Discussion Paper On Welfare

A discussion paper 'Thinking Afresh About Welfare' has been released today by the Church of England.

The paper, by Rev Dr Malcolm Brown, Director of the Mission and Public Affairs Division of Archbishops' Council, was endorsed by the May meeting of the House of Bishops as a discussion document.

Malcolm Brown said: "This is a considered response to the changing face of welfare provision, to help discussion across the church. It is not a policy paper, but aims to be a thoughtful contribution to the welfare debate."

Some visitors came riding to Jerusalem. Bang! Bang! They knocked at the palace door.


"We've come to see the king," they said, "the king who has just been born." King Herod was most upset. A new king? Instead of him? Never!

We are having a 90th Birthday Party on Saturday 3rd March 2018 in Christ Church Hall, from 2pm to 5pm.




