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## From the Manse continued....

Change has been a big part of our lives over the last few years; marriage, moving country, learning a new language and culture, beginning new jobs, and having a baby! When I stop and look back I can't help but gasp and think... 'wow, how did we do all that?!' and yet that is not where our story ends...

When I was called into ministry, almost 7 years ago now, I had no idea where that parish would be that I would call home. Today, as I sit writing this article from the manse, in a place where my family and I now call home, I thank God that he gave me the courage to follow Jesus, one step at a time, because little did I know that all along, he was leading me here, to you all. God's plan really is the best!

So, no matter what changes have been thrust upon your life, or even the ones you've been privy too, know that when you place your wholehearted trust in God to lead you forward in His plan, all you have to do is follow, one step at a time. When you do, you'll wonder how you got to where you are, then realise that Jesus walked the whole way by your side.

'Faith is a journey', as Fiona so beautifully put it during a recent all-age talk. My family and I are just so excited to be sharing that journey, with you.

## **Music and Worship Team**

While it has been difficult to keep going during COVID, our Music and Worship Team has been working on a number of developments. Our main focus, in conjunction with a specially formed 'Tech Team' (members of the Fabric Team, M&W, and Alasdair Bain) has been to look at the AV equipment in our church. This has been time consuming, sometimes difficult, and annoyingly interrupted by lockdowns limiting access to the church. However, we now have a very fit for purpose new AV system which has been installed by RNTS, a not for profit organisation based at Renfrew North Parish Church. This is allowing us easily to record and stream services, and also to project images, words of hymns, readings, videos, notices etc. This is a huge step change for us. We look forward to working with Jade to further develop this. I hope if you have been in church you have been able to appreciate how much this is enhancing our worship.

We have a small team of sometimes terrified operators for the system (the Dongle Group!). If you have an interest in AV and would like to join the team - no experience required - please contact me. We would welcome others on the team. I would like to express my grateful thanks to the Tech Team and the Dongle Group for making all this happen.

Our other major interest over the past few months has been to think about supporting our minister in relation to worship. As you will know, Alan McKay ably leads a number of services for us. I'm very pleased to let you know that Fiona McCrae, another one of our Elders, has enrolled in a Worship Leaders Course run by Trinity College, Glasgow. This means that both Alan and Fiona will be able to assist Jade in leading services. We are also looking at expanding congregational input - we have re-instated our Bible reading rota after the relaxation of COVID restrictions - and we are looking to re-start a prayer rota. Our Kairos services will re-start in October, and we await further developments there as well.

These are exciting times in EPC in relation to Music and Worship. We look forward in faith, with Jade's leadership, to the future.

## **Caring for the Servants**

How do we look after our "servants"? In recent months we've become more aware of the people who serve us; from shop assistants to politicians, medics to refuse collectors. Of course we wouldn't call them "servants", but how we need the services they offer!

What about church? While we stayed at home, many worked away unseen, constantly updating guidelines, measuring, cleaning, counting, organising Zoom meetings... And what of those looking after our spiritual wellbeing? They too needed to adjust and take on new technology to encourage us with God's word; comfort the sick and dying, and look after the bereaved and broken in very restricted circumstances.

As we welcome a new minister, it seems a good time to think about how we encourage, support and generally care for those who care for us. People who go into Christian service don't do it for the money or prestige. Rather they come with a "servant heart", through a sense of vocation. "Vocation is response to a call from beyond oneself to use one's strengths and gifts to make the world a better place." (Roger Ebertz). Paul the apostle made it clear that his service wasn't always acknowledged. However, Romans 16 tells of the people he truly appreciated: "Greet Priscilla and Aquila, my fellow workers in Christ Jesus. They risked their lives for me." (Romans 16:3).

As Christians, we are automatically enrolled as servants and fellow workers in Christ's kingdom. So rather than being passengers, we are all involved in the commission to spread the gospel. We're also called to "love one another". (John13:34). Can we love our fellow workers without "exploiting the servant heart"? Traditionally, servants were those who worked "below stairs". Strangely, we seem to imagine a heavenly penthouse, where Christian leaders are elevated to become superhuman; to be ever available and never complaining. While work done in public is obvious, only a fraction of what they do is seen by others.

So how can we care for those who serve us? Rather than being backseat drivers, let's be ready to serve alongside them, helping and encouraging those with particular responsibilities. Here are a few ideas to start with:

- Send an encouraging message when you've been helped by a service.
- Pray regularly for Jade and her family, and for those with special responsibilities.
- Do simple things like following the Bible reading in church, or offering to help in some way.
- Engage the imagination, remembering that leaders are approached with all kinds of problems and requests for help at random times.

In doing these things we will all know God's blessings and "be mutually encouraged by each other's faith." Romans 1:12

## **Ordination and Induction Thursday Sept 9th**

The ordination and induction of our new minister was a formal but very meaningful service arranged by Glasgow Presbytery. It concluded with 'Charges' to both minister and congregation from Robert Hynd, Moderator of the Presbytery of Glasgow. The following is a summary of these charges. The full texts can be seen on the church website.

#### To Jade Ableitner....

In addressing Jade Mr Hynd recognised the long history of Christian presence in Eaglesham and commented on her own upbringing within the church. His charges were three-fold.

Firstly 'a prayer that the joy and excitement of this new calling should be yours in every day of your ministry to come.' He gave thanks for Jade's late mother who had encouraged her in the calling to Ministry recalling that in the words of George Macleod "A veil as thin as gossamer separates those who have gone from the sight of earthly eyes. They, in God's nearer presence, still worship with us in the mystery of one family in heaven and on earth"

And then family and husband Eric's roots in Minnesota - a place of long, cold winters and short, warm summers that makes for honest men. 'So my next charge to you is that at some time, soon, once this pestilential pandemic is over and travel to the USA resumes, you and Eric should get Fred over to see his family in Minnesota for Fred has not yet been able to meet them. If you take time for yourself and your family you will better serve God's people in this place.

In conclusion... 'Jade, I already know from having spent a little time with you that you will always seek to be worthy of your calling. So with a humble spirit and grateful heart, work for the building up of the body of Christ. Together with the people to whom you are bound, share in the ministry of the reconciliation of all things in Christ Jesus. Care for the people in your charge. As you exercise your own gifts, encourage them to seek out and to use their own particular gifts. As you pray continually for them, gratefully receive the love and strength they also offer you.




## And charges to the Congregation....

## **COP26. A Christian Perspective**

This meeting, organised by Eastwood Ecumenical Peace and Justice forum, was held in Maxwell Mearns church and live streamed via their youtube channel. It can still be viewed on youtube by searching with the title. Well worth watching.

### As Christians why should we care

Rev David Coleman who is chaplain to Eco-congregation Scotland gave a challenging interpretation of what the Christian message means for environmental responsibility. He quoted Pope Francis...'Praise be to you my Lord through our sister mother earth who sustains and governs us.' Our relationship to nature is one of a challenging partnership rather than comfortable stewardship. This does not deny the special place of man in creation. We have a responsibility for 'the fish in the sea, the birds of heaven and every living thing'. And there are too many of us to just let nature take its course. We have a duty to respond to the suffering of earth. 'If my disciples keep silence the stones will shout aloud' Luke 19,40. With environmental damage there is injustice harming the people, creatures and land which God has gifted to us. That is sin. And who are the sinners? In our fossil fuel driven life it is ourselves. In response we cannot hesitate while looking for perfection but must take steps forward. This care for creation is integral to any and all creeds of Christianity.

#### What is COP26 about and how can we be involved

Adrian Shaw referred to the very useful briefing on Eco-congregation Scotland website.

Glasgow Oct31 - Nov12. Conference of Parties. That this is the 26th meeting illustrates slow progress. The challenge is that with current commitments to change the estimated global warming is 2.7C compared with the 1.5 aim agreed in Paris in 2015. Debate will revolve round mitigation (reducing emissions), adaptation to changing climate, and compensation for loss and damage. And central will be financial support for the poorer nations who are less responsible for but more exposed to damage from climate change.

There are various ways in which churches and individuals can be involved

- · learning becoming informed
- prayer for strength in our weakness, for leadership
- worship with a climate focussed service
- · hospitality with a shortage of affordable accommodation
- Nov 6th. Global day of action including Glasgow demonstration
- take action to reduce carbon footprint



#### What can we do in East Renfrewshire?

Sam Ibbott is recently appointed ER Climate Change Officer.

In line with national legislation East Ren must reach net zero by 2045 with an intermediate target of 75% reduction by 2030. This applies to all emissions within the Council area but the starting point for action are the areas of direct Council responsibility with a pre-Covid baseline - rather than the artificially reduced emissions of the last year. Work is at an early stage with targeted discussions with each department and planned public consultation in early 2022. The Council does have other levers through infrastructure planning and encouraging behavioural change. And it can address the huge issue of supply chains - emissions created elsewhere on our behalf. What can the public and individuals do? Engage, engage, engage. Contact Councillors - they decide and agree funding, respond to consultations, make it an issue at the time of May 22 local elections.

Rev Dr Martin Johnstone is the CofS Ambassador specially appointed to COP26. He gave a short but impassioned presentation to Glasgow Presbytery. It can be viewed via the news and events / latest news link on the presbytery website. Two quotes

- if we spend more time trying to save our churches than trying to save our planet we will be guilty of what Nero did fiddling while Rome burned
- the Church needs to act as if it believed that God made the world.

### **Local comment from Marlies MacLean**

The saline current, which gives us the benefits of the Gulf Stream, starts near the southern tip of As the Greenland ice sheet melt Iceland. accelerates, fresh water pooling in this region threatens to stall the ocean system of currents. This is thought to be one of a number of global climate tipping points". (Gillian Burke, BBC Wildlife Magazine)

We can and must each do our best to fight climate change. The cheapest, and most healthy, might be to walk more; the next, to add insulated curtain linings; the most effective, if feasible, is ground source (best) or air source heating for which grants are available. There is a great number of other possibilities, such as buying the most eco-friendly electrical appliances, but please do something.

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## **Health and Safety Update**



How many of you remember Neil Sedaka's song 'Breaking up is hard to do'? Well, in terms of Health and Safety, 'Starting up is hard to do'. It's wonderful that we are now getting back to some kind of normality in our church life. We can now worship without any restrictions on numbers in church. We do not need to adhere to social distancing, but the Church of Scotland does recommend that we consider 1M distancing and that we certainly are respectful for individual preferences. Indeed, being in church on 26th September, I saw exactly that in operation. We are still required to wear face coverings in Church Buildings apart from a few exceptions. The Church of Scotland is in dialogue with the Scottish Government to put the case that this seems very unfair to worshippers given the relaxation on coverings in other circumstances. Watch this space!

Our other buildings are now open and we have a number of new groups starting. All are aware of the H&S requirements. This is heartening, but now is not the time to relax!

I'm sure we all know friends and family who are maybe fearful of coming to church or venturing out, so it's important that we make sure that our church buildings are as safe as they can be in this ever changing situation. It can be difficult to keep up with guidance from Church of Scotland and the Scottish Government, so I'd like to thank our organisational leaders for their forbearance while I find information out for them. The Church of Scotland COVID Team have also been very helpful in answering questions. And Jim and the Fabric Team, plus Ann Robertson (our Halls Convener) have worked their socks off.

I get a number of comments and I welcome all of them! Some people are concerned that we are being too 'liberal' in relaxing restrictions, while others feel that we are being too cautious. I appreciate both of these points of view. I think they indicate a range of views on risk. My advice, apart from all the H&S stuff, is that, as Christians, we should take account of others' concerns and frustrations and behave accordingly in a supportive and thoughtful way.

## **Pastoral Care Team**

#### **Recent Pastoral Care Activities**

As reported in previous issues we have been limited in what we have been able to do during the pandemic due to Church of Scotland restrictions. However, some things have been maintained. For example, flowers have been distributed on a regular basis to members who have suffered a bereavement or illness or to commemorate happy events, such as an anniversary. The Walking Group has reconvened with a recent walk within the locality. Support to the Carswell Food Bank continues to be provided by members of the Pastoral Care (PC) Team as demand for these services remains high. The annual Harvest Thanksgiving Service is scheduled for Sunday 10<sup>th</sup> October and the PC Team will help coordinate the collection and distribution of gifts to those in need locally and to the Lodging House Mission, a charity for homeless people located in the East End of Glasgow.

#### **Volunteers Wanted as Kirk Carers**

As we emerge from pandemic restrictions, the intention is to reinstate the offer of pastoral care to the congregation through Kirk Carers. This will include visits to members who are isolated or lonely and would benefit from some additional company to help with their mental and emotional state. The visits may also allow respite for full time carers. These would be in addition to visits from an elder but on a more regular basis, such as every 2 to 3 weeks.
