Dear friends,

As we move through the period between Christmas and Lent Brian McLaren's book, We Make the Road by Walking, asks us to think about the Kingdom of God or the Kingdom of heaven and the ways in which Jesus taught and opened people's eyes to its possibilities and reality.

When you hear the phrase 'Kingdom of heaven' I wonder what comes immediately to mind. As you read this are you wondering if it will be another pious minister's letter concentrating on an hypothetical future other worldly event with no relevance to today? Do you feel warmed by the promise that no matter what happens in this world everything will be alright in the next? Do you hear a call to arms to work for God's life in the here and now?

In Mark's Gospel the early chapters seem to focus on a headlong rush through miraculous acts with the writer showing again and again how the text from Isaiah that Jesus reads in the synagogue in the other Gospels is coming true. The blind see, the deaf hear, women to ill to leave their beds get up healed and make the lunch. It's as if the gospel writer is saying 'here is God's kingdom' 'Here is heaven'. When we read of the Early Church in Acts we see another image of God's kingdom on earth as the church organises itself to look after the widow and the orphan, to share all they have, to heal, pray and worship.

So what about now? If people look for God's kingdom in Kingsdown and the community around us where can it be found? Where is compassion shown? Where are the vulnerable listened to and cared for? Where are all welcomed to be part of God's great commonwealth?

Look around you at the community activities and the love that is shown within them. Think of Babies and Toddlers, the fellowship on Tuesday afternoons, the night shelter, at the neighbours we support in loving conversations and the work done by each person day to day. What resounds with God's love? And what gets in the way of God's love?

In Lent this year let us try to open our eyes to God's kingdom within us and around us and let us abandon those things which get in its way. God bless.

From the Church Council

The most recent Church Council meeting was held on 1st December 2015 and was attended by 12 members of the Council (out a total of 24), plus 2 representatives from the King's Hall Class Meeting.

First of all, some comments about church structure. Rachel decided to speak about this because from time to time various people have questioned the need to put issues to the Church Council for decision. In line with the Constitutional Practice and Discipline of the Methodist Church (aka 'CPD'), the Church Council is the central decision making body of the church and all decisions must go through the Council. This makes sure that the church works together and avoids confusion. In between Church Council meetings, the Church Stewards are able to act in the name of the Council on day to day or urgent matters. However, when questions of church policy arise, these should always be put to the Council.

The church also has committees, ie Pastoral, Property, Finance and World Service & Mission committees, to which authority has been delegated to act within limits set by the Church Council. These committees however, should only act within those limits – any matters which go beyond their delegated authorities have to be referred to the Church Council.

Whilst on the subject of committees, the Pastoral Committee still needs a new secretary to replace Derek Matthews. It's not an onerous role and, if you are interested Derek will be happy to tell you what it involves.

Secondly, the Council decided to change the remit of the World Service & Mission committee. At present, this committee focuses entirely on almost charitable fundraising and giving. This means that there is no group exercising broad oversight of outreach and social events (eg Trader's Day) or existing groups within the church (Babies & Toddlers, Tuesday Club). Oversight of such events and groups has therefore been exercised by the Church Council. It was agreed that the World Service & Mission committee should be re-structured to focus on outreach as well as charitable giving. This will require a new balance between the two aspects of its work. The new structure will be implemented from 1st September.

The Council discussed whether to set up a Worship Consultation group which could consider what worship should be, our style of worship, problems/issues regarding worship, the use of AV system etc. In this context, it's worth noting that in future the Methodist Church intends that congregations should have greater influence over how worship is conducted at their churches, thus shifting the balance away from preachers. It was agreed that in the first instance, everyone should be invited to an after church consultation session (possibly 2 per annum). Rachel will set a suitable date for a first meeting.

Finally, on the subject of groups, the Council discussed whether we should set up another 'home group' as a small number of people have asked if this would be possible. Kingsdown currently has one active home group (run by Steve & Liz Palmer) and a second which Ivy Hanson has been intending to restart. It was agreed that the level of support for another group should be investigated first. Rachel will put out a notice and sign-up sheet. In the meantime, Sunday evening Bible Studies started meeting again on 17th January at 6.00pm – these are fortnightly and everyone is welcomel

On more mundane matters, the Council agreed a formal Reserves Policy, which Charity Law now requires us to have. In short, Kingsdown will aim to maintain a general reserve equal to half of annual expenditure excluding major repairs. As you will all have noticed, the plastic lettering giving our church's name on the front of the building started falling off last year and has now been removed completely. Council agreed that there should be a new name sign but in a different form with more prominent colours and not using plastic letters. Property Committee was requested to develop detailed proposals. It was also agreed that the large front cross will be re-varnished.

One of the things we have to pay attention to, especially following the recent Past Cases Review is safeguarding. This means updating our church safeguarding policy and also making sure that everyone who should have an up-to-date 'DBS' check has one. Sybil Corbin is following this up.

Another thing we have to do these days is pay more attention to fire safety and this includes holding fire drills to test our evacuation procedures. This means that at some point, and you won't be told when, we must hold a fire drill. Be warned! First, though our evacuation procedures will be republicised, so pay attention to them when they come out!

The next Church Council meeting will be held on 3rd March.

Statement of Safeguarding Principles

(Transcript from original document)

The Church of England and The Methodist Church work in partnership with other Christian Churches and other agencies in delivering safeguarding. The following statement of principles appears at the head of each safeguarding policy.

We are committed to:

The care, nurture of, and respectful pastoral ministry with, all children, young people and all adults.

The safeguarding and protection of all children, young people and all adults

The establishing of safe, caring communities which provide a loving environment where victims of abuse can report or disclose abuse and where they can find support and best practice that contributes to the prevention of abuse.

What is our next step?

We are updating our files, some members who hold offices will need to have a new Criminal Record Check, and renewal is every 5 year, according to the Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) rules.

In the meantime, I shall be in touch with the relevant holders to discuss the process and preparation in readiness for Rev.Rachel Bending's input and Signature.

Commissioning of the Southall Christian Schools Worker: an initiative for Faith Engagement in Secondary Education, shared by the Ealing Trinity Circuit and the Southall Group of the Church of England

The Revd Karen Greenidge was welcomed and licensed as our lead education worker to direct engagement with secondary schools in Southall, Middlesex, on Sunday 17 January 2016 at Emmanuel Church, Southall.

Standing alongside the RE provision and school chaplaincies, Karen will develop curriculum, recruit faith ambassadors among students, be a bridge for interfaith leaders' access to schools and interfaith participation. She will also be present in the existing Methodist and Anglican congregations to support parents and our mission in Southall secondary schools, working against radicalisation and for a critical, mature faith among all believers involved in education.

This post has been three years in development and is supported financially by the Ealing Trinity Circuit, the District Advance Fund, and the All Saints Educational Trust, along with the Southall Group Ministry of the Church of England.

CHRISTMAS APPEAL - 2015



The 2015 Christmas Appeal was for work in Nigeria where malaria kills more than 1,000 children EVERY day.

Mary lost two young children to malaria though their deaths were preventable. An insecticide treated bed net costing just a few pounds (5 nets for $\pounds 15$) can save children from the agony of deadly malaria - but OUR help is needed to provide them. And every gift Christian Aid has received this Christmas will be matched by the UK Government (up to $\pounds 3m$).

When you come to church you hear hymns. Hymns are songs of praise to God. Some are very old and some, like the ones you may sing at school, are new.

Have you ever wondered who wrote the hymns we sing? For example, one hymn writer was Mrs Cecil Frances Alexander, the wife of the Bishop of Londonderry. She wrote a book called 'Hymns for Little Children' which was dedicated to her godchildren. The book was published in 1848 and contained hymns that we know well today; 'All Things Bright and Beautiful', 'Once in Royal David's City' and 'There is a Green Hill Far Away'.

It is said that she wrote the last hymn because of the view from the Bishop's palace. The house looked out over the city walls to the green hills in the distance.

So the words we sing today come from the view that Mrs Alexander had from her window.
