

LETTER FROM HAZEL

Dear friends,

I am writing this soon after the ordination of deacons and priests has taken place in churches and cathedrals across the land. And we have a celebration of our own in October when Debbie Adams will be licensed as a Reader at a service in Southwark Cathedral on Sunday 8th October. We also have a recent addition to our ministry team in the Ven. Carol Coslett. Carol is Assistant Director of Lay Ministry in the Diocese of Southwark and has been licensed as an Assistant Priest for the United Benefice of St Francis & St Mary, so we'll recognise this at a service in one of our churches during the autumn.

In a recent diocesan publication, Bishop Karowei wrote about how this public recognition of ministry can also remind us of everyone's calling to the be part of universal priesthood of all believers. The apostle Peter says:

"you are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's special possession, that you may declare the praises of him who called you out of darkness into his wonderful light."

(1 Peter 2:9 NIVUK)

God's calling is universal — it's for everyone. Now you might be thinking that this is all very well for people like Debbie and Carol, but I'm not in any position to be answering a call of God into ministry. But that's the whole point of that word 'universal'. Your call may not be to a ministry where you are licensed or commissioned by a bishop into a diocesan-recognised role, but we can all do something to shine God's light into this world. That light might shine in a variety of contexts — at work, in our leisure, through our relationships with others, in church life, or through volunteering in our community. No

matter who you are, there will be one of these situations where you will come across other people and have an opportunity to speak of God's love and saving grace, whether that be in something you do or something that you say.

We cannot do this on our own though and when we praise God, whether at home on your own, or in a church building with others, you are reflecting on what God has done through you and others in the past and asking for the continued gift of the enabling Holy Spirit, so that you can fulfil your calling to shine God's light in the future. I pray that in this season you will be able to reflect on God's calling to you and find opportunities where this might be recognised by others.

Women's Group

At a women's event in July, it was interesting to hear how Anne Horner-Tree got involved in the Bromley Homeless Starter Pack Scheme for single people and families starting out in a new home with nothing. This may be women and families leaving a women's refuge, or newly released prisoners, or those who have had previous belongings removed from a rented property while they were in hospital for an extended period. Starter packs are provided from Bromley Parish Church to those who know about a family in need – the council, a food bank, schools, a women's refuge or Citizen's Advice. Demand has gone up recently and last year Anne gave out 200 starter-packs. We donated a carload of cutlery, crockery, duvet covers (not duvets), pillow slips, tea towels, saucepans, frying pans, bath towel, toothbrushes, etc. Please continue to bring any items that you have when you clear out cupboards at home to one of the church buildings, and we will get these to Anne, so that this work of compassion can continue.



Hallo everyone. It is a delight to have found a home amongst you and to be able to serve you in West Wickham working with Hazel and the team.



My role in the diocese is as Assistant Director of Lay Ministry, in the Discipleship and Ministry team at Trinity House, London Bridge. I have been licensed by Bishop Christopher across the diocese and part of my role is to encourage new

vocations into Lay Ministry. This means visiting different churches, and deaneries raising awareness of the different forms of ministry available from Pastoral Minsters, Children and young people, Readers, Evangelists/ pioneers and more.

Before taking up this post I was an Archdeacon in the Derbyshire Peak and Dales, which as well as getting to know a whole new county, allowed me to experience virtually every aspect of church and diocesan life. But the calling to return to Southwark was there, and one of my strengths is engagement with people, and working in a tangible way that allows every gift to blossom. I was born in Epsom and my family roots are firmly in the south, so it was time to return, and I felt God calling me into this role to inspire others to ministry.

My substantive parish ministry had been in Reigate Deanery, as a Rector, Area Dean and Acting Archdeacon, but prior to ordination I had been a music teacher and also since university a Reader. I have a great love of music, enjoy playing the harpsichord, and clarinet, and joined in the community choir for Hiawatha which I have to say was such fun! On my day off I try to get a swim, (so glad that there is a swimming pool in West Wickham), enjoy a woodland walk, or tackle the garden!

Part of my family have moved with me: my husband Martin, a writer of musicals recently "The Crooked Spire" based on where we used to live in Chesterfield, and this year "Mountains of the Moon" being performed in the Buxton Festival Fringe; our daughter Clara, striving to tread the boards professionally, but meanwhile managing the Carnaby Hollister shop when not auditioning. Our son David was married in 2021 and is settled in Derbyshire.

Our new Reader to be licenced in October 2023

I moved from the West Midlands to London as a student to study law. During my legal training I met James, a newly qualified barrister. We married in 1995 and moved to West Wickham. My next-door neighbours, Chris and Kathy Drakes, were members of St. Mary's church, and they invited me to a Sunday service, which I really enjoyed. I continued to worship at St. Mary's on a Sunday, with very little time available in my busy working life to be more involved.

We decided to start a family and were blessed with 3 sons. William was born in 1998, quickly followed by Edward in 1999 and Alexander in 2001. I moved from the world of work to looking after the boys full time.

During this period, I became more involved with St Mary's, and the boys became regular attenders at Sunday Club and other church events. I became part of the Sunday Club teaching team and enjoyed re-telling bible stories to the children through craft activities and role play. I can recall the challenges of keeping 3 young children under the age of 3 occupied during Sunday services. It was not uncommon for me to be bottle feeding one of my sons while chasing another down the central aisle of the church to prevent him crashing into the vicar! However, it has been a real privilege to have been able to spend time with them and watch them develop and grow into the young men they are today.

I would describe my calling to the ministry as a gradual progression, starting with my confirmation in 1998. It took time for my faith to develop and grow, and as the boys became more independent, I began to feel that God was calling me to do something more specific. This call slowly became stronger and stronger until I felt I could no longer ignore it. I enrolled on the Bishop's Certificate Course in September 2018, primarily as a stepping stone in order to reflect on my faith and explore what it was that God was calling me to do. I found the course to be an excellent place to start, and meeting other Christians to talk about faith, was an invaluable experience. I also found taking opportunities within church, such as preaching, leading services, and leading a home group, helped to confirm the calling to lead and teach. I began the discerning process with a Vocations

Adviser in January 2021, in order to explore and identify my call to either Lay Ministry or Ordination. At the end of the 6-month period I was interviewed by a selection panel as part of the application process and was recommended for Reader Training. I began the 2-year Reader Course at St. Augustine's College of Theology in September 2021 and completed the course in June 2023. I will be Licensed as a Reader in October 2023.

Best position for effective prayer


Three ministers sat discussing the best positions for prayer while a telephone repairman worked nearby. "Kneeling is definitely best," claimed one minister.
