Reading: Psalm 138 GNB - A Prayer of Thanksgiving

Reading: Matthew Chapter 16: v 13 - 20 (GNB) Peter's declaration about Jesus

- ¹³ Jesus went to the territory near the town of Caesarea Philippi, where he asked his disciples, "Who do people say the Son of Man is?"
- "Some say John the Baptist," they answered. "Others say Elijah, while others say Jeremiah or some other prophet."
- 15 "What about you?" he asked them. "Who do you say I am?"
- $^{\mathbf{16}}\operatorname{Simon}$ Peter answered, "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God."

Reflection on the Word

After years of ministry in Israel, Jesus sent His disciples to circulate among the crowds in Caesarea Philippi (CP) and listen to what people were saying about him. The people were reported to be full of praise for Jesus and identified him with some Old Testament great. CP, however, was a Greco-Roman worship centre with temples to various gods. It is when confronted by the variety of worship styles and temples – a riot of noise, colour and chaos – that Jesus asks the disciples the all-important question "Who do people say I am?"

Just before this story Jesus had cautioned his disciples about the Jewish leaders themselves, Pharisees & Sadducees. Now they are in the religious melting pot of pagan cults – for Jewish disciples, a shocking place. And yet it is in this murky confusing cauldron that Peter responds in a new way to Jesus. People say all sorts of things but Peter recognises Jesus for who He is.

So the people were full of praise for Jesus but it was faint praise. Faint praise indeed. It's as if you or I looked at a portrait by Rembrandt or Leonardo da Vinci and commented "Oh, it's a nice picture."

Faint praise and lukewarm support are almost worse than the open hostility of the religious leaders of the day. And it's often the same today. "Oh, Jesus is alright. He was a good man - a wonderful teacher. There's a lot we can learn from Jesus - too bad he was crucified and died before his time."

People can respect Jesus as a good person, but God calls us to acknowledge Jesus as Lord and Saviour. Anything less than worshipping Him as Son of God is to reject Him.

So back to CP. Jesus did not send out His disciples because He was curious about what the crowds thought. He sent them out to listen so that they would be forced to make a decisive personal decision. You see it doesn't matter what other people say about Jesus. It doesn't matter if our parents, children, friends or our whole family are Christians, or indeed if they are not. Each one of us must answer for ourselves the question Jesus asked His followers then and asks us today; "Who do you say that I am?"

If we say with Peter "You are the Christ, Son of the living God", and thus trust ourselves to His care, we experience salvation and pass from death to life. If, however, we side with the crowd, no matter how much we may approve of Jesus as a moral and spiritual leader, we are lost.

Simon Peter as he is also known was originally called Simon, a name which means 'to hear'. Simon heard the truth of Jesus and was given the new name Peter, 'the rock' and on this rock I will build my church says Jesus. Many therefore believe that Peter was the first Pope and that's fine by me. Jesus also gave him the keys of the Kingdom, a privilege and a responsibility. Receiving the keys to the door of a house is something of a rite of passage. It's not so common these days but houses large and small have been known to pass down through families from generation to generation. Owners of large estates have significant responsibilities associated with their property – the upkeep of the bricks and mortar and often the care and employment of staff and workers. Downton Abbey is a good example of such issues.

Jesus hands the responsibility of opening access to God, to the Church. The keys which are handed down give the Church permission to innovate, to unlock doors that were firmly closed and show just how far the mercy of God will stretch when given the chance.

Think about the keys you have on you now – house, car, church perhaps. With these keys we can physically welcome others into our homes, provide transport for those without and enable many to benefit from the facilities of the church building. OK so access to homes, cars and Christchurch are not a reality at present – they will be! The keys held by Peter though are not physical but very much spiritual.

Spiritually, we who say "You are the Christ, Son of the living God" are custodians of the keys to the Kingdom and through our thoughts words and actions on a daily basis we form part of the rock on which God's church is built. The keys are a privilege, a responsibility and a challenge to us all in our daily walk with Jesus, Son of the living God. Amen.
