Dear Friends,

Greetings from the First Church of Christ Congregational church in North Conway, New Hampshire, North America, which we attended on October 12th as part of our holiday in New England. We had been saving up for some time to go at this time of year when the leaves are turning to shades of red and gold. North Conway is set in an area of spectacular mountains, covered in trees.

When we attended the service, I was quite overcome as we sang the first hymn, 'Joyful, Joyful, We Adore You' to Beethoven's 'Ode to Joy' tune:

"Joyful, joyful, we adore You God of glory, Lord of love
Hearts unfold like flowers before You opening to the sun above...
All Your works with joy surround You,
Earth and Heaven reflect Your ways..."

We had been appreciating the beauty of God's creation, and then to express that in worship was quite overwhelming. I felt the presence of God, and I was unable to sing much of the hymn as my eyes filled with tears of emotion.

It was a great service in a lovely church - with a robed choir - and a wonderful pianist and organist. The service was led by a Licensed Lay Minister in the church. Speaking to her afterwards, her call to ministry had come in much the same way as mine - later in life. She told me that when she trained at seminary, she was amongst much younger students, but rather alarmingly, many of them looked upon ministry as a 'job', rather than a calling from the Lord. It doesn't bode well for the future of the Congregational Church in America, but hopefully God will work and people will be changed. Only God can change people.

One of the things that surprised me was that the readings and the sermon followed on from what I had preached at Portslade the previous Sunday - they use the same lectionary as us! Good continuity - across continents!

Holidays are a real blessing and hopefully we are all feeling refreshed for the challenges in our church and in our lives in the days ahead. May the Lord continue to bless us all.

FAMILY NEWS FROM CENTRAL

“ Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.” This is the first and greatest commandment. Matthew 22: vv 37 & 38

And the second is like it: “Love your neighbour as yourself.” All the law and the prophets work on these two commandments. Matthew 22: v 39

It seems that in our worship, by some God-incidence, the same theme kept re-appearing. On 19th October, Simon Forrest, took Love as the theme for his sermon to be followed the following Sunday by the Men's Fellowship, organising and leading the morning service based on the above verses from Matthew's Gospel. The next evening part of the discussion at the Christian Book Club also involved the practice of the second commandment and on Tuesday, at the Women's World Day of Prayer Preparation Conference, Love raised its head once more. Not only was the hymn, “Such love” sung but also a newer hymn in which the chorus is,

*“As God loves us, so let us love each other;
with no demands, just open hands and space to grow.”*

Perhaps within all this God-incidence is a message, which God wants us to put into practise OR just a message.

To return to Sunday morning on 26th October – the day the clocks went back – it was very evident that the Men's Fellowship had planned, prepared and prayed about this service, as well as putting in so much thought and love. Every one participating, in whatever way – either reading the lessons, leading us in prayer or meditation and giving the sermons – gave fully of himself. We had music, singing, poetry audio-visual aids and all came together to deliver the same heart-felt message. It was evident that the men knew and believed in it.

It is invidious to pick out one or two people because this was so obviously a joint effort and we, as the congregation, are grateful to the entire Fellowship for such a meaningful act of worship. The “anthem”, Such Love was sung so well by the men's “choir” and deeply appreciated by everyone; the prayers were thoughtful and said what lies so often on our hearts; and the sermon with its use of humour, power point presentations and music to enhance the central message, made it interesting to all ages.

Our sincere thanks, deep appreciation and congratulations to the entire fellowship. It was good to be there.

On a smaller scale the Boys' Brigade Enrolment Service was also a solemn and moving occasion. Rev. Peter Elliott, as Boys' Brigade Chaplain, led the Staff and Boys in the annual renewal of their promises to follow the aims and objectives of the Brigade. Visit to Zimbabwe September 11th to 24th 2014

1. Background to visit:

For this visit, there was a team of 11 people., 10 from Southwick Christian Community Church and Stephen Hulcoop, Lynda's brother, from Potters Street Baptist Church in Harlow, Essex. We flew from Heathrow on Ethiopian Airlines via Addis Ababa arriving in Harare, Zimbabwe at lunchtime on Friday to be met by Jonah, Robert and James.

2. Background to the current situation in Zimbabwe:

There was no significant change in the situation in the country since our last visit in January 2014. This mission visit took place in the Spring season when it is very dry but surprisingly few people came to collect borehole water suggesting that the City of Harare water supplies must be functioning normally. The opposite was true for electricity supplies. The power was off much more regularly this visit. Uncollected rubbish and potholes in the road were worse than ever. Unemployment remains at around 90% with news of further firms closing. Thus the majority of people in Kuwadzana township continue to eke out an existence living very basically with a pretty poor diet. Politically things seem stable on the surface but behind the scenes there is a lot of unrest regarding who might succeed Robert Mugabe as ZANU PF leader. This tension might break out into violence at any time.

3. Jonah and Family and the Training Centre Staff

Jonah and family and the staff are all doing well under the circumstances. Jonah's health has improved significantly in the last few months after being very unwell early in the year. He is on a very low fat diet, which is helping significantly, and he is looking forward to retiring from the Presbyterian ministry in January 2015. When this happens he will move out of the church manse to his house in Ashdown Park and give his time more fully to the work of the Training Centre. Tracey is also quite well and intends to start a small preschool at the Training Centre when she retires from the church crèche in January 2015. We were able to leave a few items to help her start this new venture.

The staff are all doing well, although Mailos is getting tired and struggling with back ache, as a result of doing the strenuous work of gardening. We have decided that he should retire very soon and then work part time in a voluntary capacity, if he wishes to, alongside a new gardener who will take over the heavy work. He will stay in the centre

house as Susan, his wife, is still employed. James and Oripa have settled down more fully now they have their stand and are building their own house. Robert and Patience will move into their partially completed house in January when Jonah and Tracey move to Ashdown Park.

4. Activities during our stay

With a team of 11 people with different giftings, we were able to undertake a wide range of activities as follows:

- 1. Training Courses:** We ran 3 courses over 5 mornings concurrently:
 - a) Health and Hygiene led by Jeannie helped by Becky, Linda, Helen and Jess. This was attended by approximately 20 people
 - b) Home maintenance and Repair (mainly electrics, painting and guttering) led by Bill and Stephen attended by approx 12 men
 - c) Biblical Studies in the Book of James led by Granville and Lynda attended by approx 14 people.

In addition Lynda helped by Granville ran one 4 session evening course in prayer ministry attended by around 20 people.

At the end of the week we had a certificate giving ceremony accompanied by refreshments which was a time of rejoicing enjoyed by all.

The team undertook 15 other activities which would take up too much space to relate in this magazine. Read about them next month.

5. Finances:

We were able to take with is the sum of US\$14600 which the team had collected via fund raising and money towards the expenses of our stay. From this we purchased a generator as the previous one had packed up after long years of use, paint, guttering, fluorescent lights, stationary, items for food parcels, ingredients for celebration meals etc. We also left money for education. Together these costs together with our keep and transportation came to around US\$8000 which leaves about US\$6600 to be used on various projects and running costs in the future. This amount is a wonderful blessing to the training centre.

We have also begun to set up scholarships for needy students. To date we have identified 5 needy students, 3 of whom are orphans and 1 disables urgently needing educational support. 3 have been offered sponsorship by individuals in the UK for the coming year. Others will be identified in the future.

6. Evaluation of Mission visit: On all fronts, this visit was very significant and ran smoothly without any hitches. We all felt the power of people's prayers and all in the team worked well together fulfilling different roles as indicated above. Without exception, people felt the warmth of the love and fellowship which greeted us and all benefitted enormously from the experience. The feedback from Jonah and the church leaders was very positive and they all felt the visit had had a transforming effect in a number of ways with many people experiencing help and healing. The team was extremely well looked after in terms of catering, safety, and transportation etc and despite lack of water and electricity at times, the dormitory proved to be a comfortable place to stay.

7. What next? The future:

1. During our stay work began on building a small 2 roomed structure behind the present school building. This has become necessary after pressure came to bear from parents asking the centre to provide classes for A Level students. Thus this year a class 5 has begun and these will become class 6 next year with a new intake of class 5 students. Space for classrooms had become very tight with the Bible School having to move into the old kitchen area. Thus Jonah felt this small block was necessary. In faith, building has begun and the estimated cost is around £5000. We stand in prayer that Gavin Ayling, one of the team, might be able to secure funding from his firm "Just Retirement".

2. Jonah retires at the end of January 2015 and will give his time more fully to the Training Centre. Tracey will also start a small pre-school at the centre which will hopefully bring in some extra income and provide a valuable local service for families. Jonah is particularly keen to see the Bible School develop and would like to see new taught courses to make a 2 year study programme. He is willing to do some of the teaching. Lynda has been in touch with the Congregational Federation and SEAN (Part of Theological Education by Extension) each of whom have potentially suitable courses. She will look further into these in the next few months and seek to find a way forward for 2015.

3. Kuwadzana Presbyterian Church are very keen to keep strong links with the Training Centre after Jonah retires and are keen for some form PCNI to be present at Jonah's retirement to keep the link strong. It will be an important time of transition and Lynda and family plan a visit in 2015 around this time to be present, conduct graduation and inaugurate the Bible School courses. Also Michael needs to conduct a thorough

audit of the accounts and prepare a new budget for 2015 as he has not been able to do this for 2 years.

4. Jonah foresees a further 2-5 years of service at the Training Centre depending on health etc. During this period, it is clear we need to stand in prayer for a new director and Jonah will need to train him or her for the task. This is a matter for urgent prayer. We also need to pray for who will become minister of Kuwadzana Presbyterian Church as we need this to be someone we can trust and work well with.

5. There is clearly a desire in Zimbabwe to see more mission teams undertake a mission trip in the future. The experience this year also suggests that this is very beneficial experience for people in supporting churches. All in the SCCC team would like to return at some stage and there are others in the church who would dearly love to go. It would also be good to get people from other churches to go. Visits from PCNI Trustees who have not yet visited would also be desirable.

CHRISTIAN BOOK CLUB

After a summer of enjoyable reading, this month we had taken up the challenge of reading “Christian Atheist: Belonging without Believing” by Brian Mountford.

We had realised that this book would require deeper thought and study than our more recent readings and, accordingly, had allotted more time to its study. Not enough in some cases! However, it must be admitted that this book was well outside our comfort zone and had to be read, not perused, chapter by chapter, with frequent recourse to the use of a dictionary.

Brian Mountford sets out to explore the reasoning behind people, who are found in many churches, who attend church regularly, sometimes hold positions of authority in a church, support and work for the church but who do not believe in God.

Why? Why attend church, participate in the worship but not believe in God?

Some attend because they like the ritual, some because they like the music or the art, others because they admire and attempt to follow the ethics of the church and/or Christianity or, again, because they find the friendship in a church important to their lives. Some attend church because they wish to support their spouses/ children or because they see in the morals of the fellowship the standards by which they wish their children to be brought up to aim for. Gradually, they become drawn in becoming supportive in many ways but still cannot take that final step of faith or belief.

“I don’t believe in God but I miss Him.”

During the book the author interviews some of these Christian atheists and recounts the question and answer sessions he has with them. These were the most interesting and simple parts of the book. Unfortunately, for us he also tends to pontificate or theorise in very learned language, which is where the dictionary is of some but limited use. When he is dealing with the “isms” (existentialism, adoptionism, etc), philosophers and theologians, it becomes a real struggle for the ordinary reader. One member of the group described it as “wading through treacle”: another as “losing the will to live.”

To be fair, many of us found quotations, which intrigued us and gave food for thought.

“ Absence of evidence is not evidence of absence.”

And for Christians, “Preach the Gospel everywhere - if necessary, use words.”

We must admit that, although we struggled to read and cope with this book, it produced one of the longest, deepest and honest discussions we have ever had and also attracted one of the largest attendances at the club.

We are on slightly firmer, more familiar ground for our next meeting on 24th November, when we will have read Proverbs Ch 10-15 and the four proverbs Jenny Morgan challenged us with in September.
