

Church Grounds Maintenance

We are currently looking at ways to maintain and improve our church grounds and as I see it we have two main options:-

- a) Pay for the work to be done currently over £1000 a year
 or
- b) Do the work, or most of it, ourselves, in house.

Il would like to think that we could muster up enough volunteers to do the latter and would like to hear yours views.

Do you enjoy working outside in the garden? Can you spare a little time on a one off, or a regular basis, or as part of a working party group, to help maintain and improve our church grounds?

The following gives you some idea of the things that need to be done:-

- 1) Mowing the lawns and trimming the edges.
- 2) Trimming the hedges and minor tree pruning.
- 3) Weeding the borders and flower beds.
- 4) Weeding the stone chipping areas around the base of the church.
- 5) Sweeping the paths especially in the autumn when the leaves fall.
- 6) Treating the wooden benches.
- 7) Keeping the compost area behind the sheds tidy.
- 8) Any other general maintenance tasks as and when they arise.

Are you interested? Can you help in any way? Can you take responsibility for just one small area, eg the treating of one bench.?

Archbishop Justin invites young people to spend year praying at Lambeth Palace

Archbishop Justin is opening up Lambeth Palace to adults aged 20-35 to spend a year living, praying and studying together as a radical new Christian community Launching in September 2015, the Community of St Anselm will gather a group of adventurous young adults from all walks of life, hungry for a challenging and formative experience of life in a

praying community.

The Community will initially consist of 16 people living at Lambeth Palace full-time, and up to 40 people, who live and work in London, joining part-time. The year-long programme will include prayer, study, practical service and community life.

Members of the Community will live in a way the ancient monastics would recognise: drawing closer to God through a daily rhythm of silence, study and prayer. But, through those disciplines, they will also be immersed in the modern challenges of the global 21st century church.

8TH OCTOBER 2014 AUTUMN COMES HARVEST

However it's a different story when we all walk up to church later, because the clouds have begun to part and the sun is peeping out. Everywhere looks lovely covered in sunshiny rain drops!

I had announced as part of my plans for this Sabbatical that I was planning to share in worship in different churches each Sunday. I had ambitiously said that this would give me new ideas to bring back to the congregation at Christ Church. My intention was to move around the churches of Rochester Deanery, sharing with their weekly worship. So far it has not worked out as I had planned.

There have been 4 Sundays so far. For various reasons, I have only managed to get to church on one of them.

And so to the fifth Sunday! I am on my way to Canterbury for a retreat. I will be

worshipping the in Cathedral on Sunday evening and several day times а all I agonise week. Sunday about morning. Logistically today is nightmare. Jeremy is playing golf. There packing and

the dog and the cat to deal with... and a train to catch. I research the various churches... they all have something on (it being Palm Sunday) that will make the service longer than usual.

worship, or shared communion, or time spent in God's word, or prayer, or fellowship. Over the last five weeks I have been rich in all of these. What can be so important about Sunday morning in particular? Isn't it more important to spend quality time with Jeremy and with friends? To de-stress and stop and smell the roses?

And yet... there is a disease within me. A dissatisfaction with myself, and a feeling that something is missing. Is it that Sunday worship is so engrained in me that I can't shake myself free from it? Or is it something else?

In the Benedictine cycle of prayers... prayers which happen 9 times every day and involve the reading of the whole book of psalms every week, as well as other scripture... Sunday still has a special importance. This despite the fact that the Sunday community are the same community who have gathered in the same way throughout the days and the nights all through the previous week.

Sabbath time is time set apart for God. Prayer in the midst of daily living is vital. We need to continue to see that God is part of our daily lives. That he never leaves us. That he fills our work, and our leisure. But Sabbath time is time set apart for God. Used aright it can be a blessing. It truly sets us up for the rhythm of the week to come.

Every week Sabbath worship is a weekly remembrance of creation and resurrection; a celebration of new life. For once each week it sets our sights above the daily. It re-states the basics of our faith and gives meaning to the rest of the week, which will also be prayerful. Each Sunday we ask for the energy of grace to carry on;

we acknowledge the failings of the last week and bring with us the expected struggles of the next week, we remind ourselves of God's utter faithfulness and we take the opportunity to publicly declare that we desire God before anything else. Finally we offer our whole lives in thanksgiving. Sunday, says Joan Chittister in the book I am reading, is a 'soul-splitting commitment to go on'.

No wonder I am missing it. Sometimes it takes enforced absence for you to realise what you have missed. So often for the Vicar Sunday is rush and last-minute emergencies; responsibility and organisation; and everyone wanting a bit of you. I think of the 'shut ins' - those who will never again be able to worship with the gathered community on Sundays because of frailness or sickness. I am profoundly grateful for that rhythm of Sunday worship, both the choice and freedom of the worship during sabbatical and also the privilege of bringing God's people to that same place week by week at Christ Church.

I make a fresh commitment to go on...

Arthur's War

Well worth a visit is the newly opened World War 1 exhibition at Scotney Castle, which includes some of the National Trust's best preserved resources from the period.

In what appeared to be no more than an ordinary metal box, abandoned it one of the attics of the house, volunteers discovered a treasure trove of memorabilia from the personal collection of Brigadier-General, Arthur Hussey, who from 1914 - 1919 was the Commander, Royal Artillery, of the 5th Division.

As you move from room to room, on the ground floor, the exhibition takes you through the collection that includes letters, diaries, photographs and battle plans.

The exhibition gives an insight of the life of not only an officer but also some of the men of Lamberhurst village who lived on the estate and enlisted to fight on the front line.

Complimentary to the exhibition, artist Vivian Pedley has created portraits of

these local men, which are on display in the restaurant.


The exhibition is open daily from 11.00 - 16.00 until 22 March next year, normal property entry charges apply, but National Trust members are free.



Through the kitchen door

Recently chatting with a couple of sides-man colleagues I was asked to put in one of my more recent recipe try outs, and I can assure you this is as good if not better than carrot cake!

COURGETTE CAKE

- 3 medium eggs
- 125ml vegetable oil
- 150g caster sugar
- 225g self raising flour
- 1/2 teaspoon bicarbonate of soda
- ½ teaspoon baking powder
- 250g courgettes, finely grated

For the icing

- 400g cream cheese
- 175g icing sugar
- 2 tablespoons lime juice
- 40g pistachio nuts, finely chopped
- 1 tablespoon lime zest

METHOD

- 1. Pre-heat oven to 180 C /160 fan / gas 4, and grease and line two 21 cm sponge tins
- 2. Beat together the eggs, oil and sugar in a large bowl until creamy. Sift in the flour, bicarb and baking powder and beat well. Stir in the grated courgette until well combined. Divide the mixture into the cake tins.
- 3. Bake in the middle of the oven for 25 30 minutes
- 4. Remove the cakes from the oven and carefully turn out onto a wire rack. Carefully peel off the lining paper and allow to cool.
- 5. For the icing, beat the cream cheese in a bowl until smooth. Sift in the icing sugar and stir in the lime juice.
- 6. Use a bread knife to level one of the cakes if necessary. Use 2/3 rds of the icing to sandwich the two cakes together, the levelled one on the bottom, and use the remaining icing to cover the top of the cake.
- 7. Sprinkle with the pistachio nuts and lime zest



Archbishop Justin joined Imam Ibrahim Mogra, Rabbi Laura Janner-Klausner and Ayatollah Dr Sayed Fazel Milani at the vigil outside Westminster Abbey by the Innocent Victims Memorial.

Speaking at the vigil, Archbishop Justin said he joined the other faith leaders in "unreservedly" condemning the way that minority faith communities are being "wiped out" in ISIS-controlled areas.

'In order to save on expensive cleaning and maintenance, we hold a monthly working party on a Saturday morning starting at 09.30.


Together we clean and tidy the church, do a bit of necessary DIY or gardening, have a coffee and often some home-made goodies – and finish by about 11.30.
