

one at a time, to store for the cold weather when food is less plentiful. They scrape a small hole in soft earth and bury their prize, patting the soil down on top to hide it from birds.




... and now a few other facts.....

T"S THAT TIME OF YEAR IN THE GARDEN!

October is a time of change in the garden; there is still plenty of bloom, and long may it last, but inevitably cooler weather is coming, for which we need to prepare. Hardy fuschias and penstemons can be helped through the winter with a mulch around the base of the plants. It's best to wait until the spring to cut the stems down to ground level, but I may tidy mine up a bit as they have put on so much growth this year. Shrubs that are cut back hard in the spring, like buddleias, can also be cut back a bit to let some light into the borders.

While the soil is still warm, those hardy perennials, which have finished flowering, can be cut down and the plants divided and replanted. It's best to use the outside, newer, parts of the plant as they will prove more vigorous than the central pieces. We still have lots of apples to pick, although they haven't grown as big as usual this year; perhaps we should have thinned the crop out more radically earlier on.

October is when we can expect the first frost! This will blacken the tender dahlias, which have provided such a wonderful show this year. They will need to be cut down to about six inches and the tubers lifted. I like to stand the tubers upside down for a day or two before putting them into frost-free storage.

Although this is the time to prepare for winter, it is also the best time to get the spring flowering bulbs into the warm soil, tulips can be left until next month, if necessary. In the vegetable garden, my runner beans are still producing a great crop, after a late start. I have finished lifting my potatoes – I tried a new variety this year, Kingsman, and they have done very well, providing a heavy crop of unblemished potatoes; the slugs don't seem to like them either!

Just a reminder that, if you are thinking about new shrubs, roses or fruit, this is the month to plant them. I am thinking of replacing some old gooseberry bushes, which did not produce much fruit this year.

I think I have mown the lawn fewer times this year than ever, even though we haven't had any real droughts; but it is still growing and will need further trims with the blades a bit higher to leave it longer. A dressing of autumn lawn food would help the roots develop. If there are any holes or hollows in the lawn, sprinkle some compost and fertiliser in them to encourage the grass to grow through; this can be repeated through the winter to gradually level them up.

Enjoy your garden.



SCAMS

TV Licensing

Fake emails claim the recipient has overpaid or is owed a refund which hasn't been paid because TV Licensing has the wrong bank account details. These are scams to steal bank and personal details.

Tech. Support

Phone calls, emails, or pop-up messages on your computer, claiming something wrong with your computer or internet connection.. There will either be a demand for payment to fix it, or they will install software on the computer which will allow the criminals to access personal and financial details.

Impersonation fraud

Fraudsters impersonate the police, (often claiming to be Hammersmith police station), bank staff, government agencies or utility companies and use their position to convince someone to transfer money out of their account or <u>click a dangerous link</u>. Inland Revenue and Customs and Excise scams often promise a sizeable tax refund or threaten you with arrest.

Parcel Delivery

E mails purporting to be from DPD and now also from Royal Mail about parcel re-delivery eg "We tried to deliver your parcel today but you weren't in or there was no safe place to leave it. Your action is required. If this item is unclaimed by the return date, then it will be returned to sender. To schedule a new delivery, a shipping fee must be paid." This is followed by a link to click to choose a re-delivery date. DON'T DO IT!!
