

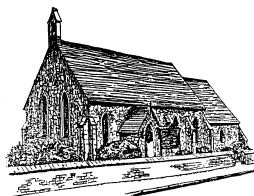

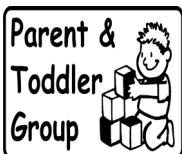

Pastoral Letter written by Michael Webb

A Picture of God

“Ah, Autumn the season of mists and mellow fruitfulness.”

So begins a famous TV advert for Mr Kipling Bramley Apple Pies from 1990. I am writing in August on a very hot day and a season of mists and mellow fruitfulness seems a long way away! But, by the time you read this it will be September, the first month of autumn. The air will be that bit thinner and children will be returning to school. Advent won't be that far away!

When I was a small boy, one of my best presents was a Junior Scrabble. I recently looked it up on e-Bay. 1960's version! ... it took me right back! Junior Scrabble has picture clue prompts for the words. So Z is for Zebra and the letter Z has a picture of a zebra on the board. C is for Crow; F is for Flag and so on. It is memorable and brings together words and pictures very powerfully. A bit like those maps of the world that uses animals to represent countries like Pandas for China and Kangaroos for Australia. I really enjoy these as well!!

If you look back at the first paragraph, I used the letter A quite a lot, and the nouns each have quite vivid pictures linked with them. A is for Apple; A is for Autumn, the season of mists and mellow fruitfulness; A is for August and it is a very hot day; A is for Advent...crikey, time is passing, the end of the year is approaching and we look forward to our Lord's Second Coming and the build up to His Nativity at Christmas!

It is important in our discipleship that we have vivid, powerful pictures of who God is and our relationship with Him. They are part of His Story, Our Story. They deepen our trust, our walk with him in good times and bad. I sometimes use almost like an A-Z of God in my mind and heart. So, A is for Abba, A is for Alpha (and Omega), A is for Almighty. The one that resonates most with me right now is A is for Able. For God is Able. Able to turn despair to hope, darkness to light, mourning to joy.

God is Able to break chains.

Jesus stood up in the synagogue in Nazareth and said: “The Spirit of the Lord is on me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to set the oppressed free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour.” Luke 4:18. (A is for Anointed). Wow! What a picture of who God is, his commissioning of Jesus and Jesus' understanding of his job description!

Jesus knew that God is Able.

We are able to see who God is and what he has done for us in the Bible and the witness of the saints. Recently I have come across the expression “standing on the shoulders of giants” several times. It is attributed to St Bernard of Chartres in the 12th Century. It means using the understanding gained by major thinkers who have gone before in order to make intellectual progress. As disciples of Jesus we literally stand on the shoulders of the saints who developed a close relationship with God – they had a very vivid picture of God because of their walk with Jesus – in his life, death, resurrection and ascension – and then in the coming of the Holy Spirit.

In September, one thread of the lectionary follows the rapid growth of the early church in the Book of Acts – it had such a vivid picture of Jesus Christ. We hear the story of St Paul’s conversion on the road to Damascus on 1 September. He was persecuting the church. Jesus appeared before him and Paul turned to Christ. He knew God was able to take “the worst of sinners” (Paul’s description of himself in 1 Timothy 1:15) and able to transform him. And on 21 September we remember St Matthew - Apostle and Evangelist. Matthew, the despised and marginalised tax collector. Matthew recognised that Jesus was able to transform the poverty of his existence. He then lived the life that Jesus promised (“I have come that they may have life. And have it to the full.” John 10:10).

So what picture or pictures of God sustain you in your walk with Him?

If you don’t have one or if yours need a bit of refreshing, ask God to give you an image or a picture of Him, his nature, his mission, your relationship with Him. He will be delighted 😊. It may come from the Bible, creation, a song, the witness of others and so on. Whatever it is, it will be right for you! A few years ago, I had been asking God this question: “Who are your Lord?” The answer I received was a series of vivid pictures of God 😊.

It changed my life –

It was the Navigators guide to the Names and Attributes of God - a simple sentence and a very short Bible verse to chew on each day for 30 days. The link for it is [here](#). It is free to download and distribute. I used it one month as a guide for daily reading and praying.

To download a PDF copy visit “navlink.org/names-of-God” and click on the PDF symbol.

“If you seek God, you will find Him” (He promises this in Jeremiah 29:13... it was our verse for the year a few years ago!)

Have a blessed and joyful time in September, asking God for a picture of your walk and for the church as a whole, as we seek to draw close to the Lord and his mission.

Sadly that meant that we had to make our Part-time Youth Worker role, held by the wonderful Katy Thomas, redundant. Our Children and Families Worker role was a fixed one-year contract which ended in August so we did not renew that contract also. This role was held by the dynamic, bundle of energy that is Bethany Wood.

Over the summer we have been recruiting for the new combined role of *Youth, Children and Families Minister*, and we are delighted to announce that Bethany has been appointed and started in the role immediately from the end of her previous fixed term contract.

A Word of Thanks To Katy Thomas:

Katy Thomas has done a tremendous job as our Part-time Youth Worker over the years. It has been wonderful to see her coming alongside the young people, befriending them and supporting them through the angst and excitement of their teenage years. Katy has done SO much more for us than just Youth



Work. She's been the go-to person for most of our Tech issues, is always keen to offer a helping hand when it is needed. and has been a loving and enthusiastic member of our Staff Team here at All Saints'.

Katy was a part of the decision making relating to her role being made redundant, and we could not have asked for a more gracious, supportive response, full of integrity in her handling of the whole situation. When the PCC made the decision Katy asked, "Can I say something?" She then affirmed the PCC in their decision saying, "I believe that this is the right decision!"

Thank you Katy for all that you have given, sacrificed, and done to serve others and to serve All Saints' over the years! You've been such a blessing to so many people, and we are sure you will continue to be such wherever you go and whatever you do next.

We are so sad that we've had to let you go but we know God had wonderful plans for you for the future.

It seems fitting to let the Young People to have the final say on Katy's impact she has had as a Youth Worker here at All Saints. They said... *"Katie genuinely cares about young people and the things they are going through."*

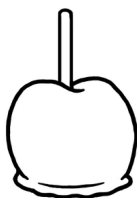

Apples are in season and, if you are lucky, either you or a neighbour have a tree! You can do lots with apples—here are a few suggestions that might make a change to the traditional apple pie or crumble.



- Spice up your apple crumble and by adding a teaspoon of mixed spice to the crumble mixture.
- Give your apple pie an autumn feel by including some mincemeat with the apple.
- Mix up some batter and fry up some apple fritters.
- Large cooking apples are perfect for baking. Core and fill with mixed dried fruit mixed with sugar and a pinch of cinnamon or mixed spice.
- Stewed apple mixes well with rhubarb, gooseberries and other fruits—makes more expensive fruits go a bit further.
- And what about homemade toffee apples! For 8 apples, you need 400g golden caster sugar, 1 tsp vinegar and 4 tbsp golden syrup

Place the apples in a large bowl, then cover with boiling water to remove any waxy coating and help the caramel to stick. Dry thoroughly and twist off any stalks. Push a wooden skewer or lolly stick into the stalk end of each apple.



Heat sugar in a pan with 100ml water until sugar dissolves, then stir in the vinegar and syrup. Test the toffee by pouring a little into a bowl of cold water. It should harden instantly and, when removed, be brittle and easy to break. Continue to boil until it tests successfully.

Dip and twist each apple in hot toffee until covered, place on greaseproof paper to harden. Leave to cool before eating.

Have you heard of or tried Parcel Monkey? It's a parcel delivery comparison site for the UK and overseas.

I sent a heavy, 10kg, parcel to Germany this week. The total cost was £14.63 including pick up from the house. So it could have been even cheaper if we'd taken it to a Post Office. It went by Parcel Force International 2-day service with tracking. Basic insurance was included but add-ons were available at very reasonable prices.

The same service booking directly with Parcel Force online would have been £58.44!!

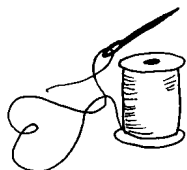

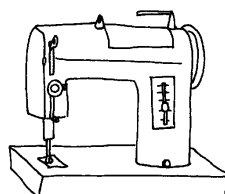

Anne Sharp says that she has been advising hearing patients who attend St Peter's to send them a stamped addressed envelope and a note stating what is required. Regarding Royal Surrey, she now has this information:

Email: rsc-tr.Audiology@nhs.net or phone: 04183 464108. If you need hearing aid batteries or replacement tubes please contact the department and they will send them by first class post. Make sure you include the following information in your message: Name, address, date of birth, type of batteries/tubes. *Hearing aid batteries cannot be collected from the hospital so please do not come to the hospital unless you have an appointment.*

Hearing aid repairs Royal Surrey: Postal repairs - you can post your aids to be repaired and they will be returned by post. It may take up to 2 weeks and if it has been over 2 weeks you will need to contact the department. Booked repair appointment - You can book a repair appointment and current waiting time is between 2-3 weeks

Walk in Repair Clinic and Drop Off service are NOT running.

Lost hearing aids: If you have lost one or both of your hearing aids and are a Royal Surrey patient, please email the Royal Surrey and they can let you know if replacements can be posted or if you need to be booked in for an appointment.

CHILDHOOD MEMORIES

Having read some of my mother's memoirs in the August magazine, Katrina Allen has sent in a few of her memories. Would you like to share yours as well? We would love to hear them.

Mum and Dad got married in 1946, and I arrived 10 months later. The oldest of four children. We lived in Hillingdon, which was then in Middlesex, but when Middlesex ceased to exist, in 1965, the name Hillingdon was used to name the most westerly of the 32 London Boroughs. We lived in a nice little close, which was shaped like a reverse 'J', so No. 14 ended up being next to No. 27. No No. 13, so the builders must have been very superstitious.

As a girl, I went to Sunday School/church at All Saints, in Long Lane. This entailed quite a long walk, mostly across Hillingdon Court Park, passing the tennis courts, which I adored, and the bowls green. It was a High Church, so I recall the swinging of incense there. Rev. Boggis seemed to be there 'for ever'. He had a German wife and four daughters. Angela, the third born, was in my class at school, and Celia, the youngest, was in my brother Roger's class.

Once a week, Mum would go to Howard Roberts' Grocery Store, with her order, and this would be delivered on Friday mornings, by Barbara, in her van. Mr. & Mrs. Nash ran the shop, and would let you have a taster of their cheeses. They were a lovely, childless couple, and were always very nice to us children. Best treat was a bag of Smith's crisps with a tiny blue pack of salt, or maybe a Lyon's chocolate cupcake.

I only recall having one doll, who I called Mary, but my favourite toy was my scooter. Much stouter than today's scooters, with a brake on the back wheel – just as well, as we lived on a hill! What I loved best was playing two-balls or three-balls up against the garage door, or playing tennis in the road, much to the annoyance of Mr. & Mrs. Stone at No. 6. Life was so simple then.

LOCAL NEWS—

Update from Retirement Villages Group regarding the Sheer House Redevelopment:



In an effort to respond to local concerns about safety and security at Sheer House, they have decided to hoard the site early. This is to address the reported instances of anti-social behaviour and ensure the safety and well-being of neighbouring residents and businesses.

The hoarding will initially be plain and installed in concreted drums to avoid damage to the ground. Graphics will be added at a later date. The hoarding contractor is aware of the historic notice boards which are situated on Station Approach Road and will look to install the hoarding behind these boards so that they can still be used by the community. If for any reason this is not possible they will re-provide something similar on the hoarding for public use.

It would appear that the Retirement Villages Group are interested in the views of the community, willing to listen and wishing to be a long-term community partner. They have stressed that they are not just developers but are managing an ongoing business which involves a continuing commitment to the West Byfleet community. It is their intention to provide leisure facilities, such as a fitness or wellness centre, and they are very keen to make this available to all and not just the Sheer House residents.

Victoria Public House—Following recent activity at the site, we are told that there will soon be a full press release regarding the re-opening of this venue.

The Appeal has received donations over £760,000, which is humbling, and a great tribute to the generosity of individual members and Dioceses. This has given the Trustees the gift of time to ensure that the central charity is restructured and refocused to live within its means through a recessionary period, MU has had to do some hard thinking and sadly staffing levels need to be reduced considerably, to save employment costs. Some have opted for voluntary redundancy but further reduction is needed; a consultation process has started which will lead to about a third of the staff leaving by November 2020.

We have been greatly encouraged by the response to Mothers' Union becoming an official partner of the /Together Coalition, alongside the NHS, Church, CBI, and charities such as the Guides and Scouts. We are very much looking forward to supporting the coalition in its mission to build a kinder, closer, and more connected society throughout 2020 and beyond.

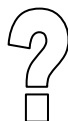

Walking around Surrey - take in a little history whilst Runnymede Meadows.

Magna Carta Island

No one knows exactly where Magna Carta was sealed, but while the barons were mustered on Runnymede Meadows, King John and his men occupied the opposite bank, on a stretch of land now called Magna Carta Island. Inside the Gothic cottage on the island, which was built in 1834, there is a flat stone slab called the Charter Stone inscribed with the words:



"BE IT REMEMBERED, THAT ON THIS ISLAND
25 JUNE 1213, JOHN KING OF ENGLAND SIGNED
MAGNA CARTA; AND IN THE YEAR 1834, THIS BUILDING
WAS ERECTED IN COMMEMORATION OF THE GREAT AND
IMPORTANT EVENT,
BY GEORGE SIMON HARCOURT, ESQ LORD OF THIS
MANOR, AND THEN HIGH SHERIFF OF THIS COUNTY".

Ankerwyke

A little further downstream on the left bank are the scant remains of ANKERWYKE PRIORY, founded in the reign of Henry II for Benedictine nuns. The priory was built right next to the venerable Ankerwyke yew tree, still standing after 2000 years!!

From the historic meadows of Runnymede the river Thames now runs under the M25. Next the river skirts HOLM ISLAND, with a little house on it called THE NEST, once used as a secret hideaway by the future Edward VIII and Wallace Simpson, and enters Staines.
