ST. MARY OF NAZARETH /ST. FRANCIS OF ASSISI – WEST WICKHAM 26th September 2021: Seventeenth Sunday after Trinity

Hazel writes:

My sermon this week introduces the **Living in Love and Faith** courses which will run this autumn. This is an opportunity to consider how your own experience of relationships – friendships, family and marriage – have formed you and influence your opinions on the ways in which our society is changing. These are important topics for the Church of England today and the course provides a safe space in which you can offer your views, as well as listen to others. My hope is that the courses will enable us to answer the question: how can I live a more abundant life? Please do sign up to one of the dates: the details are below in the pew sheet and there will be sign up sheets in both of the church buildings.

Next Sunday 3rd October, we will have three **Holy Communion services** at 8am and 9.15am in St Mary's church and at 10.45am in St Francis' Church, which will be **St Francis' Gift Day**.

Morning Prayer is held in St Francis' Church on Wednesday mornings at 9.30am, followed by the church being **open for private prayer** from 10.30-11.30am. It is also held at St Mary's Church on Thursday mornings at 9am.

Gracious God, you call us to fullness of life: deliver us from unbelief and banish our anxieties with the liberating love of Jesus Christ our Lord.

First Reading: Num 11:4-6, 10, 14-16, 24-29

⁴The ... Israelites wept again, and said, 'If only we had meat to eat! ⁵ We remember the fish we used to eat in Egypt for nothing, the cucumbers, the melons, the leeks, the onions, and the garlic; ⁶ but now our strength is dried up, and there is nothing at all but this manna to look at.'

¹⁰ Moses heard the people weeping throughout their families, all at the entrances of their tents. Then the LORD became very angry, and Moses was displeased. ¹¹ So

Moses said to the LORD, ... 14 I am not able to carry all this people alone, for they are too heavy for me. 15 If this is the way you are going to treat me, put me to death at once—if I have found favour in your sight—and do not let me see my misery.' ¹⁶ So the LORD said to Moses. 'Gather for me seventy of the elders of Israel, whom you know to be the elders of the people and officers over them; bring them to the tent of meeting and have them take their place there with you.

²⁴ So Moses went out and told the people the words of the LORD; and he gathered seventy elders of the people and placed them all around the tent. ²⁵ Then the LORD came down in the cloud and spoke to him and took some of the spirit that was on

him and put it on the seventy elders; and when the spirit rested upon them, they prophesied. But they did not do so again.

²⁶ Two men remained in the camp, one named Eldad, and the other named Medad, and the spirit rested on them; they were among those registered, but they had not gone out to the tent, and so they prophesied in the camp. ²⁷ And a young man ran and told Moses, 'Eldad and Medad are prophesying in the camp.' 28 And Joshua son of Nun, the assistant of Moses, one of his chosen men, said, 'My lord Moses, stop them!' 29 But Moses said to him, 'Are you jealous for my sake? Would that all the LORD's people were prophets, and that the LORD would put his spirit on them!'

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Gospel: Mark 9:38-end ³⁸ John said to him, 'Teacher, we saw someone casting out demons in your name, and we tried to stop him, because he was not following us.' 39 But Jesus said, 'Do not stop him; for no one who does a deed of power in my name will be able soon afterwards to speak evil of me. 40 Whoever is not against us is for us. 41 For truly I tell you, whoever gives you a cup of water to drink because you bear the name of Christ will by no means lose the reward. 42 'If any of you put a stumbling-block before one of these little ones who believe in me, it would be better for you if a great millstone were hung around your neck, and you were thrown into the sea. 43 If your hand causes you to

stumble, cut it off; it is better for you to enter life maimed than to have two hands and to go to hell, to the unquenchable fire. 45 And if your foot causes you to stumble, cut it off; it is better for you to enter life lame than to have two feet and to be thrown into hell. 47 And if your eye causes you to stumble, tear it out; it is better for you to enter the kingdom of God with one eye than to have two eyes and to be thrown into hell, ⁴⁸ where their worm never dies, and the fire is never quenched.

⁴⁹ 'For everyone will be salted with fire. ⁵⁰ Salt is good; but if salt has lost its saltiness, how can you season it? Have salt in yourselves, and be at peace with one another.'

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Sermon - Hazel O'Sullivan: Living in Love and Faith

Are you living an abundant life? Could your life be more abundant?

I wonder if you remember Joe Biden's Inauguration. There was a young poet, Amanda

Gorman, shown here, who read a poem, 'The Hill We Climb', at the event. This was a poem which she'd written specifically for the event, on the theme of American Unity. It begins by asking: where can we find light in this neverending shade? And it finishes by saying:

There is always light, if only we are brave enough to see it. If only we are brave enough to be it.



There is always light... Of course, as Christians, we know Jesus as the Light of the World and so, we can reiterate that conclusion that there is always light. But even if it's there, do we always see it? Or do we, more often than not, only see the shade that surrounds us in the ways of this world? It's by seeing Jesus, the Light of the World, in the people and situations around us that we'll be able to live that abundant life that Jesus promised us in John 10:10 when he said: "I came that you might have abundant life."

Are you living an abundant life?

What does Jesus mean by that phrase 'abundant life'? Well, one thing that it's <u>not</u>, is the way in which the Israelites behaved in our first reading. They'd been led out of slavery in Egypt but are now complaining and their complaint makes it impossible for the people to see God and to live an abundant life: all they can see is the shade. If you look at verses 14 and 15, even Moses can't see the light – he wants to die, so that he doesn't see his own misery.

The way that God brings back the light into their lives is by sharing the spirit among the 70 elders who are chosen to support Moses. By seeing God's light in others, they were enabled to prophesy and to take on some leadership. By sharing with others and not stopping anyone from taking part in this (as Joshua tried to do in v28), Moses was able to lead the people much better. They were all able to live an abundant life.

By sharing with others, they were able to live a more abundant life. Are you living an abundant life? How could it be made more abundant?

When Jesus was alive as a human on earth, the Jews were still finding it hard to see the light and to live an abundant life. In our gospel reading, John thinks that it's only those who are close to Jesus who can reflect his light. However, Jesus himself tells the disciples that it can be anyone who is acting in his name, and he asks them not to block others from finding him. Jesus is inviting his followers to live abundant lives, freed and restored, seeing the image of God in themselves and in others. I wonder if we can see the light of the world (Jesus) today in ourselves, as well as in other people, especially those who are not like us. This is how we will live an abundant life – together with others who are different to us. Just because someone is not like us, doesn't mean that they can't show God's light.

Even within the church, sometimes we fail to live this abundant life. Every year in January we have a Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. I wonder if we could practice Christian Unity all year round, not just for one week. Sadly, rather than seeing the light, we see the shade of division. Divisions between denominations, divisions between different parts of the Anglican Communion, divisions even within the Church of England. We see shadows in different styles of worship and different theologies. Lockdowns have exposed some of these differences, as we've had to experience different places and styles of worship through services being streamed on-line, through being encouraged to find God in the garden or other places, and for us here in St Francis' and St Mary's by having our pattern of worship changed with more joint services. Some have thrived in these different situations, while others have found it difficult. It's not that one thing is better than another. They are different. But we all believe in Jesus, and we must not stop the other, like John was trying to do in v38 of our reading.

We all want to see the Light of Christ more in our society. Maybe, if we can look beyond our prejudices, we'll be able to do so. Jesus spoke in contrast to John when he says in v40 that whoever is not against us is for us. This is what an abundant life involves: doing stuff with others who are different to ourselves.

Are you living an abundant life?

One thing that we've done recently to break down some of the divisions between us, is to look at different aspects of being an Inclusive Church. The most recent of these meetings was on sexuality and gender identity, which is a critical issue for the Church of England to deal with at the current time. The Methodist Church has recently agreed to allow same-sex weddings in their churches and the Church in Wales has also enabled the blessing of same-sex relationships by their clergy. The position of the Church of England is not yet decided but there are some materials called Living in Love and Faith, that have been developed to enable everyone in our church to look at identity, sexuality, relationships and marriage, in relation to the good news of Jesus Christ. Instead of seeing ourselves as pitted against each other on this topic, Living in Love and Faith is designed to enable us to discuss the issues together, with respect for all and so see the Light of Christ in the other, whatever their view. And it's not just about our approach to same-sex relationships, it's about how we approach all relationships, including our own, so that we can live that abundant life which Jesus promised to us.

I am going to be running a Living in Love and Faith course over five weeks on four occasions in October and November – details are in the pew sheet. Here's a link to an introductory video:

The Living in Love and Faith course gives everyone the opportunity to speak and to be heard, to explore our own identity and relationships and to explain our own feelings, without being criticised by another. The Church of England wants all views to be heard and, as I said before, the position on same-sex relationships is not already decided. It is difficult to say that people in a loving, faithful relationship, who believe in Jesus, cannot have God's blessing. Equally, those Christians who believe that marriage is only intended for a man and a woman also need to be heard and respected. An abundant life is one where people with different views are able to join together in an open discussion, without being criticised or demeaned in any way.

Some of you may be challenged by the idea of talking about sexuality, relationships and marriage, but it is only by discussing these topics openly that God's will can be discerned. I thought that the panel members for our Inclusive Church meeting on sexuality and gender identity were very brave in offering to speak and answer questions on this topic. As Amanda Gorman said in her Inauguration poem:

There is always light, if only we are brave enough to see it. If only we are brave enough to be it.

Will you be brave enough to find the light in our church? It is <u>always</u> there, but sometimes we need to be brave enough to find it in others, or to be brave enough to be it ourselves.

Are you living this kind of abundant life? How could it be made more abundant? Sign up for one of the courses and come along to explore this in a bit more depth. Amen

Prayer Pointers

Continue to pray Afghanistan, for her Leaders that they rule with justice, integrity and impartiality and for her people as they continue to adjust to a new regime. May those who still seek to leave the country be able to do so without harassment, especially those who worked for or with the armed forces from the USA or Great Britain.

As the Climate Change conference of COP26 draws closer may those who attend take on board the seriousness of the effects of global warming and be prepared to make hard decisions about the future.

Pray for the people of La Palma in the Canary Isles, for all who have seen their homes and livelihoods destroyed and for those who have suffered bereavement or injury: may they find strength and comfort from their communities and their faith.

Pray for our own Church of England as she faces some difficult decisions for the future and comes to terms with some of the issues from the past that can no longer be ignored.

Pray for our Church Vision, that the two forthcoming concerts will be enjoyed by members of our wider community as well as people from the congregations.

Pray for the Living in Love and Faith Course that starts shortly for those who lead the groups and those who attend.

Give thanks for the baptism of Oliver Smith, a member of the Messy Church congregation yesterday. Pray that his parents and Godparents will provide good examples for him over the years to come.

For all those who are ill and for their friends and relatives – especially for Vicky Pearce, Julie Bailey, Carole Hubbard, Conor Owlett and Christine Harley – and all those unknown to us but known to God alone.

Pray for Ann Dakin a former choir member of St Francis who died on Monday and her family and friends. Pray also for Sabina Nessa, her family and friends and for all in this area of Southeast London who have died as the result of violence.
