-written play, with a good deal of humour and some poignant moments.

The curtains opened on a multiple set: one half being a two-bed residents' room, the other being the Matron's office. This arrangement allowed of a great deal of downstage movement and was very effective, although a few odd moves (used to show a doorway, no doubt) seemed superfluous. Later in the play a third, and most effective, part of stage becomes the home's garden/ Lighting was used very effectively - not always easy on such a small stage - to show which part of the set we were in. Apart from the necessary furniture, a wonderful prop proved to be the wardrobe with its "hidden" doors. Music used during the play was spot on with the supposed date (One of my old-time favourites being "Red Sails in the Sunset" included as well).

The play opened with George, a new "inmate", arriving at the nursing home, and being introduced to his surroundings by Matron, who showed immediately that his new home would be one run entirely on the rules. Matron came across as a tough, no-nonsense woman, entirely shown as such by Christine Kearsney. George (Allister Kaye) is an ex-Army officer, proper and trim. His costume was perfect for the part, unruffled suit and all. But what happens next does not please him one bit - for suddenly his room-mate appears. "Wally" Wallis (played by David Horton) is as unlike George as it is possible to be. He is an ex-sailor, and shows that he is quite unsuited to be living in these surroundings being brash and outspoken. Within a very short while he has broken most of the house rules - smoking, drinking (with booze concealed in the magic wardrobe). He has spreads his things around the room, prompting an hilarious episode when George attempts to partition the room with tape across the floor. We now meet the fourth member of the cast: May (Lynne Chesterton). She is a slightly flirtatious older woman, with a soft heart for Wally, and little time for the officiousness of Matron. In a very well played part she brings light relief to all other cast members.

By far the most ambitious, and also successful, part of the play was when Wally, breaking rules again, decided to cook a steak in his room, much to the horror of George. A very difficult thing to come off, but it certainly did: the sizzle in the pan brought gasps of astonishment from the audience.

We now begin to learn something of the other sides of Wally - for he has lost his only friend at the home - Potts - who has just passed away; and the dramatic tension begins: for George realises he is a poor substitute for Wally's lost friend and in a very believable way he tries to come to terms with that position. Wally, in a very strong performance, gives us many changes of character: from the annoyingly over-the-top man at the surface; but in one scene, set in

he garden, he pays tribute to his old friend and we begin to understand his hidden grief. In the second garden scene between him and May, when she gives him a family heirloom we are once more shown a poignant side to both their natures.

The ending, which sees Wally deciding to leave and seek life on the sea again, was played very well indeed, although we might well have thought that he wouldn't be too successful about it at his age. It was certainly a very well chosen play and CCADS should mark it down as one of their most enjoyable and well acted plays.

A D-Day veteran who has been giving advice to residents for nearly 30 years has been given a royal thank you.

Stan Bond, 86, met Anne the Princess Royal on Tuesday as one of just 100 national Citizen Advice Bureaux long standing volunteers chosen to celebrate the organisations 70th birthday.

He was joined by his Gravesend CAB colleague Terry Wood at St James Palace after being chosen from the organisation's 21,000 national volunteers.

A retired accountant, Mr Bond has been long-time chairman of the branch and has clocked up 26 years helping out there.

The father of three, who has three grandchildren, lives with his wife Muriel, in Artillery Row, Gravesend. Friend Peter Read said:"He is a really super, lovely man and so proud of this. He has time for everyone and has done a lot of voluntary work."

Mr Bond was involved in D-Day plus One with the Royal Engineers and Mr Read took him to the commemorations in 2008.

NEWS FROM GRAVESEND STREET PASTORS

JUNE/JULY 2010

Exciting developments are taking place this summer at Gravesend Street Pastors on a number of fronts.

We were very fortunate to have Revd Les Isaac, Director of Ascension Trust and Co-founder of Street Pastors preach on Sunday 9th May at a special Churches Together service when our new recruitment campaign was launched. The story of the project to date was told, together with some amazing statistics. In the first 6 months, Street Pastors have made over 365 significant contacts with the public, distributed 35 pairs flip flops, given out tissues, bottled water, spikeys, first aid equipment, space blankets and travel and other information, in addition to their key role of being able to listen and offer love, care and support to the many vulnerable people they encounter. We have attended 7 incidents involving calming aggressive behaviour and 14 issues of supporting the vulnerable. One knife has been surrendered. We have also recovered 159 glass bottles and 137 cans from the streets to prevent use as weapons and to keep our town green. In total, over 1500 volunteer hours have been donated by all involved in the project and over 70 prayer requests received and acted on. A letter of thanks was read out from the new Deputy Area Commander for North Kent Police in support of the valuable work being undertaken by Street Pastors, which is attached. Our Street Pastors were asked if they had any regrets about the work they were doing and if they would still volunteer again; there was a 100% agreement that they loved the work they were doing and found huge fulfilment from it.

AND SO WE ARE EXPANDING! Following this success we will be running a further training course from September, to recruit more Street Pastors, mostly to be able to have teams on the streets on Saturday nights too and we are very keen to encourage you to prayerfully consider whether this might be something you could volunteer to help with. To do this you need to have the support of your church, to go through a full recruitment process, including CRB check, to undergo 50 hours of training and be willing to work from about 10.30pm - 3.00am on a rota basis every 4-5 weeks. A full job information sheet can be obtained from phoning the number below. We are also seeking to set up Prayer Pastors for Saturday nights, on rota basis, praying from the Methodist Church base for the safety of our streets and Street Pastors. Prayer times are sociable occasions too, as we cook food for the Street Pastors (and prayer pastors!) to consume in the break and it's a chance to get to know others from different churches. Please offer your help with this if going out on the streets is not for you.

Other good news includes that we have achieved funding from Grassroots Grants to be able to employ the co-ordinator for one day per week with further funding being sought. We hope shortly to become a registered charity, which will then enable us to take Gift Aided donations and run a 100 Friends of Gravesend Street Pastors and also be able to produce collection boxes for small change, which we hope will encourage many of you to support us in some way financially, on small or larger scale.

We are planning to visit churches to give a talk about the work of the Street Pastors, with some first hand experiences to relate. If you are keen for us to visit you, please let us know and we will be organise this with you.

We hope to be out on the streets on some of the Fridays and Saturdays when the World Cup is being screened and would ask that you will pray for us and for the safety of people in the town centre on those nights, when either euphoria or disappointment can adversely affect people's behaviour. We also hope to be able to have a stand at the Big Day Out on Saturday 24^{th} July at Gravesend Promenade, so please come and find us.
