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World War 1 Christmas 1914

In the lead up to Christmas 1914, there were several peace initiatives. The Open Christmas Letter was a public message for peace addressed "To the Women of

Germany and Austria", signed by a group of 101 British women suffragettes at the end of 1914 as the first Christmas of World War I approached. Pope Benedict XV, on 7 December 1914, had begged for an official truce between the warring governments. He asked "that the guns may fall silent at least upon the night

the angels sang." This attempt was officially rebuffed.

On Christmas Eve, 1914, both sides declared an unofficial truce and sung Christmas carols to each other. A football match was played in no-man's land, the area between the German and British trenches, when German and British soldiers exchanged food and souvenirs.

New Prior for St Anselm Community appointed

The Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, has appointed the Revd Anders Litzell as Prior of the Community of St Anselm, the radical new Christian community at Lambeth Palace.

Mr Litzell, 34, is an Anglican priest from Sweden, who has experience of the Pentecostal and Lutheran traditions as well as three provinces of the Anglican Communion. He will pioneer Community. which launches in September 2015, and direct its worship and work. He will work as Prior under the auspices of the Archbishop, who will be Abbot of the Community. Mr Litzell will take up the role on 5th January 2015.

The Community will initially consist of 16 people living at Lambeth Palace full-time, and up to 40 people, who live and work in London, joining as non-residential members. The Archbishop hopes that the Community will be definitive in shaping

future leaders to serve the common good in a variety of fields, as they immerse themselves in a challenging year of rigorous formation through prayer, study, practical service and community life.

Mr Litzell was ordained in the Church of England in 2012. He is currently serving at St George's, Holborn, in the Diocese of London – where his ministry focuses on students and adults in their 20s and 30s. At the same time he is pursuing a doctorate which focuses on the relevance of St Benedict for contemporary leadership. He trained for ordination at Ridley Hall, Cambridge, UK, including a sojourn at St Agnes, Diocese of Natal in South Africa.

Archbishop Justin Welby said: "My vision for the Community of St Anselm is that it be both ancient and postmodern: that young adults be steeped in the rich monastic traditions of the likes of Benedict, Francis and Ignatius, while discovering their striking relevance for the transformation of self and society today. I am delighted at the appointment of Anders Litzell who will help to work this out at Lambeth Palace."

In this Ebola nightmare, who do we turn to?

In the dark times that now engulf Liberia, many people will have asked themselves "who do we turn to?"

Many of us find no answer. My only answer is God. When answers are lacking, I turn to my creator for hope, rescue and solace.

I have always enjoyed my work with WaterAid across the borders of Liberia and Sierra Leone, to offer poor and excluded people a chance of a better life through access to the basics: clean water, a safe toilet and hygiene.

After Liberia's civil war ended in 2003, the country faced an uphill battle to rebuild. Even today many parts of the capital, Monrovia, are without

electricity or proper roads. More than 80% of our country's people are without access to a basic toilet, and 25% do not have clean water.

WaterAid has been working in the country to bring safe water and toilets to homes and schools. We've also worked closely with government to establish a committee on safe water and sanitation, and to work on strategy, planning, technical support and financing for water, sanitation and hygiene programmes.

We are proud that the National Water, Sanitation and Hygiene Promotion Committee has now become part of their WASH Ebola Away response.

But today, working and living here in Monrovia, all I feel is fear: fear that a relative may contract Ebola; fear that a close friend may die of it; fear

that our vital work will be held up and fear that I may not even finish writing this piece.

So far, no one on our WaterAid team has contracted the virus but the rate at which the disease is claiming lives, and the lack so far of a vaccine or cure or an effective approach to eradicating the virus terrifies me.

None of us expected this crisis to go on so long. We thought the end of the rains in October would mean an end to the virus. But now we are all aware that it is likely that things will get worse, maybe much much worse, before they get better. Sometimes I feel like God has sent his wrath upon us.

As it is, living and working in this crisis is like I am already in a sort of hell. All my hope, except that which I have in God, has been lost. Everything now seems a worthless vanity as the peace we once had has been replaced by fear and hopelessness.

Everybody including family members, colleagues and church congregations treat each other suspiciously because of Ebola. Homes, work places, social centres are all practicing good hygiene, so as to try and keep the virus at bay. But the risk and death toll of Ebola continues to rise relentlessly.

The sirens of ambulances picking up the sick and dying are constant. The cries of the victims have become a formulaic song in the ears of everyone here. The hands of friends and loved ones have been put away, dodging our traditional West African handshakes.

Every time we leave home, we are afraid. Upon our return, even our own family members are reluctant to touch us until we've bathed and changed clothes.

This cannot be a problem for Liberia alone to handle. The international community must continue to step in.

But when even the doctors and nurses here to help us - our earthly life givers - are dying, where else do we run to but to God? I believe that God is in our land. He is not asleep. He will restore the hope we once had in each other.






A CRUISE TO REMEMBER

Mary and I booked on a short cruise (four nights) on the Cunarder Queen Mary 2. This was from Southampton, and the ship spent a day at each of Zeebrugge (Belgium) and Cherbourg (France).

We were surprised and rather humbled to learn that, in this hundredth year since the beginning of World War I, QM2 had

been selected to bring back to **England** а last sandbag of sacred soil from the war cemeteries Belgium, in to be used in the creation of new а memorial garden at the Guards' Museum, off



During the day (5 October) spent berthed at Zeebrugge, the Captain and

senior officers went to collect the sandbag. On their return, it was given pride of place on a table in the Grand Lobby – effectively, the heart of the ship - where I was able to photograph it.

Dinner on the evening of 6 October was called, "We will remember them", and each guest was presented with a specially-printed memorial menu, which included information about the sacred

soil. and the quotation from "For the fallen" -"They shall grow not old, as we who are left grow old. Age shall not weary them, nor the vears condemn. At the going down of the sun in the and morning, we will remember them".

On arrival at Southampton, the sandbag was presented to the Mayor of the port. It spent the night in Southampton, and was then taken by train to London Waterloo, whence it was conveyed to its final resting place.

Arthur's War

Well worth a visit is the World War 1 exhibition at Scotney Castle, which includes some of the National Trust's best preserved resources from the period.

In what appeared to be no more than an ordinary metal box, abandoned it one of the attics of the house, volunteers discovered a treasure trove of memorabilia from the personal collection of Brigadier-General, Arthur Hussey, who from 1914 - 1919 was the Commander, Royal Artillery, of the 5th Division.

As you move from room to room, on the ground floor, the exhibition takes you through the collection that includes letters, diaries, photographs and battle plans.

The exhibition gives an insight of the life of not only an officer but also some of the men of Lamberhurst village who lived on the estate and enlisted to fight on the front line.

Complimentary to the exhibition, artist Vivian Pedley has created portraits of

these local men, which are on display in the restaurant.

The exhibition is open daily from 11.00 - 16.00 until 22 March next year, normal property entry charges apply, but National Trust members are free.

We can easily make sure this happens by the following diocesan policy and quidance the Protection on and Safeguarding of Children and Vulnerable Adults. You can view this policy on the website Diocese Rochester of www.rochester.anglican.org, otherwise feel free to speak to Reverend Sue, Veronica Read (Childrens Safeguarding Officer) or Angela Kirby (Vulnerable Adults Representative). This is especially important if you become aware of any situations which may cause a child or vulnerable adult to feel unsafe or threatened.

The policy also gives guidance on safe recruitment of volunteers and paid workers in groups working with children

and vulnerable adults and so if you are a group leader planning to take on new employees or volunteers, please speak to Reverend Sue, Veronica or Angela first.

New website, ToYourCredit, launched to showcase Church's work on fairer finance

A new website, ToYourCredit, has been launched to showcase the Church's work on responsible credit and savings, including supporting credit unions.

The website has been created by the Archbishop of Canterbury's Task Group on Responsible Credit and Savings and contains personal testimonies, videos, and blogs from initiatives across the country. Their vision is "to create a fairer financial system focused on serving the whole community, where everyone has access to responsible credit and savings and other essential financial services." The Task Group has also proposed a network of savings clubs in Primary schools to give pupils practical experience of money management. The programme would build on a number of successful small-scale initiatives already in place in parts of

the country and evidence of what makes for an effective financial education programme.

Sir Hector Sants, chair of the Task Group, said: "Savings clubs can transform lives through helping establish a responsible approach to money from an early age.

"This programme would also strengthen communities through building links between schools, churches and credit unions, and is part of the Church of England's broader initiative to support the development of a larger, vibrant and more sustainable community finance sector in this country."

Once evaluated, the proposed scheme would be extended to primary schools across the country starting with Church of England primary schools. The task group is seeking funding from Government and other sources for a pilot scheme in three areas of England working with the Credit Union Foundation and the Personal Finance Education Group (PFEG).

PEACE CANDLE IN REMEMBRANCE OF THOSE THAT WENT BEFORE

You may well have seen the 'Peace Candle' that was used at the WW1 commemoration service on 4th August, now in the sanctuary. The candle will remain in place throughout the 4 years of commemoration and will be lit at each Sunday and Wednesday service, as a reminder to us all to pray for



peace in the many areas of conflict throughout the world. When you see the candle, please remember to pray for those caught up in conflict.

The sign near to the candle records the areas of conflict most in our prayers at any given time (though there are other 'hidden' conflicts that rarely appear on our televisions). If you would like an area of the world added to the list, please speak to Revs Sue or Jacqueline.
