# Choosing darkness - or light?

As we all know, one of the main themes of Lent in preparation for the celebration of Easter is turning back to the Lord, and changing, becoming a new creation. One of the Gospel readings that we always have in Lent is the Transfiguration, and I think this can help us to understand a little better just what Jesus means when he talks about being 'transfigured'.

The transfiguration is not some one-off event in our lives, or in Christ's. Transfiguration happens to every single human being, at different times, and in different situations throughout our journey of life. The best description for transfiguration is, when we look at an object or a person or situation and see the object, the person or that situation for what they really are.

Let's think of two examples. When we first fall in love, we see the person that we have fallen in love with in a totally different way. We see what other people don't see - in fact, that's why we often hear people saying 'I don't know what he/she sees in her/him'. When a child is born, the parents see the child in a new light - the child is transfigured. They see their child with eyes that no one else in the world can see.

The point I am hoping to make is that the eyes that see their first love, the eyes of parents on their child, these are the eyes that see as Christ sees. Our vision may most of the time be hazy and dim, but when we get a small glimpse of the light and love Jesus has for all of us, and all of creation, we begin to realise that the world is heaving with God.

In an image that lies at the very heart of Lent and Holy Week, we can choose to live in the darkness of the tomb, or to come out of the darkness into a world that is transfigured by the light of the resurrection. That is the choice facing us this Easter: Light or darkness? Hope or despair? So which one are you choosing?

May the joy of the Risen Lord enlighten your hearts and your homes this Easter.

### The power of prayer

Earlier this year, Pope Francis said that he thinks of '...many Christians who believe that praying is to talk to God like a parrot.' He cautioned us 'No! Praying is done from the heart, from inside." "He does not need anything, our God: in prayer he asks only that we keep open a channel of communication with him to always discover ourselves [to be] his beloved children and [that] he loves us so much.'

He reminded us that Jesus distanced Himself from the 'babble' of the pagans and that God knows our needs before we say them.

And he said that in the Gospel of Matthew, Jesus's words on how to pray are said in the middle of his Sermon on the Mount, when he 'summarizes fundamental aspects of His message.' In that sermon, Pope Francis reminded us, Jesus began with the Beatitudes, crowning 'with happiness' people who are often forgotten or ignored: the poor, the meek, the merciful, and the humble.

For Pope Francis, 'This is the revolution of the Gospel.'

He stressed, 'The Gospel does not leave [us] quiet, it pushes us.'

During this Lenten period, Pope Francis tweeted 'When we pray, let us recall that we do so with Jesus. Jesus is our courage. Jesus is our security, who in this moment intercedes for us.' And in another tweet he said 'Through prayer we learn to renounce the idolatry and self-sufficiency of our ego, and to admit we need the Lord and His mercy.'

Continuing his exploration of prayer, in his homily on April 4 during his morning Mass at Domus Sanctae Marthae, Pope Francis said, 'In common parlance, people use an expression that I really like when they have a goal: "I put it all on the line." In intercessory prayers, this also applies: "I put it all on the line". It is the courage to go forward.'

He added, 'But perhaps the doubt may arise: "I do this, but how do I know the Lord listens to me?" We have a certainty: Jesus. He is the great intercessor.'

The Bible, Pope Francis said, is full of examples of holy men and women who prayed fervently to God, almost as if 'they were arm-wrestling' with him. They did so, he explained, because they 'had faith that the Lord would give them grace.'

Jesus, too, His Holiness said, '...prays for us at this moment' and no matter what way Christians pray, it is Christ 'who takes my prayer and presents it to the father.'

Fr David ends his Easter letter to us on Unity's first page 'with love and prayers'. Each week at St Margaret's, our prayer group meets at 7pm and prayers are shared for individuals, for families, for the parish, for the wider community – and for the world.

It's a time when we can 'put it all on the line' and keep the channel of communication with God open. Everyone is welcome.
