Dear Friends,

"Jesus is coming – plant a tree!"

So says Bishop (and New Testament scholar) Tom Wright. He has written quite a lot about the resurrection, and he insists that the New Testament writers didn't foresee some kind of ethereal, purely spiritual afterlife, but one modelled on the bodily resurrection of Jesus. I think he may be right. I have failed to find anything in the Bible about us floating around on clouds playing harps, or becoming another star in the sky, or an angel, or any of those other images of life after death that are around in our popular culture.

When Jesus rose from the dead, his tomb was empty. Although he could appear in a locked room, his disciples could touch his hands and his side and feel that he was flesh and blood and not a spirit. Jesus, raised and glorified, was still a man.

What we celebrate at Christmas of the Word of God becoming flesh in the coming of Jesus, is affirmed at Easter in his bodily resurrection. The earth is still important to God. Human beings are still important to God. His purpose for us, as seen in Jesus, is not to whisk us away from this wicked, damaged planet, but to heal it (and us) and make it (and us) new.

This is why we can be people of real, everyday hope – hope that is earthed in the risen Jesus. We express that hope when we treat the earth with respect, together with the plants and the animals. Looking after the creation that God is making new in Jesus is an expression of resurrection faith. So is caring for people, in whose likeness Jesus remains. He was born and raised a human being. Heaven comes to earth.

So let us plant our feet in the mud from which we came and plant our faith in Jesus, into whose likeness we are being transformed by the Holy Spirit. Let us be people of resurrection faith, hope and love, as we live, pray and work for the renewing of this planet and all its inhabitants. That renewal has already begun in Jesus. May it take root and bear fruit in us.

CHRISTIAN BOOK CLUB

"How to be a bad Christian ... And a better human being"

was the title of our Christian Book Club's book for March, by far, I think, the longest title of any chosen book. I first heard about it when it was mentioned by Janey Lee Grace when she appeared at Central last autumn. It was written by Dave Tomlinson, the vicar of her Church. (He doesn't tend to use his title, "Rev", so I won't.)

So what's it about? The flyleaf includes the questions "Would you describe yourself as spiritual but not religious?" and "Do you want to think with your soul rather than trying to follow rules". Although I found the book very easy to read, I also found it made me think, as it raised some very interesting questions. For example about my relationship with my God; was this as personal as it should be or was it too bound by ritual, dogma and self-searching? And about my service to God; as an Elder, was I too bogged down with building projects, the ritual of our Church Services, etc to pay proper consideration to the spiritual side of my responsibilities?

Having recommended the book to the Book Club I was concerned as to their reaction to it. Would they find it on one hand too bland or, on the other hand, perhaps, offensive? I'm pleased to say I needn't have worried. Without exception they all enjoyed it and, like me, found in it things to think about and question. Although not everyone attached the same importance or interest in all the questions it raised, I think it is fair to claim that all of us found it helped us to take a fresh look at aspects of our personal relationship with and understanding of God and the way in which we should approach and serve Him.

As an aside, some of us were surprised that such a book should be written by a C of E vicar. Perhaps a reminder that the C of E is a very broad Church, something we may forget when so many of its churches in our area would be classified as "High Churches".

I won't say any more about this book as I think anyone who reads it would find their own personal message and questions and that these will vary from person to person. I strongly recommend it to you all.

The next meeting of the Christian Book Club is on 22nd April when we meet at Carol Tyler's to discuss "To Kill a Mockingbird". (An earlier Monday than normal as the B.B. awards evening is on the 29th.) Our May meeting is back to the normal last Monday, the 27th, when we will be looking at Psalms selected by the members.

DANGEROUS JOURNEY

John Bunyan's 17th century story, "Pilgrim's Progress", our Book Club's choice of reading for February, featured again in church life, when The Lantern Company returned for a third visit to Central on Palm Sunday evening, performing "Dangerous Journey". Their version stuck very closely to the original text but with a sporting theme linked to the 2012 London Olympics.

The energetic production involved just four actors who played a host of characters, using basic changes of costume and props to support their varying roles. Their innovative use of minimal staging – a small set of steps, four road barriers, a camouflage net and a blue silk parachute – portrayed tracks, mountains, valleys, prisons, bogs and rivers and brought the story to life.

During the visit to the brash, bawdy Vanity Fair, it seemed impossible that there were only four people, wearing clown masks and wielding jesting sticks, moving on the dais and through the aisles. Another memorable, but chilling, moment was the transformation of three of the actors into the monster, Apollyon. The Welsh rugby duo trying, mistakenly, to earn their way to the Celestial City through good deeds, added both humour and clarity.

The audience enjoyed the entertainment and, although the words were sometimes lost in the loudness of the background music and the speed of delivery, its members also absorbed the message of the drama. Deciding to follow Christ's way is a personal decision: you may be mocked for setting out on your pilgrimage; there will be people and events to lead you off course; there will be others that will encourage you and share part of your journey; the burden of sin can be laid at the foot of the cross and entry into God's Kingdom is only possible through His love and grace.

As we travel our own "dangerous journey," the Lantern Theatre Company challenged us, like Christian, to decide clearly on the direction our life should take and then, confronting our personal demons, to pursue our beliefs steadfastly to the end.

WOMEN'S WORLD DAY OF PRAYER

We had a very successful service at St. Peter's, W. Blatchington, with an almost full church. Sixteen churches were represented and the collection raised £320 (after expenses) to be sent to WWDP Headquarters for distribution.

If you have attended any of the services you will know that at the back of the Order of Service is a page devoted to detailing the charities and organisations which benefit from the money raised on this one day. I thought you might be interested in learning in greater detail about some of them

In 2008 WWDP gave a one-off grant to the **Evangelical Church of Guinea Bissau's Bible Institute**. The Institute leaders wrote to thank WWDP for their encouragement. "Despite challenges and difficulties the school is flourishing with the addition of 30 new students and the work of the clinic has grown enormously, reaching 36 villages within a 30k radius. The majority of patients walk 10-20 km to get to the clinic and arrive exhausted. The staff give at least 500 consultations a month and desperately need a doctor and another nurse. Through the playing of Bible tapes in the Fula language and the dedicated and loving work, the message of salvation is being heard for the first time."

Wycliffe has allocated their money to two language projects: the Rapa Nui translation on Easter Island and work in Chilean Signed Language for the deaf.

Lifewords' grant went towards their pavement project, which works with children-at-risk, in Latin America

The Leprosy Mission intend to use their grant for work in the Perulia Community Hospital in W. Bengal.

Mothers Union grant went to relief work in the Sudan.

Ecumenical Accompaniers received a one-off grant for their work in Palestine and Israel.

Our financial support to **Samaritan's Purse** will enable them to take the Gospel into Swaziland, Liberia and Mozambique.

The Medaille Trust and TRAC provide safe houses in the South of England for women and, more recently, men who have been trafficked for sexual or labour exploitation. (Scotland Yard has reported that traffickers had targeted every town, village and city in the UK.)
