We currently have 2 serving elders but I would like our Eldership to consist of 6 people, if we can manage that. In order to be nominated you must have been a church member for one year and accept being nominated. A good and healthy eldership is vital for the church to thrive and develop and that is what we want as we continue in this new chapter of Church Life.

If you have skills you would like to offer to the church family and would like to stand as an Elder please ask someone to nominate you. If you have questions about the role, and what is involved, then please contact Keren or me for more details.

Church Duties There are numerous tasks involved in supporting a church family and building of this size. I have always believed that each of us have skills that we can offer to our church life and fellowship. It may be that you have been doing a job in the church for many years and feel you would like to stop doing it. It may be that there is a job in the church that you would like to do.

ST CUTHBERT'S HOUSING ASSOCIATION

The Final Chapter.

Towards the end of 2016, the legal formalities were completed to formally end St Cuthbert's Housing Association as a charitable trust. Our treasurer was then able to clear the remaining funds (to the benefit of homeless charities and Central URC) and to close the bank account.

So ends nearly 50 years of efforts to provide help to those in need of affordable accommodation. Our hope is that by passing on ownership of the property in Lyndhurst Road to our friends at "Off the Fence", that effort will continue

Over 20 years ago, the decision was made to disperse surplus funds to other charities who deal with homeless people whilst continuing to provide accommodation for four tenants. Over £110,000 has been distributed in this way, providing financial help to some 15 charities who support the homeless in our city. Central has also benefited from this distribution of funds.

Many members of Central, and of St Cuthberts, have been involved in this project over nearly 50 years and it would be remiss to end without paying tribute to those who have given their time and their talents to this worthwhile cause.

ALL GOOD GIFTS

Anyone visiting Central during December would have seen so many signs that it was Christmas. One of these that always reminds me of the love of God is the Christmas tree. Not only is it attractive in itself, it is also centrepoint for the gifts so generously donated by members of our congregation.

These gifts are given to Fresh Start, a local charity, which creates hampers for distribution to less fortunate families in and around the city.


PARACLETE CHRISTIAN NETWORK INTERNATIONAL

CHRISTIAN BOOK CLUB

The first meeting of the Christian Book Club in 2017 was a lively one. Not because the book "Nora Webster" was exciting – quite the contrary – but because we disagreed so much about it and how we viewed both the chief character, Nora Webster, (one is hesitant to dub her the heroine) and the author, Colm Toibin's writing. It was a love-hate situation.

Some of us loved it; others endured it and others wondered why he had written it.

If you like a story with a beginning, middle and end, then this is not the book for you because it has none of these standard features of composition. It starts – but not with any introduction – it wanders through three years of Nora's life and it stops. And the reader is left waiting for what. It is all remarkably flat.

Nora Webster seems to be defined by the fact that her late husband was a schoolmaster. They had two daughters, who have left home for college/university and a career and two sons, Conor and Donal who are much younger than their sisters. Nora had been a wife and now, upon her husband's death, she is just a mother and at first not a very good one at that. While married, husband came first, children a distant second and Nora came somewhere well down the pecking order. Some were very shocked that she had just abandoned the boys to her sister whist her husband was sick in hospital. Maurice would need her and it never seemed to have occurred to her that the boys needed her too whilst they were losing another parent.

We were uncertain whether this was a story about Nora Webster or was she merely a means by which the author could explore the grieving process. How long does grief last? How do you cope with it? How do you cope with the rest of your family and the neighbours? When do you come to your senses enough to realise that others, beside yourself, are grieving and have lost someone dear too?

Nora being to become a person in her own right by having to make decisions about finances, holidays, by getting a job and best of all by discovering music and singing. Her husband isn't there to tell her what, how and when: she has to it all *herself*.

Like November's book choice we found that there was a clash of cultures which hindered our understanding or perception of Norah Webster. There is an amazing difference between a small rural town in 1960s Ireland and


Hove 2017 and the expectations of women now and then.
