

"but in your hearts regard Christ the Lord as holy, ready at any time to give a defence to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you." 1 Peter 3.15 (Christian Standard Bible)

After a heart attack on October 24th 2016, I was admitted to Harrogate hospital. The problem was too complex for them so about a week later I was transferred to Leeds, where a few days later I had a double heart bypass operation. The transfer from Harrogate to Leeds was by ambulance and they came to the ward to collect me at about 5.00a.m., transferring not just me, but my paperwork. On my paperwork, next to occupation, it said Minister.

But even then, I was surprised, once installed in the back of the ambulance, when the ambulance man with me asked, "Are you a Christian Minister?"

When I replied "Yes" he immediately started questioning me on the difference between Christianity & Islam. So, for the roughly 40 minutes the transfer took we had a good discussion about the difference between the two religions. I was not at my best, as I has one artery 100% blocked and another 90% blocked, was rather tired after a week in hospital and that conversation was not what I expected!

I hoped my answers to his questions made sense, despite the circumstances, as 1 Peter 3.15 says.

I don't know, because I have never met the ambulance man again, and our discussion finished when the driver parked the ambulance, and then opened the back door when we arrived at the LGI. I was silently praying throughout our conversation for wisdom and guidance, so hopefully I was able to both defend our faith and share the hope that is in us, but was I ready?

If I had chosen the time and place to discuss our faith, it would have been when I was fit and well, feeling really good, over a nice cup of coffee in a relaxed setting.

Yet it is God who chooses the time and place, not us. So, that begs the question, are we ready to share the reason for the hope that is in us? Can we defend our faith in an increasingly secular world? Perhaps we would say Yes, in the right setting, at the right time when we are full of confidence and belief, but not in the middle of a trial.

But the scripture says 'ready at any time' so are we? Do we feel well qualified to share our faith in a positive manner whatever our personal circumstances? Do we know our bible well enough to feel comfortable discussing our faith with a complete stranger, at a moment's notice?

Perhaps we should think of the verse in 1 Peter 3.15 as a challenge. Perhaps we should pray that God will put us in the situation where a person does ask us to defend our faith, and give a reason for the hope that is in us?

The Methodist Church, and Methodists, have always been outward looking and wanting to reach out to other people, in love, to share their belief in God.

As we get back to normal in our churches after the last 18 months, wouldn't it be great if we had those type of conversations, and saw new people joining us as a result.

Finally, thanks to God and the wonderful team at the LGI, I have fully recovered. Kind Regards.

Both will be available from the <u>Tadcaster Circuit website</u>, and Circuit and Church Face-Book pages.


