Matthew 22:1-14

22 Once more Jesus spoke to them in parables, saying: **2** “The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who gave a wedding banquet for his son. **3** He sent his slaves to call those who had been invited to the wedding banquet, but they would not come. **4** Again he sent other slaves, saying, ‘Tell those who have been invited: Look, I have prepared my dinner, my oxen and my fat calves have been slaughtered, and everything is ready; come to the wedding banquet.’ **5** But they made light of it and went away, one to his farm, another to his business, **6** while the rest seized his slaves, mistreated them, and killed them. **7** The king was enraged. He sent his troops, destroyed those murderers, and burned their city. **8** Then he said to his slaves, ‘The wedding is ready, but those invited were not worthy. **9** Go therefore into the main streets, and invite everyone you find to the wedding banquet.’ **10** Those slaves went out into the streets and gathered all whom they found, both good and bad; so the wedding hall was filled with guests.

11 “But when the king came in to see the guests, he noticed a man there who was not wearing a wedding robe, **12** and he said to him, ‘Friend, how did you get in here without a wedding robe?’ And he was speechless. **13** Then the king said to the attendants, ‘Bind him hand and foot, and throw him into the outer darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth.’ **14** For many are called, but few are chosen.”⁴

Reflections on the readings:

I wonder where we place ourselves within today’s Gospel story – this story that Jesus told. The key characters are:

- The pre-invited guests who didn’t turn up.
- The second group made up of the good and the bad.
- The one banished as he wasn’t dressed appropriately.

Which one are you?

Let’s see.

Jesus told this story in the Temple to a group of Jewish religious leaders, and it is the third story of a small group, including the parable of the two sons and also the parable of the tenants. In each story the Jewish leaders were placed under judgement. Interestingly the stories come immediately after the triumphal entry into Jerusalem and the cleansing of the holy Temple by Jesus. So the Messiah confronts the Jewish authorities by his words and his actions.

I wonder if we find ourselves associating with the second group in the story. Priding ourselves on the fact that we can spot the first guest’s mistake, amazed that they could not see Jesus for who he was..... Hold fire though because one of our group has been picked out as he wasn’t wearing the right clothes. This doesn’t seem to resonate with how we see the hospitality of the kingdom, or the grace of a compassionate God. So we might discriminate against him as an outsider of the fold assuming him to be part of the first group or a foreigner to our group.

This story begins pleasantly enough, after all we all enjoy a good wedding. Our daughter got married this year, and for their friends and family to meet in one place was joyous. However the wedding described here for the king's son turns sour, because the guests didn't turn up and within the second group there was an infiltrator who was banished into the outer darkness. Those who want a simple happy ending will be disappointed today.

If we assume the first group are the Jews, and the second group are the Gentiles, then we can conclude that everyone was invited to the banquet. Therefore God's grace is sufficient for ALL, but there has to be a response, such an invite demands a reaction. There needs to be a transformative dimension to such grace. If that grace is not taken up or accepted then there are consequences. The person inappropriately dressed whilst offered grace did not accept it, he did not become obedient, nor was he clothed with Christ. Galatians 3:27, "If we are baptized into Christ, we are clothed with Christ" that relationship becomes transformational.

The challenging element of this passage is that whilst we might associate with the second group who were welcomed in, we each have the potential to be the third person or the first group who turn their back on the invite, ignore grace and are indifferent to the selfless act of love of Jesus on the cross. We have been invited to the banquet, we have a duty not to wallow in that position but to clothe ourselves with Christ and allow grace to be a part of our lives and our interactions with others. This day and every day. **Amen.**⁵

Everlasting God, we come to you, as a world and a people in need. We approach, seeking acceptance, forgiveness, inspiration and a fresh hope for the week ahead.

God of firm foundations, help us to remain grounded in you, in our thoughts, words and actions. By your Spirit, we look to you to guide us as we reach out to those in need and stand with the fearful.
