Pastor's Message

"Can you drink the cup I drink or be baptised with the baptism I am baptised with?" Mark 10:38

The "cup" and "baptism" in Jesus' question are an example of what is technically called "synonymous parallelism," meaning that they are two different metaphors portraying the same reality. They both depict the intense suffering Jesus was about to undergo in his flogging and crucifixion, and two pictures are given to emphasise just how great that suffering would be! By extension, given Jesus' subsequent prediction, they also depict the suffering and persecution that the disciples would experience as his followers.

Across the world, Jesus' question will likely have far more resonance than it does in the UK. For much of the Christian Church experiences intense persecution for their faith, often even the threat of death. That Christians are still so willing to suffer and die rather than keep their faith quiet is both humbling and challenging. And it is instructive that the Church is growing fastest in countries where there is persecution. Church growth is hard to measure exactly, but the most recent estimates report that the fastest growing Churches in the world are in Iran followed by Afghanistan, which rank 8th and 2nd respectively in Open Doors' list of the most severely persecuted Churches. Admittedly, those growth figures are prior to the Taliban regaining control of Afghanistan, but I have also seen information from Catalytic Ministries (who work with the underground church) to suggest that at least one underground network ballooned from 320 to approximately 2,500 members in the fortnight after the Taliban seized power.

What is the secret of this growth? Obviously, God's sovereign hand determines when and how his Church grows, but surely he also responds to the commitment of church members and their willingness to drink the cup that Jesus drank. In Iran, for instance, they sing songs about wanting to be martyrs for Christ, and the overwhelming mantra of many of the leaders is, "The blood of the martyrs is the seed of the gospel." They have but one priority: the spread of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. I am challenged by their single-minded commitment to consider my own priorities and our own priorities as a church. The Jesus portrayed in the Gospels issues a radical challenge to his disciples: not just can you, but are you willing to, drink the cup I drink and be baptised with the baptism I am baptised with? How do we respond to that challenge?
