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



LETTER FROM RICHARD

Dear friends,

"April is the cruellest month," writes T. S Eliot in his opening to *The Waste Land*, a statement that will almost certainly be fulfilled this April, when we see the introduction of higher National Insurance payments and an increase in the energy price cap. And I am writing this when we have yet to see the impact on our economy of the economic sanctions being imposed on Russia. Another way of putting this is to say that April will see increasing numbers of people falling into poverty, with parents having to go without meals themselves in order to feed their children. What this feels like was vividly brought to life in the second film in our occasional series of film nights at St Mary's: "I, Daniel Blake".

Those familiar with the film will remember the scene in which a young mother is so hungry that she cannot help herself grabbing a can from a shelf in the food bank she has been referred to, opening it then and there and cramming the contents into her mouth. Shortly after this watching this film, while having a mini-retreat at a convent in Lewisham, I was moved to write the following poem:

Day after day,
putting food on the table
for others,
but not yourself,
doing the best you're able
to hide from them the sacrifice.

But now,
as you walk the stacks
of food,
something cracks.

Despite yourself you grab the can –
no knife, nor fork,
just hands to cram
full your mouth,
oblivious of those around
turning at the sound
of hunger satisfied.

And then the shame!
But why?

How in a land of plenty
are plenty left to choose
to heat or eat,
to feed the kids,
deny themselves,
then lift the lids and “feast”
on food on food bank shelves?

It is to the credit of both St Mary’s and St Francis’ that we are actively involved in supporting the Bromley food bank, and you can read more about that elsewhere in this magazine.

This April, of course, also sees us celebrating Easter and the hope that Jesus’ resurrection from the dead brings to us all. We live in a broken world, as the need for food banks and the war in Ukraine testify, but God’s raising of Jesus from death also testifies that God is ultimately in control, whether it is immediately apparent or not. And that is a hope worth holding on to.

Have a hopeful and blessed Easter.

St Francis' Pre-school

You may be aware that we have a new owner and manager for St Francis' Pre-school who are open in the rear hall beside the church building every weekday during term-time. Her name is Kelly Fiander and we are looking forward to working closely with her to build up that compassion and sense of community which she has a real heart for, as demonstrated in the following piece that she has written for us:

St Francis' Pre-school are taking great pride in serving the local community.

We are almost at full capacity on our morning sessions and running at 55% capacity on our afternoon sessions.

The children are all happy and learning new things every day.

I am a strong believer in giving each and every child a positive early years' experience and I am especially passionate about supporting children who have not had the best start in life and those children who have additional needs.

Since taking over the nursery in September we have supported two children who have financial hardship. We have enriched their learning with experiences they may never have had the chance of before. The pre-school is providing healthy lunches for them to ensure they have at least 1 decent meal throughout the day and we are also providing healthy snacks such as fruit, breadsticks, crackers etc.

We now have 3 children who have additional needs. We are financially supporting 2 of these and we are receiving additional funding from Bromley council for the other. This enables us to provide a 1-1 specialist teacher for each of these children to enable them to join in with all of the activities that are set for the other children. Without this specialist support these children would not be able to have complete access to the curriculum offered. One of the children we care for was excluded from their previous setting as they could not deal with their behaviour. He has settled well into St Francis Pre School and is going from strength to strength.


The SEN (Special Educational Needs) advisor that comes from Bromley council is so pleased with the way we are teaching the SEN children that she has asked if we would take referrals from the council when there is nowhere else to place the child.

We are really looking forward to providing care and education for many more years to come and I want to thank all of you at St Francis' for allowing me to continue doing this.

Vision Feedback

Last year we set out a vision for the united benefice of those activities that we might develop together as we come out of the restrictions imposed in response to the pandemic. Much of our early work has been in strengthening our work of compassion and in February and March we fed back on two aspects of this which are summarised below:

Foodbank support

The involvement of our two churches in food bank support goes back about ten years, when a home group started a food donation point at St Mary's and Pam Sear agreed to be the contact person, as well as to deliver the donated food to the warehouse. When Covid started the collection point moved to the vicarage doorstep which has resulted in a considerable increase in the amount of food donated and a recognition by local people of both of our churches' support for the Bromley Food Bank, since St Francis' is also a donation collection point.

During Covid, our donations were delivered first to SJ's, St John's community centre in Coney Hall, by Hazel and then Ken Bryan took on delivery to the Bromley Food Bank warehouse in Downham. When the warehouse was forced to close for a short period, Ken took the collection to the Shrublands Food Bank, who were extremely grateful, as they had supplied sixty families over the Christmas period and were very low on stocks.

An important addition to the way in which we collect food was instigated in the run-up to Christmas 2019, when Tim Shingler organised a High Street collection on Crofts' Corner. Initially the Men's

Group supported him, but now others are involved, and we also collect at Easter and in the summer. The next collection will be on April 9th, followed in the evening by a concert being organised at St Francis' by Tim and Roger Dyer to raise funds for the Fuel Bank, an offshoot of food banks, to help those struggling to keep their pre-payment meters topped up. It is ironic that those in greatest financial difficulty are often those who are most reliant on the most expensive source of energy.

Our collection of food and its delivery to the warehouse is only the tip of the iceberg. Other work is undertaken by volunteers, both at the warehouse and at the food bank centres, where clients collect their food. What follows is a description by one of our volunteers who works at one of the centres.

The volunteers arrive and unload supplies that have been delivered from the main warehouse. They stop briefly for an update on the situation, and one of the group may say a prayer. Unpacking the warehouse delivery takes some time, and everyone works together to get this organized as soon as possible, checking dates and stacking boxes in sections.

Food bank clients arrive with a voucher for the number of dependents in the home, issued to them by one of over two hundred organizations, such as Citizens Advice, job centres, schools, care professionals and doctors' surgeries – Kate Dyer tells me that she has been involved providing vouchers to patients of hers who are in need.

A food voucher is valid for one visit to the food bank and entitles the client to non-perishable food for 7 days. The vouchers are for

emergency food supplies to support people in a crisis situation; they are not intended for long-term use.

Because of Covid restrictions and the small premises, clients have to wait in a corridor. When it is their turn to come in, they are welcomed and offered a chair by a volunteer who checks the voucher, enquires about any dietary requirements, if additional support is necessary and provides contact details for this additional support, if appropriate. If that is the case, an email will be sent to the referee outlining the help the client might need. Every client is offered a selection of non-food items such as washing powder, shower gel and sanitary items. While the manager is talking to the client, other volunteers pack the food into bags. If a client is ill, disabled or for some reason unable to come to the food bank, it is possible to arrange for the food to be delivered to them.

In the last couple of years, both churches have been involved in delivering the food bank Christmas hampers to those nominated by a variety of organizations as being in particular need. This work is done by those whom Kim Teare, our coordinator, describes as “all the lovely people from St Francis’ and St Mary’s,” who last Christmas delivered some fifty hampers to families in West Wickham and the surrounding area. The “hampers” contain the extras that the families would otherwise have to go without at what for families on low income can be a very stressful time of the year.

Many members of our churches get involved in the food bank, and I’m not going to give their names to spare their blushes. Their reasons for becoming involved, do illustrate the point that James, the brother of Jesus, makes in his New Testament letter: “faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead.” (James 2.17)

- Being a person who can't stop myself from volunteering, when something needs to be done, I....
- I became involved ... as I wanted to assist people who were in a less privileged position than me. I had read about the increasing pressures of people struggling to afford the essentials and the problems with obtaining benefits, to which they were entitled. I am a practical person and wanted to offer some help.
- I felt as there was a need on our doorstep, I couldn't ignore it. It had been on my mind for quite a while.... My support is small so I would not want it played up in an article. Some people did the Soup Run for years without many people knowing who went each week.

And finally, an anecdote from Pam Sear that shows how easy it is to find oneself in need of the services of a food bank: I was delivering some food to the church in Bromley. There was a well-dressed lady waiting in the vestibule with a small suitcase. I thought to myself, "I wonder where she is going on holiday." At that moment she was called into the food bank room, and I realized what she was there for. It taught me not to make assumptions about the sort of people who need help!

Telephone befriending: using the power of love wisely

When Jesus is in the wilderness for 40 days, he sees the devil's three temptations for what they are:

- Creating some bread from a stone would give him a benefit in meeting his own hunger ... but that would be of no benefit to others.

- He was offered partnership with the devil, giving him a shortcut to status and power ... but that wouldn't show anything of God's kingdom.
- Finally, he's given the chance to become a celebrity ... but that would result in cutting himself off from many ordinary people who'd be unable to relate to him as a result.

All of the options offered by the devil are about using power in a worldly sense. We are open to the same temptations every single day: our own benefit over others; following the ways of this world, rather than God's kingdom; or gaining approval from others rather than from God. Jesus faces up to the justice issues associated with these temptations, but he meets them with love rather than an impressive show of strength. Although it might be more impressive to heal a whole neighbourhood all at once, Jesus chooses to have a deeper relationship with individuals to understand their issues first, before helping them in some way. This is how God's kingdom is formed - by coming alongside individuals to find out what it is that they need and then providing for that need.

In practice this coming alongside others might mean supporting a neighbour who's recently lost a loved one or cooking a meal for someone who struggles with doing their own. However, you might feel difficult doing this kind of thing for people that you know, and this is where our telephone befriending service comes in.

The service starts with a referral from NHS social prescribing, which is where a link person in the local GP surgery puts someone in touch with local people and activities that might help them to feel better, including the community befriending team who are part of St John's church in West Wickham. Having received the referral, the St John's team

matches the person with a volunteer telephone befriender, who will telephone for a chat on a weekly basis, helping them to gain confidence in making social connections, or just raising their mood on a regular basis. The St John's team also supports the volunteers. Currently there are 25 people supported, with the team of volunteers, including six from St Francis' and St Mary's.

As well as being in contact on the telephone, the scheme is also looking at meeting face to face. Now that all restrictions have been lifted, we'll be looking at having our own opportunities for face-to-face social interactions and promoting this and other befriending schemes.

This befriending service has been a blessing, both to those doing the befriending and to those being befriended. One of those involved from our churches talked to me about how her befriended partner was reticent to start with, but over time, little bits of information came out about her childhood, which gave an interesting background. The conversations were very rewarding, and the befriender left these feeling very upbeat and optimistic about the progress being made.

Another person explained how the woman she's in contact with never gets out of her house and so is glad of the phone calls that are made.

And someone else values the calls that she makes because they can take her mind off some of the difficulties in her own life, by focussing on another and allowing them to talk about their family, their medical needs, and the support that they get from friends and neighbours.

God has given us the power of love. Can we use this wisely and resist the temptation to solely meet our own needs or for the gain of our

own group over another and get on with building God's kingdom one conversation at a time?

Report from Str Abba Ghana Eye Hospital

Thank you for letting me share in the news of this past year, made more difficult at the clinic because of Covid. Covid in Africa presents even more difficulties than in the UK, but the Ministry of Health rightly

imposed challenging regulations on our work so that we helped contain the pandemic and not make it worse. At times we felt we were drowning, but donations from St Francis' helped us stay afloat and our work carried on.

We managed to provide PPE for both staff and patients, free masks for those who had none, buckets for basic hand washing and hand gel for those entering the clinic. A second washroom was built too.

By doing this we have been able to continue our work. We perform eye surgery in our theatre on our one (but soon two) operating table. Patients are seen for eye diseases, injuries, and conditions common in equatorial Africa, and many are young children as well as adults. In addition, we provide an ophthalmic service and dispense glasses for those needing them.



The team have been wonderful. I must mention Dacosta who has been upgraded to our theatre team who spends time not only cleaning, as does his wife, in the main clinic, but also sitting and reassuring anxious patients before surgery.



Whilst our work has grown and become more medically sophisticated and skilful, it remains an expression of our love and faith. Without your support none of this would be possible, so ... from the bottom of my heart and from all the Jackie Team and patients, I give you my heartfelt thanks.


