I wonder what you have missed most during Lockdown and indeed the continuation of this pandemic?

There has been some research to say that even those of us who were perhaps previously not the 'hugging' type, would really like to give someone a hug now. A hug is an act of holding someone tightly in one's arms, typically to express affection.

The first time I saw my grandsons at the start of this lockdown, they stood near their front door and I remained beside my car on the roadside. **‘TeaTime Church at Home’** is for families to share, worshipping and learning together, through songs, stories, dance and general fun.

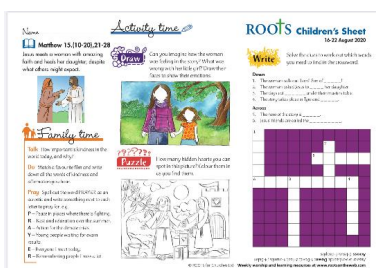
**‘StoryTime’** is for the kids, join in with the Three Bears, the Dinkey Donkey, the Gruffalo and many others.
