Dear Friends

As more parts of the economy open up, you are probably looking forward to being able to do some things just like we did before the pandemic started. Things like eating out in a restaurant with a large group of people, seeing a friend or family member in person rather than on a screen, or maybe even going overseas on holiday. However, before rushing into experiences such as this, it is important to take some time to look back, to recognise the depth of the troubles that we and others have experienced and how God has been with us throughout. It is only by giving proper recognition to these things that we will be able to move forward knowing that we have come through it all intact. If we don't spend this time, we may be hiding something inside that will make us revert to some of our pain, anxiety and being overwhelmed.

During July we will have three weeks of services that should help with this process. The first one will deal with lament – a cry to God about things which have been (and maybe still are) not right.

- Is it not you, God, you who have now rejected us and no longer go out with our armies?
- Give us aid against the enemy, for human help is worthless. Psalm 60:10-11

The second will be a time of sharing stories of how God has been with us during this time. We have another of these stories included in this magazine from Merri Womack. Do let me have any others which you are happy to share with others (anonymously if you'd prefer).

Now to him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, for ever and ever! Ephesians 3: 20-21

And the final one, will be an opportunity for healing, so that we can be assured that we have shared with God and with each other, those things which still concern us, and we have committed ourselves into his hands to bring about a greater sense of well-being, whatever that might mean. This I call to mind, and therefore I have hope: the steadfast love of the Lord never ceases, his mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is your faithfulness. Lamentations 3:21-23

Do spend some time this summer on this process so that we don't simply go back to the old ways of living, or even go into a new way of living, without reflecting on what we might have learnt through our experience. A recent Thought for the Day on Radio 4 quoted Henri Nouwen who said:

We don't think ourselves into a new way of living, but we live ourselves into a new way of thinking.

Maybe we will find ourselves thinking differently as a result of our lived experience, but let's be open to what this might mean for our shared life together, as it's still really too early to say what exactly this will look like in the future – we need to live in the new normal for a period before coming to any conclusion. PCCs and the ministry team will be giving this some thought over the next few months. Please do bear with us during this period. Keep in touch and let us know what it is that you'd really like to see, so that we can be sure that we are following God's will when we make any changes to what it is that we do.

In the meantime, and in order that time and space can be given to the ministry team, who have been providing support to both congregations without much of a break for over a year now, we will not be introducing any new activities or altering the pattern of services that are held until September at the earliest. We want to be sure about a way forward before making any changes, so that we are not putting effort into something that is not sustainable.

On March 11th John was rushed to hospital with a heart attack - a terrible shock to us all. The ambulance team were brilliant and an amazing team at King's operated to put a stent into one artery and to flush through two others.

The following day knew that I had to keep to the usual routines, including taking the dog for a walk – normally John's responsibility. Recent stories of dog-knapping heightened my awareness of my surroundings and when two men approached me as I walked by the golf course, I was somewhat wary. I transferred the lead to my left hand and held something hard – my keys - in my right. I bade them 'Good morning', they returned the greeting, and we all continued on our way.


Suddenly it started to rain and soon it was pouring. Digby and I returned home soaking wet. As I turned into my road, panic set in as I realised that I had dropped my keys. Fortunately we have a key safe to the side of the house, so I was able to get in to dry the dog and change my clothes. All the time I was thinking about how I might find my keys. I made a notice to attach to the wire fence giving a telephone number in case someone had found them and, when it had stopped raining, I retraced my steps, searching all the time. After a while, I saw two ladies approaching, so I stopped them and told them about my keys. With great relief one of the ladies handed them over, telling me how she didn't really know what to do with them, so she was pleased that I'd come along when I did.

At that moment, I knew God was looking after me and I felt calm and safe. I have shared the story with a near neighbour, who has now become a great friend, having offered much support since.

The whole experience has helped me to be very mindful of people on their own and has made me more prayerful and thankful for my faith. God has clearly been at work in my life. Many people find they are given strength and peace of mind when they know that they, or their loved ones, are being prayed for – and the more people who are praying for someone, the better!

Bishop Karowei writes . . .

My dearly beloved brothers and sisters in Christ, greetings to you, your loved ones and the family of God in the name of our risen Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

As we move forward out of lockdown, I look and see bulbs of light, life, and Christ's love shining around us despite having been through one of life's most devastating experiences with the pandemic. Lots of our loved ones, friends and extended human family have died alone, are no longer with us and we've been unable to say our goodbyes. May the Lord grant the souls of the faithful departed, rest, and may Christ's resurrection give us a real sense of a living hope as we build back better.

I wish to share two thoughts as we contemplate the way forward, hoping to build back stronger by God's grace.

After the crucifixion, the disciples were afraid of the Jews and went into "lockdown", they were spellbound in fear, windows and doors locked. Their Lord Jesus Christ appeared amongst them and said, "Shalom", meaning "Peace be with you." He breathed God's peace on them in a most challenging time of anxiety, fear and crisis. So, my friends, my first thought is, remember, Christ is with you, whatever you are going through, trust Him as He breathes God's peace on you. (Luke 23:36). Perfect Love casts out Fear.

In another scenario, Cleophas and his companion travelled the short journey to the village called Emmaus. As they journeyed, Christ joined them as they discussed the events of Good Friday.

Jesus expounded the Holy Scriptures to them and what the events meant. After the journey, as they sat down to eat, He took the bread, gave thanks and broke it, then their eyes were opened and they recognised the resurrected Christ. Alas! They returned to Jerusalem to tell the disciples how their hearts burned with fire within them as He expounded the Holy Scriptures. He is Risen! (Luke 24:13-33). So, my second thought is this, remember, Christ is travelling with you in your journey of faith and Christian discipleship. He is your travelling companion and friend, who supports and gives strength as you go through life's challenges and upheavals and especially now as we return to a new post-pandemic norm.

We give thanks to God for making His grace available to us through Christ, who has given us a new hope and peace in the midst of turmoil and promise of His abiding presence through the Holy Spirit.

Finally, "Rejoice in the Lord always: and again I say, Rejoice. Let your moderation be known unto all men. The Lord is at hand. Be careful for nothing; but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God. And the peace of God, which passeth all understanding, shall keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus." (Philippians 4:4-7 KJV).

Therefore, hold on, beloved brothers and sisters, fellow travellers and disciples of Christ with the assurance of God's promises which are confirmed in Christ Jesus. Shalom!



ST ALBAN - THE FIRST BRITISH MARTYR

Persecution of Christians worldwide is rising fast, so it is worth remembering St Alban, the first British martyr. Alban was a Roman citizen living in England when the Roman Emperor, Diocletian, began a fierce persecution. Soon Alban found a desperate priest on his doorstep, hunted by local soldiers. Alban gave the priest shelter and within days was converted. When the soldiers arrived, Alban took the priest's place, refused to offer sacrifice to the Roman gods and was condemned to death. Alban went to his execution on 22 June 250AD with such serenity that one of the executioners was converted. He died on the site of the Hertfordshire town that now bears his name.
