

amir fled from his home in Darfur, in Sudan, where a brutal conflict has been raging since 2003. He lost his childhood to war, and then his family - whom he saw killed in front of him. Samir managed to escape and get himself to Egypt, but with no family, no home, and his education unfinished, he had little hope for the future.

Samir is just one of thousands of refugees, many of them children, whose lives have been turned upsidedown by conflict. The human cost of war has been vividly and heartbreakingly portrayed on our television screens in recent months. Sadly, the Middle East is witnessing similar scenes of terror and despair that we are seeing in Ukraine.

Through our partner Refuge Egypt, we are helping people like Samir who've lost everything because of war. With your donations we can provide food, shelter, and clothing for those left with nothing; psychological counselling for those struggling to overcome their trauma; and training and employment to help them rebuild their lives.

Refuge Egypt was able to give Samir the shelter and help that he desperately needed. He is now safe, living in a shared home and with financial support so that he can restart his studies.

But every day more refugees arrive in Egypt. There are currently over 273,000 registered refugees in the country and the real number is far higher. Many are living a precarious existence with no savings or safety net to rely on and struggling with the psychological scars of their experiences.

We are so grateful to all who have given to our latest appeal to help refugees like Samir. With the eyes of the world on Ukraine, many other tragedies risk being overlooked. Our partners need our help now more than ever to continue their vital work.

# HEALING THE WOUNDS OF WAAR

In May last year, rising tensions between Gaza and Israel tragically led to the worst escalation of violence since the 2014 war. Thankfully a ceasefire was agreed after 11 days of fighting and has so far continued to hold. But the rocket attacks from both sides caused long-term damage, particularly to Gaza's already extremely fragile infrastructure, and tragically led to the deaths of 256 Palestinians and 13 Israelis and wounded thousands more.

Your swift and generous response to our emergency Gaza appeal was amazing and has helped to make a real difference in the 12 months since the conflict.



#### **REPAIRING** BOMB DAMAGE

Air strikes hit the street close to our partner Gaza YMCA. Luckily no one was in the building at the time, but extensive damage was caused, including to the playgrounds, kindergarten compound and staff offices. Thanks to your donations, we could help fund the repair work. This has now been completed, making the building safe again. The 20 YMCA staff have been able to return and resume the YMCA's program of activities that benefit over 2,200 young Palestinians.

#### **PROVIDING** ESSENTIAL SUPPLIES



The air strikes not only destroyed homes and buildings but also damaged infrastructure, including Gaza's water and electricity networks. Villages in the North Governorates of the Gaza Strip were particularly badly affected. Your donations meant our partner Caritas Jerusalem could organise the regular delivery of filtered water, as well as providing tanks for safe water storage and distributing chlorine tablets, to ensure clean drinking water to over 400 families.
