TOILETS, TAPS AND TRAINING – A LIFESAVING TRIO

JANUARY'S COFFEE MORNING - THURSDAY JANUARY 21 10.30 - 12.00

While we still can't meet up for coffee at the church, please join me for a virtual 'cuppa', cake and chat and help raise some money for the charity Toilet Twinning UK

We are all so familiar with the concept of a flushing toilet, running water and a basin to keep ourselves healthy, that it is almost impossible to think of living without these basic amenities, but in many countries these are still not common and this year the lack a water for hand washing has increased the risk of catching COVID -19 too.

Toilet Twinning UK is a charity run by Tearfund to support partners in more than 35 countries to help the most vulnerable communities protect their children dying from diarrhoeal diseases and also themselves from rural diseases caused by poor hygiene and sanitation, including Covid-19.

In practice, this means providing toilets and taps for communities which lack these most basic of necessities, improving people's access to clean water, providing hygiene training and products such as soap and distributing the latest public health guidance by all means possible.

In many communities, they are helping families set up simple handwashing stations called 'tippy taps' that help improve hand hygiene while preserving precious water reserves.

Investing in sanitation is one of the most cost-effective forms of aid. For every £1 spent on water and sanitation programmes, £5.50 is returned through saved time, reduced health costs and increased productivity.

So, what does toilet twinning mean?

Each £60 we raise will help fund a project in a poor community that will enable families to build a basic toilet, have access to clean water and learn about hygiene – a vital combination that saves lives.

And to show that we have helped, we'll receive a certificate to hang in the church loos – showing a photograph of our overseas toilet twin and GPS coordinates so you can look up our twin's location on Google Maps!



- 3. Grow roses from cuttings by pushing the stalks into a small potato. The nutrients will help the roots flourish and grow.




Hopefully, most of you will have received your Membership Ticket by now and with it a booklet and card about a "Methodist Way of Life'

The Magi (submitted by Peter Radcliffe)

T S Eliot is better known for his Cat poems. However, Journey of The Magi is one of his favourite chez d'oeuvres. Although described as a poem it is more a short piece of riveting prose. The bible simply narrates the start and finish of a long expedition starting somewhere in Iraq and finishing in Bethlehem. The nature of such an arduous undertaking is highlighted in this poetic work. The theme is a poignant reflection in later life from one of the three. In January it takes its worthwhile place in the canon of English literature. It can easily be stripped off the internet and occupy a few delightful minutes of your time. Eliot was born in America but switched to England in 1914. He converted to Catholicism and subsequently wrote this poem in 1939.

I have a good friend at GUC who possesses this CD, narrated by the author himself. It contains an addendum musing why this poem was written. I borrowed the CD and sat down with Rev Darlene McCarley to listen and extract the maximum benefit from it. If anyone would like to enjoy this reading in similar fashion once this pandemic ends I can easily twist my comrade's arm for another short loan. I just keep twisting her arm until she says, "yes"! Merrow has my contact details.

Another recommendation fitting this festive season is a short fictional story called, "The Story of the Other Wise Man" written in the late 19th century by American, Henry van Dyke.

Artaban was the fourth magus due to rendez-vous en route to Bethlehem. Alas, he gets waylaid for the best and most humanitarian of reasons and so misses both meeting his three friends and visiting the young Christ child. The rest of his life is spent trying to catch up but never succeeds – or does he?

Wilkipedia tells us more about him:

A priest of the Magi named Artaban, one of the <u>Medes</u> from <u>Persia</u>, like the other Magi, sees signs in the heavens proclaiming that a King had been born among the Jews. He sets out to see the new-born ruler, carrying treasures to give as gifts to the child - a sapphire, a ruby, and a "<u>pearl of great price</u>". However, he stops along the way to help a dying man, which makes him late to meet with the caravan of the other three wise men. Because he missed the caravan, and can't cross the desert with only a horse, he is forced to sell one of his treasures in order to buy the camels and supplies necessary for the trip. He then commences his journey but arrives in Bethlehem too late as the child, with his parents, has fled to Egypt. He saves the life of a child at the price of another of his treasures.

He then travels to Egypt and to many other countries, searching for Jesus for many years and performing acts of charity along the way. After 33 years, Artaban is still a pilgrim and a seeker after light. He arrives in Jerusalem just in time for the crucifixion of Jesus.

He spends his last treasure, the pearl, to ransom a young woman from being sold into slavery. He is then struck in the head by a falling roof tile and is about to die, having failed in his quest to find Jesus, but having done much good through charitable works. A voice tells him "Verily I say unto thee, Inasmuch as thou hast done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, thou hast done it unto me." (Matthew 25:40) He dies in a calm radiance of wonder and joy. His treasures were accepted, and the Other Wise Man found his King.

(Habukkuk chapter 2 verse 14)

Top Tips for the New Year
