Key UN leader speaks on climate change at St Paul's Cathedral

Christiana Figueres, the Executive Secretary of the UN framework convention for

climate change, has given the key note speech at an event which took place at St Paul's Cathedral.

The event entitled 'Building the Will for Action' brought together the UN, churches, investors, security experts and environmentalists to highlight the importance of collective action on climate change. The event was organised by St Paul's Institute in conjunction with Shrinking the

Footprint, the Church's national environmental campaign, the Church Investors Group and Charities, Churches and Local Authorities (CCLA).

Christiana Figueres shared her views on the key challenges faced and highlighted what faith communities, the City and the UK at large can do to help.

Christina Figueres said:

"Dear friends, for the first time in history we human beings now have the power to alter the physical foundations of life on this planet. But as ever throughout history we also have the responsibility to set the ethical foundation of our global society. We have done this with slavery and with apartheid. It is time to do it with climate change."

In church and those cheeky animals seem to have gone off hiding. Once again they want to be at the front of the church, to watch the children and be part of it all. So when they are all sitting comfortably and everything is ready, we open the church doors. First in today is Reuben, followed by Grandma Barbara and little sister Cecily. The children try out the jingly bells to make sure that they are all working properly and soon we are joined by some mums and children who haven't come along before. Isn't that great? In the end we have a lovely noisy crowd including baby Luke who is now nearly 6 months old and awake! With everyone settled it is time for our service to begin. We light our candles including 3 happy birthday candles for Karla, Poppy and Pippa. Our naughty little sheep, who is standing quietly on our little altar with his friend the glittery dragon, tells me that he really likes happy candles.

Today we are thinking about picnics and especially the Big Picnic that Jesus had, when he fed 5,000 people with 5 barley loaves and two fishes. We all agree that it is just amazing; and it must have been the best ever picnic and the fish and bread must have tasted like special heavenly food. The people there at the time must have been a bit surprised, mustn't they? They were probably really hungry and so pleased when they were

offered something nice to eat. They may not even have realised just how special it was and Jesus didn't make a big fuss about it. And when everybody had eaten all that they wanted, there were twelve baskets of scraps left! Wow, that was some miracle!

We talk about our own picnics and the food we like to eat; sausage rolls and sandwiches; crisps and cakes and we sing about food, and fun and love and we thank God for all the good things that He gives to us each day. We sing about fish and bread and sharing, remembering Jesus' Big Picnic and how a little boy was happy to share his fish and bread. 

Guidance on challenging homophobic bullying in church schools launched

The Archbishop of Canterbury has launched a report from the Education Division of the Church of England "Valuing All God's Children: Guidance for Church of England Schools on Challenging Homophobic Bullying."

The guidance, which has been given to all Church of England schools, provides 10 key recommendations which should be adopted by schools in combating homophobic bullying as well as sample policies for primary and secondary Church schools. Published by the Church Of England Archbishops' Council Education Division, the guidance involved consultation and involvement with a number of Church of England schools with existing good practice.

Speaking at a Church of England Secondary School at Trinity Lewisham Archbishop Justin said that the publication of the guidance fulfilled a pledge he made last July when addressing the Church of England's General Synod.

"Less than a year ago I set out my concerns about the terrible impact of homophobic bullying on the lives of young people and I made a public commitment to support our schools in eradicating homophobic stereotyping and bullying.

"Since then an enormous amount of work has gone into producing this guidance so that commitment can be turned into action. I am extremely grateful to all those who have worked so hard to produce it and I particularly want to thank the schools and young people who have

contributed.

"Church schools begin from the belief that every child is loved by God. This guidance aims to help schools express God's love by ensuring that they offer a safe and welcoming place for all God's children. This is a task we are called to share and I know it is one our schools take immensely seriously. I commend this guidance as a contribution to that work."

Archbishop Sentamu backs new 'Debt Trap' report

A new report backed by the Archbishop of York identifies the effect that debt is placing on family relationships, damaging children and trapping families in a downward spiral of borrowing.

The report lifts the lid on the devastating impact debt can have on children. Their findings show that children are suffering worry and anxiety, bullying and going without essentials as their families are trapped in problem debt.

Two and a half million children live in families with problem debt, who are behind on £4.8 billion of household bills and loan repayments. A further five million children are in families that are struggling to keep up with repayments and risk falling behind.

The report coincides with The Children's Society's launch of 'The Debt Trap' - a campaign lifting the lid on the massive impact of debt on children's lives. The Archbishop of York said:

"Parents living in poverty face incredibly difficult choices. What is to come first? Heating your home or putting food on the table? Many choose to go without themselves so they can provide the basics for their children. Parents want to make the best choices for their family, but low wages, expensive childcare and inflexible jobs make this very difficult.

Seven new Bishops announced

Seven new Bishops, including the Diocesan Bishop of Liverpool and Bishop in Europe, have been announced.

Four Suffragan Bishops were confirmed on Friday 2nd May, with 10 Downing Street releasing the appointments of the next Bishops of Barking (Peter Hill) and Colchester (Roger Morris) in the Diocese of Chelmsford, and the Bishops of Whitby (Paul Ferguson) and Selby (John Thomson) in the Diocese of York.

The following week saw the announcements of the next Bishop of Gibraltar in Europe, Robert Innes; the next Bishop of Liverpool, Paul Bayes, and the next Suffragan Bishop of Grimsby, David Court.

Revd Nick Baines, who blessed the proceedings.

Bishop Nick said: "A century is not a long time, but only 100 years ago the world fell apart in the most violent way. This simple act of growing poppies reminds us of our past and is a very visual way of pledging ourselves to serve together in the future."

Hundreds of packets of seeds have been sent to every church and church school by church leaders in the diocese of West Yorkshire and the Dales and everyone is being urged to plant their poppy seeds this week to mark their identity as a Diocese together and remember all those who lost their lives in the Great War.

Tens of thousands of poppy seeds have been sown by schoolchildren, junior soldiers, civic leaders, clergy, faith groups and community organisations as a joint act of remembrance to mark the centenary of the First World War.

In Leeds, letters home from a Leeds Pal who joined Kitchener's Call to Arms were read out at a poppy planting ceremony in a city centre park. Schoolchildren, civic and faith leaders joined the new Bishop of Leeds for the newly created Diocese of West Yorkshire and the Dales, the Rt

OUR NAUGHTY LITTLE SHEEP IN THE USA, AGAIN!

Our naughty little sheep has just got back for his second trip to the USA; what a lucky sheep he is! He had a wonderful time and memories of it are still buzzing around in his little woolly head, or so he tells me. He loves flying high in the sky, looking out of the airplane window to see our beautiful world below (When there aren't any clouds!} "Isn't God clever to have made it?" he says to me, and it certainly helps us appreciate our little blue and green planet set in the vastness of space. Aren't we lucky to be alive and to be part of it?

On our travels we have been to many interesting places and seen some lovely things including dogwood trees with pretty white blossom, magnolias with big waxy flowers and lots of

colourful azaelias. They are a feast for the eyes. We've seen interesting animals and our naughty little sheep thinks that some of them are quite scary. He's seen alligators, snakes and snapping turtles in the bayou, and he tells me that he's glad that we don't have those at home though he was very brave and actually stroked an alligator! Something funny that he remembers are the ducks in the Peabody Hotel in Memphis. They spend their days swimming in the fountain inside the hotel, and at 5pm every evening they waddle to the lift and then they're taken up to the roof where they have their own special duck house. Isn't that amazing? And the alligators can't get them up there!

Our naughty little sheep is very good for our coach journeys and doesn't keep asking "Are we there yet?" He's been looking out of the window with beady eyes, seeing if he can find any sheep. He always does that when we're away. But there isn't a sheep to be seen, even though we travel nearly 1,900 miles! There doesn't seem to be any lamb to eat, either, though I don't mention that! However there is lots of other lovely food to try and our naughty little sheep certainly tucks in. One day he even has his dinner on a paddle steamer on the Mississippi. How great is that? And he's been very adventurous, eating all kinds of new food including fried green tomatoes, jambalaya, gumbo, hush puppies (not shoes!) and a catfish Po-Boy. He didn't like the look of grits so he passed on that but he absolutely loved the hot beignets dusted with icing sugar, that we had in New Orleans. Very naughty but nice, like our little sheep!

He tells me that there were lots of things to remind him of Christ Church and all his friends here. There were joyful Gospel singers at the New Orleans Jazz Fest to remind him of all the good music that we have. At the Grand Ole Opry we heard a singer thank Jesus for turning his life around and our naughty little sheep said it just shows the power of Jesus' love. We passed many churches, big and small though none was quite like ours. Lots had Easter crosses outside, draped in white and it made him think of our own Easter cross with its coloured fabric, white drapes and lilies. It made him a bit homesick, poor little fellow.

Our naughty little sheep says that he has had a lovely holiday with great music and great food and it's given him lots to think about, not least where he's going next! But for now he's happy to be home with his friends and all the people that he loves. We've seen many interesting sights and met some warm and generous people. There is no doubt that we have an amazing and beautiful world and we must all do our best to take care of it. Thanks be to God for all the wonderful things that He has given to us. May we always appreciate just how blessed we are.



THE Mustard Seed aims to provide an informal and friendly tea at 3.00 pm on the third Thursday of every month in Christ Church hall.


It is a venture that offers the opportunity to meet new friends and reminisce about old times.
