# WW1 - A personal tragedy

## Great-Uncle Willy

William George Gore, my paternal grandmother's brother, was born in Sturry near Canterbury and worked at the Queenborough glass works on Sheppey before moving to Ash-next-Sandwich and



gaining employment at one of the small, local breweries which were widespread in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century. As soon as he was old enough he enlisted at Canterbury in 4<sup>th</sup> Battalion the Buffs but, as casualties mounted, found himself transferred to the London Irish Rifles, in time to become involved in the 1918 German offensive, variously known as the Second battle of the Somme or the Kaiser's Spring Offensive. This was launched on 21<sup>st</sup> March 1918. The German attack was spearheaded by stormtroopers who swept through potential strong points and forced the British 5<sup>th</sup> Army to retreat. On that first day the British suffered 7,512 dead with 10,000 wounded. My Great-Uncle Willy was among those killed, together with two others from the same small village.

Along with so many others, his body was never recovered and his name is recorded on the Arras Memorial, Pas de Calais. As a result of his transfer to The London Irish Rifles his death is also recorded in Ireland's memorial records, a long way from his home in East Kent. After the war his family received the memorial plaque which became known as "the dead man's penny", framed below his cap badge of the Irish Harp; quite a contrast to the Buffs badge which he is proudly wearing in the photograph.

## Christ Church 200 Club

**The 200 Club** is a means of raising money for the Christ Church General Fund, which supports the Ministry and Mission of the church and Good Causes as agreed by the PCC, whilst at the same time giving members the opportunity of a small 'flutter' and the chance to win some money.

**Winning** chances are only limited by the amount of numbers you purchase, the more you have the better your chance of winning.

**Worthwhile** it certainly is, since its inception the 200 Club has donated over £40,000 to Christ Church to support its Ministry and Good Causes.




