## Message from the Manse

May will be dominated by speculations around the publication of the long awaited report on the issue of Ministry and Same Sex Relations and we print elsewhere the press release on that report to encourage reflection on the matter. Whatever the General Assembly decides there will be work to be done to promote understanding and respect for how the church sees itself in relation to the state and other churches and faith groups on this issue.

Clearly one of the challenges involved in living in our pluralist society is how to hold respect and tolerance for others' rights to hold their opinion and practice their belief, and yet to be able to stand up for one's own faith or point of view.

In the past, as the Christian "majority" community, we have been expected to be the "adult", mature enough to welcome and tolerant and include other faiths and view points and not simply dominate by force of numbers the public arena. However, as we decrease in numbers and influence in society, we can no longer take for granted that others will recognise or respect our rights to hold the faith and views we do, or to practise that faith without question or intrusion.

Our task as the church is always to be seeking to promote the love of God revealed in Jesus Christ His Son, to love our neighbour as ourselves and to share the joy and hope of Resurrection with all in our community. In seeking to do that we are preparing now for an open day in August to promote our building and our faith to the community around us.

Our concert series celebrating the centenary of the organ is part of that same openness and welcome to others – bring your friends and neighbours (details of how to get tickets on page 14).

## **General Assembly of 2013: Report on same sex relationships and the Ministry**

The 2011 General Assembly of the Church of Scotland appointed a Theological Commission to bring to the General Assembly of 2013 a report on same sex relationships and the Ministry.

**The Report** (which can be found in full on the Church of Scotland website) describes the breadth of theological opinion that exists within the Church on the question of whether the Church of Scotland should ordain ministers who are in same-sex relationships. It also offers the General Assembly a choice of either legislating to allow for such ordinations or reaffirming the traditional understanding that it is inappropriate to ordain ministers who are in same-sex relationships.

Neither the report in its entirety nor any individual proposal represents the considered view of the Church of Scotland. The report and the diverse proposals have been put forward by the seven members of the Commission who have a broad spectrum of views.

The General Assembly which is the sovereign body of the Church, will consider the various proposals. On one hand the report offers the Church a way of allowing the ordination of ministers in same-sex relationships who have entered into a civil partnership, while protecting both individuals and congregations who in conscience do not agree with the theological principles which underpin that choice.

that homophobia is sinful, invites the Church to reaffirm its traditional stance that the only appropriate expression of sexual activity should be within marriage between one man and one woman.

The report does not offer a recommendation of one option or the other but leaves this open for the Assembly to decide.

The Rev John Chalmers the Principal Clerk to the General Assembly said:

“The Report and the options which it provides are offered at this stage without comment from the Convener or members of the Commission; it will be for the General Assembly alone, based on the substance of the theological arguments to come to a mind on this matter. In the meantime, the report which is wide ranging and detailed is commended to the whole Church for prayerful study and consideration.”

She is expected to be there for about three years. You will remember that our former assistant, Lyn Peden, is the minister at Penilee St Andrew's. I spoke to Lyn after the service and she was very pleased with this arrangement. Lyn, being a fairly young minister is delighted to have the benefit of the experience of Eleanor McMahon, who was minister at Dumbarton Riverside.

The Service, was, as is usual a lovely occasion. The church is a fairly recent building but in the traditional style. There might have been 100 people in the Congregation. And the purvey was excellent!

I have a feeling we are going to see a lot more occasions of this kind. I see in the Presbytery billet for this month there are a number of proposed linkages and unions, and I hope they will all be amicably settled.

## COMMUNITY OPEN DAY 2013





# Celebrity Organ Recital

Continuing our celebrations of the Organ, a Celebrity Organ Recital will be held in the Church on Friday 7<sup>th</sup> June at 7:00pm.

Our Guest Organist on the evening will be Ian Hare read below some of Ian's performances:

*Ian Hare has performed widely in Britain and abroad, including France, Germany, Holland, and the USA. He has played at many of the major London venues, notably Westminster Abbey, St. Paul's Cathedral; the Temple Church appeared at the BBC Proms. Performances in the past few years have also included engagements in Vienna and Berlin, and recitals at Queen's College, Oxford and King's College, Cambridge. He has made several broadcasts for radio and television, and organ CDs. Ian became a Fellow of the Royal College of Organists at the age of sixteen and studied in Paris with André Marchal. From 1968 to 1972 he was Organ Scholar of King's College, Cambridge, under the direction of Sir David Willcocks. Subsequently, following studies at the Royal College of Music and with Nadia Boulanger in France, he was appointed Lecturer in Music at Lancaster University in 1974, where he became the first University Organist, and in 2006 he was awarded an Honorary Fellowship.*

## Easter in Cyprus

In Scotland, Easter Sunday fell on 31<sup>st</sup> March with Pentecost on 19<sup>th</sup> May but in Cyprus, Easter celebrations are just beginning with 5<sup>th</sup> May, Easter Sunday.

The streets are decorated with Easter egg and chicken decorations wishing every one Καλό Πάσχα or Happy Easter. Shops and hotels also display Easter decorations. The hotels organise their own celebrations like Easter egg painting and organise buses to take people to the services.

This is a very important time in Greece and the celebrations begin on Holy Thursday evening when church services have a symbolic representation of the crucifixion.

Good Friday is a day of mourning; women and children take flowers and red eggs to the church to decorate a symbolic bier of Christ. This decorated bier is carried through the streets and members of the congregation follow with candles. On this night hotels do not have Live Music as a respect to the day of sorrow.

Easter Saturday a midnight mass called the "Good Word" to celebrate the Resurrection of Jesus all the lights are put out and the church is lit only with the Eternal Flame. Just after midnight the flame is passed from person to person to light their candle and soon the church is filled with flickering candlelight. Church bells ring non-stop, ships sound their horns, floodlights are lit on large buildings and displays of fireworks are set off. After the service it is usual to eat a "Magiritsa" an Easter soup.

Easter Sunday families join together for a meal and festive celebrations which last long into the night. Easter Monday is usually a day to take things easy!

Perhaps Christians in Britain should follow this example and be more outgoing with their church celebrations instead of only confining them inside the churches. This would bring our message to everyone and for them to learn more about us.
