A message from our vicar - Sue Brewer

It's good to be back with you again – a very big 'thank you' to you all for allowing me to take these last 3 months Study Leave, and for the way everyone has worked together so well and supported one another as part of one church family. The last 3 months have been a real blessing for me. The studying I have been doing, around the topics of 'The Monastic Rule of St Benedict', and also 'Leadership', have both led me to a renewed understanding of how Christians can relate to each other, and to God, and to the world around us. It hasn't all been 'desk-work' though – I have also had the opportunity to worship in different churches (and 4 Cathedrals!), to visit galleries and concerts and to spend time with friends and family. I have also attended 2 residential courses and spent 8 days on pil-

grimage in the Holy Land. Thank you from the bottom of my heart for making it all possible.

There is much too much to share, to put it all in one magazine article. Over time the things I have learnt will emerge in sermons,

conversation and more subtle ways! I did keep a daily 'journal' of my Sabbatical with reflections on things I noticed and learnt. I found that God has spoken to me in this time as much through the ordinary events and the unexpected, as through formal learning and worship - It has been good to have time to hear his voice.

I will put a few of these reflections in the magazine from time to time... here is an early reflection from **11th March – day 1 of my Study Leave:**

Leaving time for the journey...

'Were not our hearts on fire, as he talked with us on the road'

There are always important things to do... and too little time to do them all.

One day in November I had just one engagement in the diary – to travel to Northiam for an appointment. The journey is quite a long one, and not one I am familiar with. On this particular day I decided that there were some things I could – or maybe should – complete before setting off for the meeting. Once I finally left the house I knew that I had left insufficient time for the journey and tried to make up time on the way.

That was the reason that today I was invited to attend a Speed Awareness Course on this first day of my Study Leave, at the invitation of Kent Police. It is usually the reason that I speed... often the reason that I pay too little attention to the road: because the journey is a waste of my time, and I have other pressing things that call for my attention first.

For me, the journey is the way to get to the destination... a necessary evil. To be timed and minimised and got through as quickly as possible. It is the destination that is the important thing.

Today, this first day of 3 months Study Leave, I see unimaginable leisure before me - and very few fixed points in my diary. Yet how obsessed my day has been with time. With arriving on time... and with

making sure the journeys are cut down to a minimum. As I walked to the Cathedral this morning I obsessed about the time it would take, and how late I would leave home next day. As I prayed with good friends in the cathedral, I obsessed about what time the service would end, and therefore whether when I do the same journey tomorrow, I would be back in time for the plumber to arrive. The arrival is so much more important than the journey.

As I tidied the house this morning, the morning story on the radio was about pilgrimage. A pilgrimage to Compostela, to be precise. By someone who had no particular faith, and no particular aim in view... a pilgrimage that was all about the journey, wherever it might lead.

In life there are as many journeys as arrivals, as many spaces between events as there are events. Space, as they tell you on the Speed Awareness Course, is the most important thing. Without space there are consequences. In the Gospels there are very few meetings, appointments or destinations... just encounters with Jesus on journeys, for those who had the time and the space to let him talk to them. Today, and throughout these three months ahead, I am leaving some time for the journey.

PS As well as teaching me about myself and how to use my Study Leave, the Speed Awareness Course also undeniably taught me to drive better and safer. I hope you don't get invited to attend one but, if you do, they are very good!

Psalm 96

Sing to the Lord a new song
Sing to the Lord all the earth
Sing to the Lord, praise His name.....

Psalm 98

Psalm 108

My heart is steadfast O God
I will SING and make MUSIC with all my soul.....
The Jewish religion gave a large place to music in worship.

In the temple of Solomon, four thousand praised the Lord with instruments and the number of them that were instructed in the songs of the Lord was just two hundred, four score and eight.

When Christianity came there was at first no break with the Jewish church. Christians still attended the Temple of Jerusalem (as Christ Himself did) and in their separate Christian meetings they carried on the musical tradition.

Paul exhorted the Ephesians and Colossians to use psalms, hymns and spiritual songs.

It seems the use of instruments was not favoured. It has been said that the organ was introduced into Christian church by Pope Vitalian in the 7th cent.

The "Council of Trent, 1545 - 63, recommended bishops to exclude music in which anything impious or lascivious formed a part.

Puritans and Music -

During the English Puritan rule of the 17th cent. Secular music flourished as never

before, but there was an objection to elaborate church music, with church organs and choirs.

Simplicity and sincerity were aimed at but consequent prejudice was a factor in excluding so much that was beautiful from the service of the church.

The Church Music Society was founded in 1906 to encourage a high standard in the choir and performance of music in worship, and in 20th cent there was a strong movement towards dignity in church music, and weaker specimens of the Anglican chant are tending to fall out of use.

Christ Church choir, under its choir master and organist Christian Thomas is a devoted and faithful little band, which in spite of its best efforts cannot last forever and is calling out for new members of all ages to help carry on this great tradition. Psalm 108 (of David) *"My heart is steadfast O God, I will sing and make music with all my soul"*

Times are not easy for Christians; belief in God today can be ever more stressful. Faith can create internal anxieties as well as external pressures and cause over-load. Elizabeth and Andrew look at stress factors for Christian people in today's world and offer some ways forward.

Dr Elizabeth Procter has been a medical doctor for over 35 years and has specialised in psychiatric medicine for 24 years; she is now a Senior Consultant working locally for the NHS. She has been involved in the Diocese of Rochester healing ministry for 15 years.

Revd Andrew Procter has been a parish priest for 33 years and has been a qualified counsellor for 12 years. He is also involved in the Diocese healing ministry and is the Bishop of Rochester's Advisor on Deliverance Ministry.

Andrew and Elizabeth are co-authors of recently published books on depression and burnout.
