

Dear Fríends,

It's that wonderful time of the year again, commonly called 'Christmas', and sometimes 'Xmas', and even 'Winter Festival', depending on the degree of political correctness! The hard sell started in the shops 2 or 3 months ago, but there is little point complaining about the commercialisation of Christmas. This has become a fact of modern life. We, as Christians, can celebrate what Christmas is really about, and we can be part of the campaign begun a few years ago to 'put Christ back into **Christmas**'.

What is more, we can celebrate the season of Advent. We have this time when we can anticipate and look forward to the coming of the Christ child. We count down the Sundays, remembering firstly the patriarchs of old, including Abraham, who received the promise from God that he would be "the father of many nations." We recall the prophets who foretold a child being born who would be called "Mighty God", "Everlasting Father", "Prince of Peace". On the 3rd Sunday of Advent we remember John the Baptist, the forerunner of the ministry of Jesus, "the thongs of whose sandals I am not worthy to untie." On the 4th Sunday, we celebrate Mary, told by the angel Gabriel, "You will be with child and give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus." Then on **Christ**mas Day, we celebrate the special birth - "Immanuel - which means, 'God with us'."

This is the most marvellous thing about the season of Advent - God breaking through into human history in the person of that little baby. The risk and the humility were incredible. "Christ Jesus: Who being in very nature God, did not consider equality with God something to be grasped, but made himself nothing, taking the very nature of a servant" (Phil. 2 v. 6, 7).

The most important thing about Advent and **Christ**mas is **our** response. "If I were a wise man, I would do my part; yet what I can I give Him give my heart." The heart of **Christ**mas is Christ - how appropriate that we respond with the love of our hearts.



Dawn Raid on Newhaven Fort!



CHRISTIAN BOOK CLUB

Perhaps, after reading "The Christian Atheist", anything might seem lighter – even a book of the Bible. Perhaps that is why we relapsed into some of the bad habits of the early years of the Book Club: one of us had read the wrong chapters and another hadn't read any! Nevertheless, it was a highly enjoyable evening, if somewhat light hearted.

We can, of course, blame our Interim Moderator, Jenny Morgan, for it was she who set us on the path of discovering Proverbs, having used five of them for discussion during our Harvest Thanksgiving Service in September. During the service, Jenny had invited us to discuss briefly the aptness of five proverbs for today's world. With the time constraints of a service we felt we should examine these more closely and also read Chapters 10-15 of the book itself.

We managed to whittle Jenny's choice down to three : Proverbs 14: 21; Proverbs 16: 11 and Proverbs 28; 11. We felt these were particularly pertinent to today's world and political situations.

Then we turned to the Book of Proverbs. We all found verses which intrigued us, amused us, slightly bewildered us and at times, confused us. One minute it seemed that God was condemning the rich: the next the poor were being chastised. Peter Elliott explained to us that Proverbs is part of the Wisdom Literature of the Old Testament, which also includes Song of Songs, Ecclesiastes and Psalms. Although some of it is attributed to Solomon, around 700 BC, some of it comes from Egyptian proverbs as far back as 5000 BC. It is a sort of in-gathering of wise sayings from all over the Middle East over centuries.

There are proverbs for and about all kinds of people, all kinds of relationships and generally they attempt to teach how to behave or how not to behave towards others.

We had great fun with some and indeed some provoked laughter as we tried to narrow down our favourites.

Chapter 10 verse 26: Never get a lazy man to do something for you. He will be as irritating as vinegar on your teeth or smoke in your eyes.

Chapter 18 verse 22: He who finds a wife finds a good thing, and obtains favour with the Lord.

Chapter 21 verses 9 & 19 redress the balance. It is better to live in a desert land than with a contentious and fretful woman.

Chapter 15 verse 20: A wise son makes a glad father but a foolish man despises his mother.

Chapter 16 verses 1-3: politicians and promises pay attention!

There are so many which made us smile, for example, the one where a nagging wife is likened to a dripping tap and we also enjoyed the various ways a proverb could be expressed by comparing what was written in our different translations of our Bibles. It does somewhat pain me to admit that the Good News Bible came into its own, when dealing with this Book.

One thought as we go into a New Year: Proverbs 16 verse 9.

Our next meeting will be in Pam Moody's home, on 26th January at 8.00 p.m. when the book of choice is "Four Letters of Love" by Niall Williams.

If you cannot make that meeting, then perhaps you would like to join us at Chip Dunn's on 23rd February to discuss the Book of Ruth.

Visit to Zimbabwe September 11th to 24th 2014.

In last month's magazine we gave an account of Lynda Hulcoop and a team from Southwick Christian Community Church's to Kuwadzana. This is, as promised, a further insight into the activities undertaken.

- 1. IT Room: Whilst courses were on and during some afternoons Gavin sometimes helped by Becky, spent time with Robert getting the desk top computers virus free and functioning well and helping set up the laptops we had brought from the UK purchased from Computers for Africa. By the end of our stay, the computer room had undergone major transformation
- 2. School Teaching: Some mornings (quite early!) Jess was invited to teach both O level and A level classes in Maths, English and Religious Knowledge which was a wonderful preparatory experience for her moving on to teaching in Thailand next year. This was greeted very favourably by both the staff and the students and served to give us closer relationships with the school. Jess and others also spent time in the afternoon with the students doing some tutoring, chatting, doing loom bands etc.
- **3.** Football and Netball Training and matches: On 3 afternoons Jordan led some of the school boys in football training on he local public football pitch preparing them for a match against the church football team. Jess also did netball sessions for the girls. The matches took place on Saturday afternoon in the grounds of a local primary school. The school netball team won well and the football match refereed by Stephen with all players wearing Brighton and Hove Albion donated football kit ended in a 3-3 draw.
- 4. **Practical repair and building work**: Bill and Stephen helped by Nyasha and Amos and others undertook a range of practical activities, the major one being putting guttering round the new school building. Without this the building remains illegal. They also did electrical repairs, filling holes in the floor and some glazing work.
- **5. Visit to Women's Association:** One afternoon Jess, Becky, Jeannie, Helen, Linda and Lynda participated in the Women's Association meeting at the church. This included singing, dancing and prayer ministry.

- 6. Visits to local homes: One afternoon Granville, Linda, Helen and Jess did some home visits taking food parcels and ministering in prayer. This proved to be a real eye opener seeing how people live in Kuwadzana high density suburb. Another afternoon the whole group accompanied by some staff member walked around the township. On route we stopped at the home of a former Bible School student where a mourning gathering was going on after the death of the student's mother. We sang and prayed which was very well received.
- 7. Sunday School: On the two Sundays the entire group helped at the Sunday School in sessions led by Bill presenting the theme of creation. Approx 80 to 100 children of all ages attended and entered fully into the craft activities we had prepared. We then did a presentation in the church with the children singing and participating.
- 8. Sunday Services: On each of the two Sundays we participated in services at a fairly full Kuwadzana Presbyterian Church. We sang, did Bible readings and both Lynda and Granville preached. After the services we were hosted for lunch first by the church Elders who gave us formal greetings and sung and second by Jonah's family.
- **9. Prayer ministry:** After both Sunday services and at other times Granville, Linda, Helen, Becky, Jeannie and Lynda undertook healing prayer ministry with a lot of people who came forward to be prayed with. This included young people wanting prayer for their studies and parents bringing their children for a blessing.
- **10. Youth Gathering:** On one Sunday, Jordan and Jess went to a joint youth gathering in Kuwadzana.
- **11. School Assembly:** We participated in one school lunchtime assembly led by Jess where we did a drama and sang. This was followed by different groups of students singing, individual students giving speeches and reading poems and a dancing group. It also included the singing of the Zimbabwean national anthem!
- 12. Visit to Special School: One morning some of us went on a visit to a special school for disabled children. This is the school attended by Moses Aaron, the son of Doris who is a church member and a Bible School student. We help sponsor his school

fees so it was a good opportunity to see how such a school functions.

- **13. Clothing packs:** During our stay, we packed up 165 bags of children's clothes that we had brought with us. These will be distributed to needy families during the course of the year.
- 14. English meal for Staff: On our final evening we hosted all the staff and their families to an English meal. We cooked and served soup, cottage pie & vegetables followed by apple crumble and trifle. 34 people attended and we had a lovely time of fellowship accompanied by singing and thank you. This was a major task as the electricity was off and the facilities for mass catering rather limited.
- **15. Free time visits**: We had some free time when we went to Cuiaba Shire bird park on Lake Chimera, Wild is Life animal sanctuary, Mize Game Park and Avondale market, Thus we were able to see some of the African bush and wildlife.
