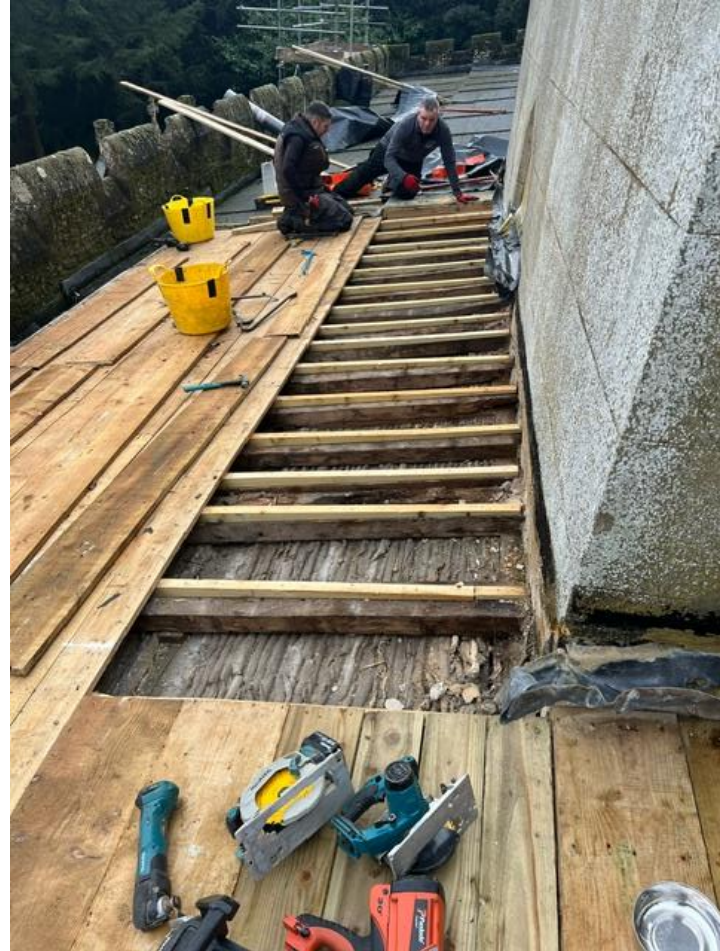
(2) The Quinquennial:-

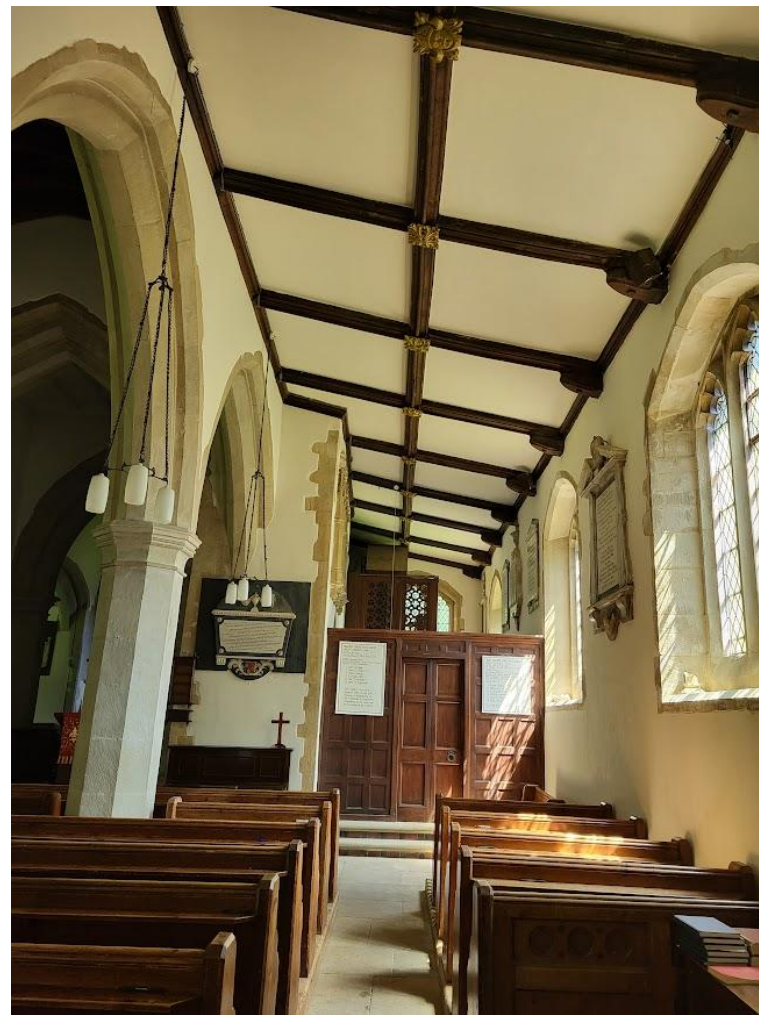

GRANT AWARDED FROM:-

National Churches Trust “Last Chance Churches”, a special £500,000 match-funding appeal open until March 2024. St Mary’s was chosen as one of 18 churches across the country to be a recipient from this fund.

The award of £30,850 has enabled us to complete the roof work in one go, rather than having to do it in stages.

TOTAL GRANTS RECEIVED:-

£75,000

TOTAL COST OF PROJECT:-

£155,000 incl VAT (recoverable through Listed Places of Worship Scheme)

NATIONAL CHURCH AWARDS:

St MARY'S FINALISTS

for the National Church "Care & Conservation Award". The results were announced at the National Church Awards ceremony at Lincoln Cathedral in October. Whilst this was a little disappointing having made it to the short list, it is flattering to think that the work carried out here has been recognized at national level.

FUTURE PLANS:

NET ZERO CARBON PROJECT:-

Andrew Smith has been commissioned to conduct an energy audit in the church and to look at plans for decarbonisation. This will include a large project to replace our very old boiler with a heat pump. We have received a grant for this preparatory work and there should be grants available when it comes to carrying out the actual work.

Safeguarding – a subject to be taken very seriously:

Annual Safeguarding review was held in November. The Safeguarding Policy & Domestic Abuse Policy were approved.

No safeguarding incidents have been reported.

Treasurer's Report including adoption of the Annual Report

- Accounts prepared on Receipts and Payments basis**
- Deficit for the year of £1,286**
- Total Receipts and Payments very similar to 2023**
- Despite higher gas prices, lower cost for Heating, Lighting etc due to a more favourable rate with new supplier and new programmable thermostat.**

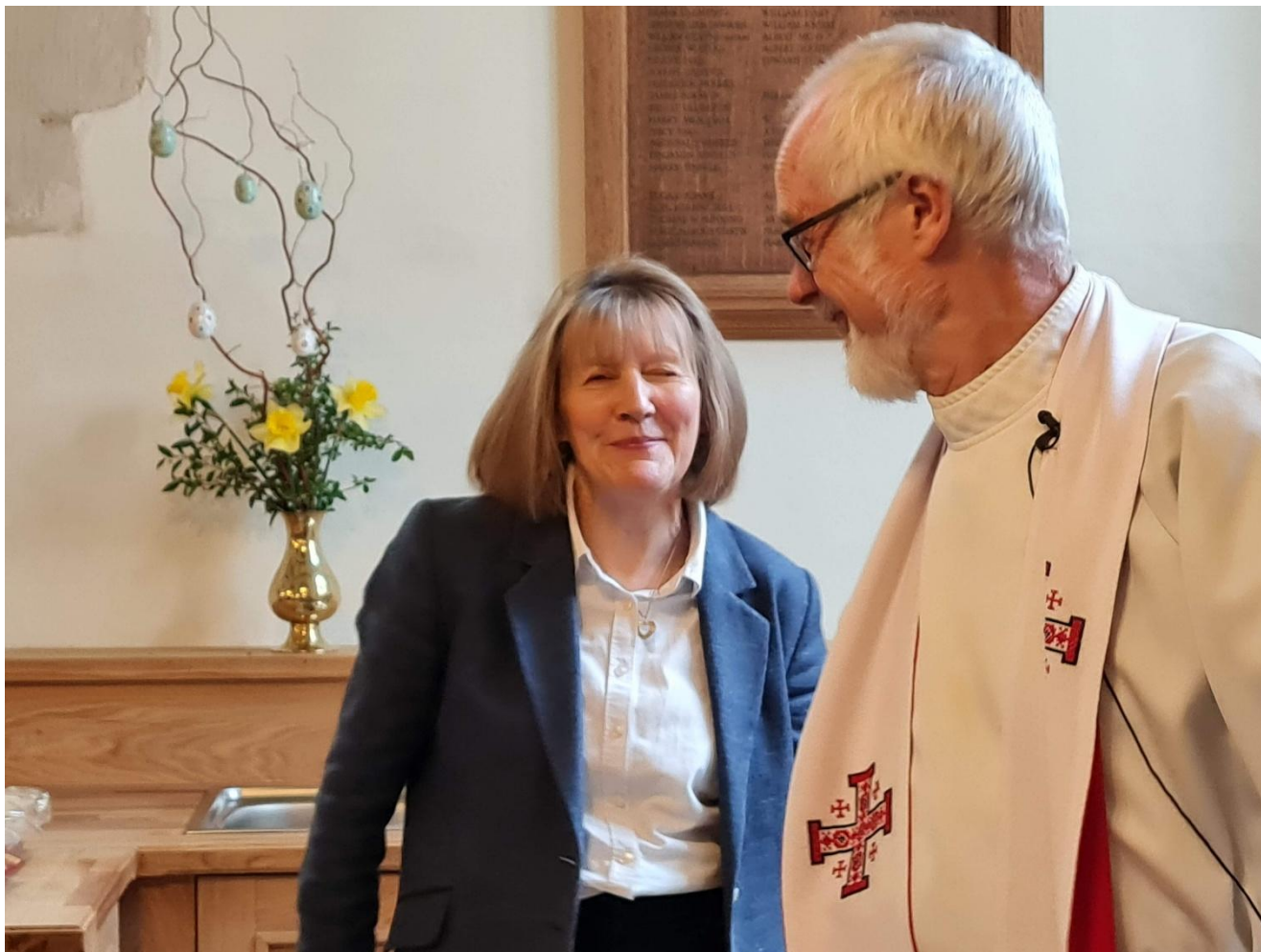
