





Amongst many highlights, the Report stresses the enthusiasm and happiness of the children, together with their excellent progress towards the Early Learning Goals. The Report is extremely complimentary about the leadership and management of the pre-school, praising the excellent attitude towards safety of the children, the high expectations of staff and children, and the extensive plans for further improvements.

On one of the many activities the Report praises, it notes: "The children worked exceptionally well together to achieve their aim and their attempts were photographed and made into a wonderful display. This activity not only tested their problem solving and reasoning skills but also helped them to communicate effectively with each other, tested their creative abilities and allowed them to engage in physical play. I am currently an Ordinand training for ministry at Ripon College, Cuddesdon situated just outside Oxford. My sponsoring church is The Priory based on the site of a former Benedictine monastery next to Lancaster Castle within the Diocese of Blackburn. I have lived and worked in Lancaster during the last twenty years after studying at Lancaster University. Over the years I have undertaken a range of jobs including - student nursing; economic



development information work; and horticulture. All of these have focused on community partnerships. I have been employed by a variety of faith organisations to set up, or develop, Church/community projects for socially isolated older people; the homeless; the disadvantaged and marginalised; and children in socially deprived urban areas of Lancaster. This included, for example, setting up inter-generational community gardens and environmental projects. I was also involved in developing an ecumenical and secular partnership organisation called F.I.S.H. - Faith groups In Support of Homeless - as Co-ordinator. My last post as Church Community Worker was based in an Anglican rural benefice on the edge of Cumbria (where I now live) comprising three parish churches, that were linked with Bloemfontein, South Africa. This involved work with all age groups which included a 'Footprints' community history group; a 'Breaking Bread' lunch for people (with help from local school children) and 'Messy Church' art events. Finally, I am so delighted that I have been offered the privilege of training as a Curate at Christ Church and look forward to meeting everyone later in the year.



Dear Mrs Read,

It's really fantastic the way everyone rallies around and supports our Shoebox Appeal each year. I cannot find adequate words to express our sincere and heartfelt gratitude to each and every one of you. We are so encouraged by your enthusiasm and commitment and you have been so generous with your time, your finances and your talents.

From our base here in Kent we sent out 16,660 shoeboxes and this year the final count revealed that as a whole, Blythswood Care was able to pass on a total of 118,256 gift boxes. This is a tremendous accomplishment which could not have been achieved without your contribution, whichever form that may have taken.

Early in November there was an earthquake in the Kraljevo area of Serbia, and the outreach work of several of our partners there has been badly affected. This is but one example of many communities in which the Good News of Jesus Christ was shared and gift boxes given out over the Christmas period.

Four page booklet to pull out and keep!




My goodness, thinking about my time with our own beloved Dramatic Society has taken me back over long years. It's been rather scary realizing just how many years but it has also brought back many very happy memories. I first joined the Society at the end of 1968 just after I had left Meopham with my parents, my two sisters and my brother and moved into Pine Avenue. I had belonged to the Meopham

Players for a short while and discovered a love of acting and I wanted to continue treading

the boards. Sadly, after a few months it became clear that the hours I was working in the Gravesend Library made it difficult and so I left. The years rolled by and at the beginning of 1975, by which time I was married with a young family, with the co-operation of an understanding husband, I rejoined. And what a wonderful time I had. So much fun, choosing plays and learning lines alongside many people whose company I came to enjoy and whose friendship I came to value.

To aid my failing memory Allister Kay has very kindly given me





plays over the years. Comedies or dramas, we could turn our hands to most things. And I was lucky enough to play a part in some of them. Oh what fun we had. And as I looked through those programmes many familiar names came flooding back "The Importance of Being Earnest" "Hobson's Choice", When We Are Married", "The Browning Version" and "An Inspector Calls" to name but a few.



Of course things didn't always go according to plan. On one occasion I was acting alongside a young chap called Chris Piper. (I wonder what happened to him.) There were just the two of us in two vignettes playing firstly a couple of newly weds and then a couple long married. All went well on the first night, a Friday if my memory serves me correctly. On Saturday Chris made the mistake of going off to play football, a dangerous game, and managed to break his arm, poor chap, though that wasn't exactly

what I said at the time. For our Saturday night performance John Bunyan took Chris's part, complete with playbook in hand. It sort of spoiled the effect, if you know what I mean!

In "Hobson's Choice" I played alongside my sister, Celia. We had been cast as Hobson's two younger daughters and we had a quick costume change between scenes. Sadly it wasn't quite quick enough, much to the amusement of the audience. It's silly things like that stick in the mind. The revue in the Reporter was memorable for all the wrong reasons, beginning "Christ Church Amateur Dramatic Society provided an evening of marvellous entertainment at the church hall last night, although many of the laughs came in the wrong places." Oops! It was a first night and I think that things improved considerably for the



next two nights. I hope that the entertainment was still marvellous!



For 11 years I was secretary to the Society, taking over from Mollie Gorringe, working alongside John Bunyan who was Chairman during those years. I so enjoyed being part of it all but once again real life intervened and because of family commitments I had to take a back seat. I returned in 1994 to tread the boards one last time, playing the deputy governor in "The Enquiry" by Charlotte Hastings, set in a women's Open Prison. All gritty stuff! And so my acting days came to an end. Some of those whom I have acted alongside are still part of the Society; others are now acting on that great stage in the sky. It has been a delight and a privilege to be part of it all and I hope that others will continue to discover all the enjoyment that can be found as a member of the wonderful, the amazing Christ Church Amateur **Dramatic Society!**








NEWS FROM GRAVESEND STREET PASTORS FEBRUARY 2011

How do you get 132 into 24? Sounds like a trick

question? Well, not quite! 132 people packed themselves into the rear of Bar 24 (the old Railway Tavern) in Stone St on 12th February for the Commissioning of a further 16 Street Pastors. It was quite awesome: in dimly-lit bar/night club surroundings, the disco plinth was transformed with Street Pastor banners and logos and despite importing nearly 100 chairs, there was standing room only! Proceedings were late starting due to the continuous queue at the door!

When the singing started, it could have been heaven! We raised the rafters in praise, with "Great is thy faithfulness" and later Stuart Townend's "The Lord's my shepherd" and "Guide me, O thou great Redeemer". Coincidentally it was a service dominated by 4 Michael's! Led by Revd Michael Fanstone, we welcomed a few words from Inspector Mike Coltham, Kent Police, who heads up the Community Safety unit in Gravesham, but is also a worship leader at St Luke's church, Maidstone and from the Deputy Mayor, Councillor Mick Wenban and Councillor Mike Snelling, leader of the Council, who both attend local churches. Their messages were ones of warmth and encouragement and that the presence of Street Pastors had led to a calming of behaviour on the streets, as well as giving practical and other support to members of the public.

Following The Message version of The Prodigal Son, we listened to Revd Ray Bell, Co-ordinator of Orpington Street Pastors and Ascension Trust representative talking about being salt and light in our community, which was tinged with humour at times too. He said that he believed that Street Pastor engagement with local people was the kind of way of working that Jesus envisioned in his ministry on earth. We learnt that there are now over 7,000 Street Pastors nationwide, all trained since 2003. In less than 8 years, this is truly a force to be reckoned with!

We were delighted to be able to present our volunteer Prayer Administrator, Helen Martin with vouchers in thanks for all her hard work, commitment and dedication to organising the prayer teams and sending out weekly and monthly prayer bulletins to all involved in this valuable ministry.

The finale came when 14 new Street Pastors, Michael Fanstone and I received our caps, to the cheering and whooping delight of those who had come to support us a spine-tingling moment. God's presence was very tangible to us all throughout the service and this was a terrific witness to the love and support of the churches of Gravesham to a new and developing ministry.

Following the service, no less than 29 uniformed and capped Street Pastors hit the town centre's streets en masse, accompanied by Ray Bell, much to the bemusement of the punters and door-staff and hooted and waved at by passing motorists, again quite an amazingly powerful spectacle and witness.

We praise and give thanks to God for the wonderful things He is helping and encouraging us to do in our local community and pray that the churches will continue to engage with this and feel part of this project to help others. 11 churches now have at least one Street Pastor and 25 churches are actively involved in some form of support. If you feel challenged to be involved in some way, particularly the prayer ministry, please contact me you will be assured of a warm response.

With our new charity status, we are have just launched our small change collection boxes, which are numbered and tallied against people's address, telephone and church data. If you would like one, please let us know and we will arrange for its delivery. We are also now able to seek Gift Aid on any donations, if you are a tax-payer.

Parish Magazine Production

Gathering material

Material for the magazine comes from many different areas - individual contributors - reports from organisations within the church family - articles about events within the community - history articles - many adverts for events and activities within the community.



DTP - Desk Top Publishing

Currently Serif PagePlus4 is used to produce the magazine. The pages are produced as single A4 sheets - these are fed through the photocopier which is designed to produced a A5 booklet. The single pages are collated into a full magazine prior to being converted into a PDF publication for inclusion on the church website.



A fantastic photocopier housed in the choir vestry (a room where the choir prepare themselves for services), takes about 2 hours to produce the current print run of 300 copies. The A5 magazine is collated, stapled and folded by hand. Artwork & Writing

In March we celebrate the lives of two Patron Saints.

A **patron saint** is a saint who is regarded as the intercessor and advocate in heaven of a nation, place, craft, activity, class, clan, family, or person. Patron saints, because they have already transcended to the metaphysical, are believed to be able to intercede effectively for the needs of their special charges.

1st March

Saint David (c. 500-589) (Welsh: Dewi Sant) was a church official; he was later regarded as a saint and as the patron saint of Wales. David was a native of Wales, and a relatively large amount of information is known about his life. However, his birth date is still uncertain, as suggestions range from 462 to 512.

David's popularity in Wales is shown by the Armes Prydein Vawr c.930, a popular prophetic poem in which the poet prophesied that in the future, when all might seem lost, the Cymry (the Welsh people) would unite to follow David as their leader: A lluman glân Dewi a ddyrchafant (And they will raise the pure banner of Dewi) and defeat the English. David's life and teachings have inspired a choral work by Welsh composer Karl Jenkins, Dewi Sant. It is a seven-movement work that is best known for the classical crossover series Adiemus, which intersperses movements reflecting the themes of David's last sermon with those drawing from three Psalms. An oratorio by another Welsh composer Arwel Hughes, also entitled Dewi Sant, was composed in 1950.

17th March

Saint Patrick

Little is known of Patrick's early life, though it is known that he was born in Roman Britain in the 4th century, into a wealthy Romano-British family. His father and grandfather were deacons in the Church. At the age of sixteen, he was kidnapped by Irish raiders and taken captive to Ireland as a slave. It is believed he was held somewhere on the west coast of Ireland, possibly Mayo, but the exact location is unknown. According to his Confession, he was told by God in a dream to flee from captivity to the coast, where he would board a ship and return to Britain. Upon returning, he quickly joined the Church in Auxerre in Gaul and studied to be a priest. In 432, he again said that he was called back to Ireland, though as a bishop, to Christianise the Irish from their native polytheism. Irish folklore tells that one of his teaching methods included using

the shamrock to explain the Christian doctrine of the Trinity to the Irish people. After nearly thirty years of evangelism, he died on 17 March 461, and according to tra-



dition, was buried at Downpatrick. Although there were other more successful missions to Ireland from Rome, Patrick endured as the principal champion of Irish Christianity and is held in esteem in the Irish Church.
