### **What's been Happening at the Discipleship Group**

Where to start? Well, I suppose at the beginning!

It was after attending a meeting to discuss our vision text "Christ Church a community of people affecting change by being changed into the likeness of Jesus" that Kelvin set up a discipleship group for those who were interested in furthering this aspect of their faith.

I was interested in this and signed up for the group, not sure if it was for me (self doubt). After a couple of meetings discussing the qualities and characteristics of Jesus and thinking and looking at ourselves, it was decided to have a day away at Sisters of Jesus Way in West Kirby.

On the 1st June ten of us set off early that Saturday morning. The sun was shining, blue skies, a perfect day, but still I had feelings of uncertainty as to what this day would bring (self doubt again).

When we arrived we were shown into a room were tea and coffee where provided, the tranquillity of that room hit me right away and I felt a tremendous feeling of peace.

After prayers, songs and a power point presentation we began our discussion. We began with things that may possibly hold us back from taking our faith further, even taking that step of faith. It could be something from our childhood (how many times do you hear teachers telling their pupils they will never make anything of

themselves) or maybe in our teens when adults may well tell you, "you'll never do that, you're just not good enough" or even being told how stupid you are. Even into our adult years things can be sent that knock our confidence and leave us with a feeling that maybe it's true and we just aren't good enough (self doubt again). All these things and other experiences can hold us back from taking that step, BUT Jesus invites us to step out in faith, he is always with us. He knows our limitations and doesn't give us anything he knows we cannot do or achieve.

I think of Peter stepping out of the boat, whilst he focussed on Jesus he stayed on the water, however, when fear took hold (maybe he said to himself I can't do this) that's when he started to sink. Who was there to lift him up and keep him safe? Jesus was and he is there for us too. We need to put our trust in Jesus 100% and I know myself what a challenge that is. However, during our lunch, one of the Sisters gave us the story of how the Sisters of Jesus Way retreat came about. Throughout their journey they prayed and trusted in God to provide all they needed and wow did he provide an amazing story, not without difficult times but they came

I left that Saturday with so much less, but so much more. et me explain. I'd taken a lot of baggage with me that day, but throughout our time there, whether at

group, in the chapel, reading in the conservatory or walking around the beautiful garden I was able to leave a lot of baggage behind. I also gained so much. A definite new zeal for working for the Lord (what doing, not sure yet but I'm confident that the Lord will let me know). Also to put my trust in him and know that I can do things that maybe I feared before, because all things are possible with the Lord. So whenever I'm challenged to do something different (ie this article) then I will have a go, knowing the Lord is with me, and put my trust in Him. Things will still be a challenge to me but instead of being quick to say, "Oh no, not me I couldn't possibly do that" with the Lord's help it may become "Yes, why not me". Who knows, only the Lord does. So if, like me you have self doubt and are not sure you can step out in faith, pray about it, maybe join the discipleship group, there will be another chance in



October when Kelvin will be looking at our vision statement again and hopefully another group will stem from there. Go on, take that step.

#### Tim and Sarah's farewell


