People at Christ Church - A PERSONAL PROFILE

Colin Parsonson

I was born in September 1949 the second of my parents three children; I have an older sister and a younger brother. The first sixteen years of my life were spent in, Whitehill Lane where I enjoyed an extremely happy childhood. School days were spent firstly at Whitehill school, infant and junior, in Sun Lane. My secondary education took place at Southfields school, no longer in existence, in, Singlewell Road.

At the age of about seven or eight I began attending Sunday school at St Faith's chapel in Central Avenue and although memories of this are vague, I do recall that this was run by Mrs Gates. My first direct contact with Christ Church came at the age of ten when I joined the church choir under the leadership of Arthur Lansley and stayed for two years

In 1966 the family moved to, Parrock Road and in late August of that year I started my first job with APCM, latterly Blue Circle, at Whites works, Swanscombe. In 1970 I joined the Whitehill Players, an amateur drama group, and it was here that I met my future wife, Linda. We were married in 1973 at St George's church, Gravesend, where we were later to spend nearly thirty years as members of the church family. During this period we were blessed with three children, Daniel, Ian and Hannah.

In 2006 we moved from St George's and found ourselves at Christ Church, something of a homecoming for me, and decided that we would bide our time before becoming involved in any specific aspect of church life however, God had other plans and that idea went right out of the window.

In 2008 I took early retirement from the Metropolitan Police Service, where I had spent twenty two years as a civilian employee, with the intention of taking some time out. However, God had other ideas and in September 2009 I began two years of study which led to me being authorised as a Pastoral Assistant on 8th October 2011, in Rochester Cathedral.

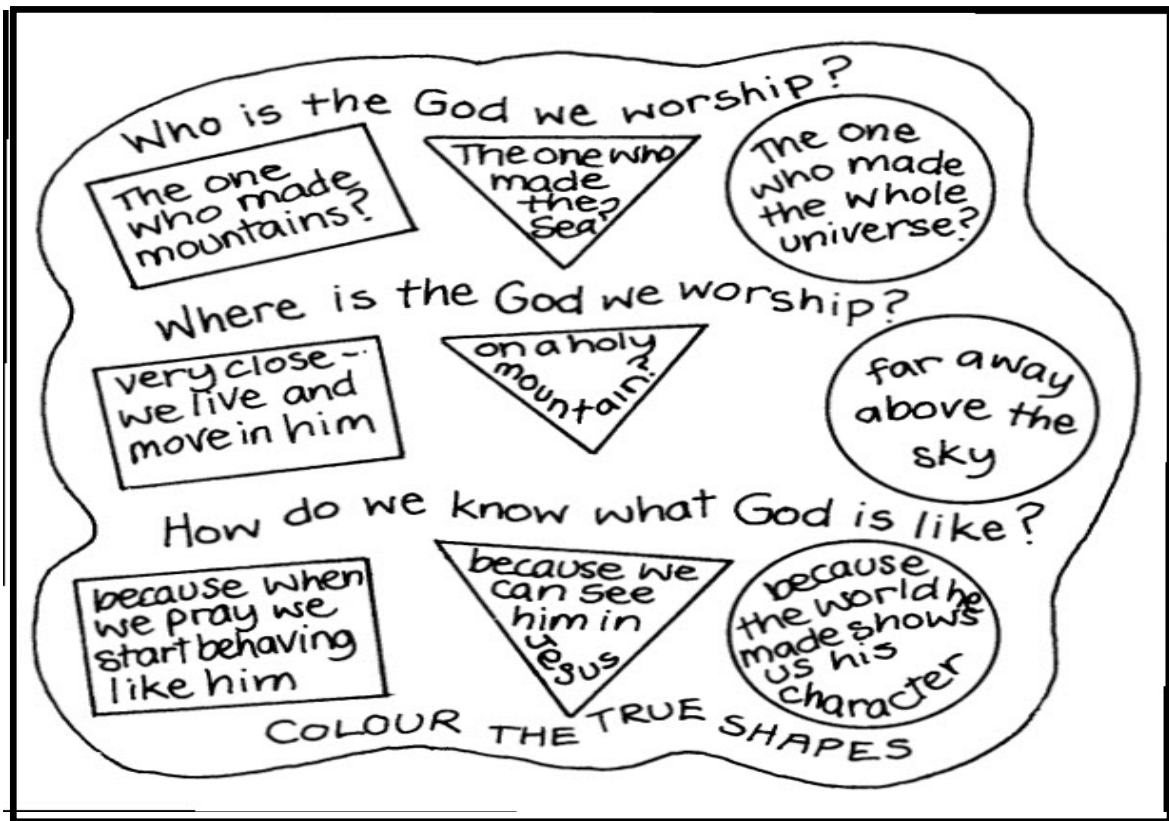

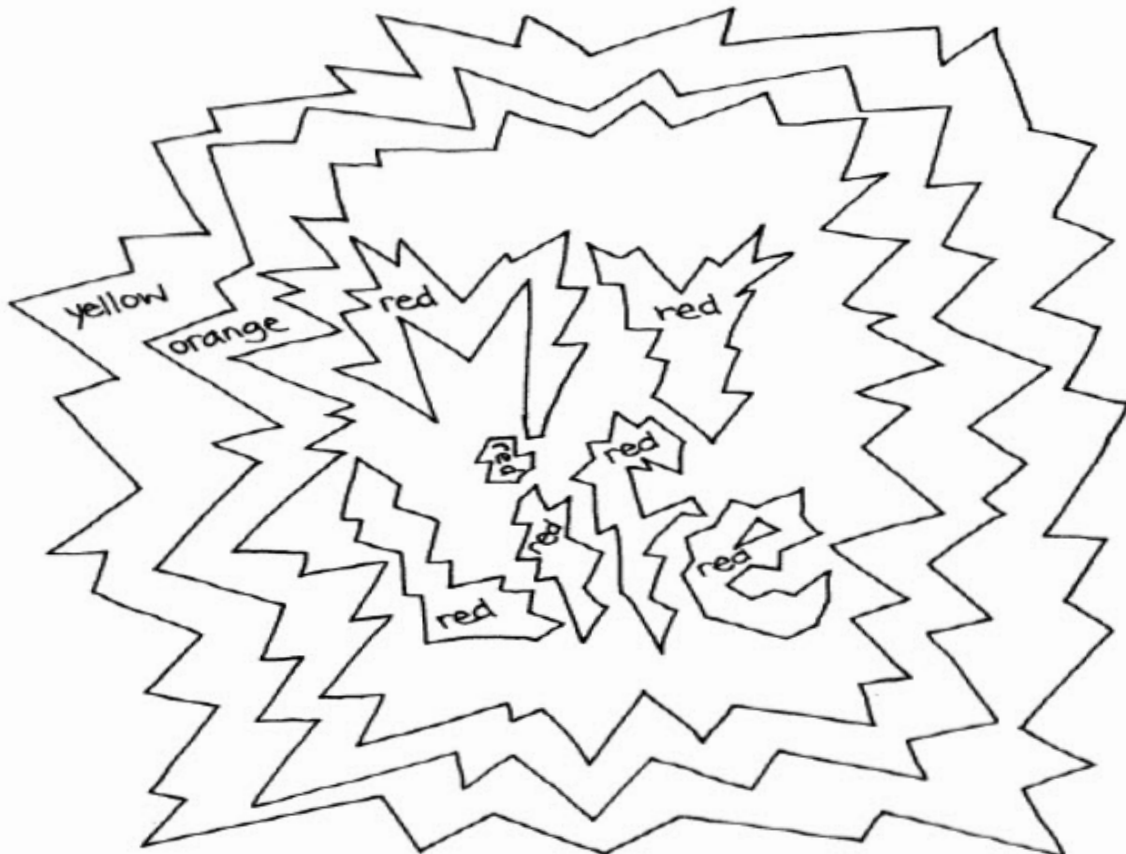

THOUGHTS ON *EXPERIENCES*

Experience Harvest has ended; the last of the 500 children have departed; and the five 'stations' around the church are no more. I felt that the huge amount of team efforts deserve some permanent recognition and, having been one of the guides, I thought to complete that record. These words can only be a personal view, but I am sure that others share it. These few weeks take me back twenty years to my retirement from teaching, when children figured largely in my life. It is easy to be wearing rose-tinted spectacles, but having groups of children such as we have been having made me realise what it was that made me take up teaching in the first place. If nothing else, it also made me aware how very tiring it can be ...

This final theme *Experience: Harvest!* set out to show that we were talking about the whole context of God's goodness in providing his people with sustenance in all its forms. Thus the five stations were not concerned solely with '*bringing in the sheaves*' as the old hymn (and Psalm 126) puts it. In that way we were enabled to point out that there are also harvests of the earth (by extracting clay we can make pottery); of the oceans; of the flocks (here weaving figured largely); and in our own gardens or allotments. There were however, deeper meanings: and each station had its own theme of one of God's gifts: Joy, Generosity, Humility, Patience and Peace.

Here we were making use of the Jewish Harvest – known as Sukkot or the Feast of Tabernacles. Our groups of children had been on a journey as had the Jews: those 40 years through the wilderness with Moses to the Promised Land. Jews today follow the Biblical exhortation (Leviticus 23:42) to remind themselves of the goodness of God in protecting them through that terrible experience by building a temporary shelter every harvest time, in their own homes, and even living in it. This set the pattern for our journey's end here in Christ Church, and everyone visiting Christ Church over the weeks of our Harvest Experience will have seen our version of the Sukkah (one translation is simply a 'hut'). Like the Jews, the hut is hung with fruit in recognition of God's goodness in providing us with our needs; and the roof is open to the sky, letting all within know that God is looking over us.

Harvest was what we all garnered from our own experiences of being an integral part of the whole; and it seemed to me that those five of God's gifts would easily apply to what we and the children were experiencing, and I have set those out here. I am sure others can add to my list!

My visit to Christ Church

The people at Christ Church looked around 50-79 years old. They look as if they are concentrating very hard on the ten commandments. The ten commandments are prayers I suspect.

The reader stood up and read us the Gospel. We had to stand up to listen to it. The Gospel is the word of God.

When I look around I can see lots of pictures, most of them seem to be women. There are two pictures that are exactly the same. They all have the same kind of face. I expect that this is because they were painted by the same artist.

Now we have to stand up for the Creed. It seems to be also a prayer like the ten commandments. I came to Christ Church on Wednesday morning so it was a special service. It was supposed to be for adults but instead I came to write down some notes.

I can also see a lot of stain glass windows all around the church. There is a huge stain glass window right at the front of the church, behind the altar.

The ancients used to make sacrifices, mostly of animals but sometimes humans!

The patterns on the stain glass windows must have taken ages to make. There are also smaller stain glass windows all around the church walls.

The communion is a way of remembering Jesus by sharing out bread (his body) and wine (his blood).

The ancients did not use the church altar to make sacrifices but they used sacrificial altars instead.
