In 2021 Christ Church's giving (Lent & Advent envelopes, Jar of Grace etc) amounted to £2558.



#### **Lent study**

This year our Lent Study will be exploring the beatitudes – the words of Jesus we find at the beginning of the Sermon on the Mount. 'Blessed are you....' So who is blessed? What does it mean to be blessed? We will

be using the Pilgrim course material – if you would like your own copy of the book they are available for £5. There will two opportunities to meet.

#### PRAYERS FOR WHOLENESS & HEALING

**In our service on 20<sup>th</sup> March** prayers for healing and wholeness will be offered. Luke's gospel reminds us that Jesus went about preaching the good news and healing. He commanded his disciples to do the same and it is in obedience to his command that we offer this ministry.

The church's ministry of prayer is in addition to, not a substitute for the work of doctors and the health services. You do not need to be "ill" to receive prayer for healing; each one of us needs to grow in wholeness and holiness, and these prayers can

be God's way to restore strength, peace and vitality into our lives or those about whom we are concerned.

Of course, there is no pressure to receive prayer for healing. While we believe that receiving Holy Communion is physically, mentally and spiritually beneficial, laying on of hands with prayer is another scripturally attested means of receiving God's grace.

At this time the laying on of hands will not be offered but prayers will be said individually in the chapels after communion.

We thank you Lord for your healed and healing church; set our minds at rest through trust in you; to serve you in the wholeness which Christ brings, until we share the fullness of his life in heaven. Amen.



#### **WAKING UP TO WAR**

#### The Archbishop's Thought for the Day 24th February

To wake up to the news of war is terrible. To wake up to its reality is orders of magnitude worse. Shakespeare refers to war as chaos - the loosing of the dogs of war - and calls for one of his characters to cry out the warning about what it means.

Those in the Ukraine will be thinking about their relatives on the front lines, or the friends on the front lines. We are thinking, where is it going to go next? Politicians are thinking, what do we do?

In all of the thinking, in all of the responses, there is the great uncertainty which is the worst enemy of good decisions. Uncertainty leads to fear, fear leads to overreaction. How do we react well? How do politicians in the cloud of war, not really knowing what's going on, but knowing they have no opportunity to wait – how do they make up their minds?

They will rightly call for all of us, and for themselves, to have resolution, courage, determination, a willingness to sacrifice whatever is necessary in order to ensure that peace may come and justice may be done.

Peace and justice. They often seem to contrast, and yet they are opposite sides of the same coin. We seek peace and justice, and that must end with those involved in conflict not having solutions imposed on them but finding for themselves the way forward to reconciliation and peace.

Right at the end of his life, Jesus Christ, on the eve of his crucifixion, spoke to his disciples and he said something very memorable. 'In the world you will have trouble, but do not be afraid, I have overcome the world.'

For me and for many of faith, the great certainty in the world, the only certainty, is that we know that God does not change. Let us find our resolution, our peace, our certainty not by screwing up our courage, but in the knowledge of the eternal arms that hold us.

May God be with those who suffer today.

We are looking forward to an engaging Holy Week this year.

On **Palm Sunday 10**<sup>th</sup> **April** we will be using a dramatic version of the Passion reading – please let the Vicar know if you would like to take part.

On Monday 11<sup>th</sup> we will be joining the other churches of the East Gravesend cluster for **Stations of the Cross** at Holy Family. On Tuesday 12th the Mothers' Union are hosting an **Agape** meal. On Wednesday 13<sup>th</sup> there will be a Holy Week reflection and a service of compline.

On **Maundy Thursday 14**<sup>th</sup> we will meet to recall Jesus final meal with his friends, moving into a time of prayer and vigil.

On **Good Friday 15**<sup>th</sup> in the morning we will be exploring the meaning of this holy day with readings, songs crafts and hot cross buns. From noon there will be reflections on the women we find in the passion story, finishing with the liturgy of the day

#### The solidarity of the shaken – beginning the Lent journey



We are too aware of anniversaries as we reach the beginning of March and the threshold of Lent. We recall the moments in 2020 when we heard of a new virus, which was to become a pandemic, the initial elbow tapping precautions and how we learnt of fatalities that came closer and closer to us each day. We have lived for two years in the shadow of the pandemic. There have been moments when, perhaps, we have looked prematurely beyond the restrictions and dreamt

of a liberty that even with the vaccination and booster programme being rolled out now seems some way off.

Living with the virus has, will, changed as people – individually and collectively. In some ways we are more compliant as guidance is reformulated, in others ways we feel more resistant as we question what may seem to contradict directions we have only just got used to. We live more cautiously, and have to trust others do the same. Some of us have experienced the virus very recently – we know it has not gone away.

I'd like to borrow a phrase from the philosopher Gillian Rose who wrote of the 'solidarity of the shaken' (she was actually reflecting on the deep



trauma that comes through the experience of war and other evils). In the past years our collective confidence has taken a knock but we carry on. We have discovered social and spiritual solidarity with a new determination as we 'keep things going' and try to maintain relationships.



As we begin Lent on Ash Wednesday we stand together. Ashes are a forceful reminder of the precarious nature of human existence and the seriousness of human sin. We are shaken by the images as we grasp at the possibilities of grace – 'Create and make in us new and contrite hearts', we will pray in our collect. We review our true situation in the world and before God.

It is not yet clear what impact the war in the Ukraine will have on us directly. It may seem a long way away but our media brings those events into our homes as they unfold. What our government does on our behalf matters. How we in due course respond to those who have been injured or forced to flee

their homes will matter. How we stand in solidarity with the shaken. In these early days offering our prayers, aligning ourselves to God's peaceable Kingdom are first steps. Our calling as Christ's disciples is encapsulated by St Paul's description of Christian living as 'Sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; poor yet making many rich; having nothing yet possessing everything.' That sounds like the right way to begin Lent.

In recent years our Lent observance and Holy Week devotions and Easter celebrations took a very different form to that which we anticipated at the beginning of Lent 2020. This year there will be the opportunity to live Lent together. We will be continuing Morning Prayer and our midweek service, Lent study materials will be available for two study groups.

As we continue to walk in solidarity may the grace and mercy at the heart of God embrace and defend us as we walk in faithfulness and emulate God's mercy, faithfulness and compassion in the world, and proclaim that outrageous, reconciling, universal love in the places we are called to repent and follow Christ.
