

Dear Friends

"At a most memorable and moving Service the Bishop of Manchester consecrated the new Parish Church on Saturday 6 June". The words of the Revd. Arthur Hulse in the July 1964 parish magazine of St.John's Church commenting on the new church building on Sunny Avenue.

Fifty years later, we celebrate the Golden Jubilee of that church building. And what a wonderful sense of God's providence with the current Vicar and his wife both born on that very same weekend 50 years ago.



The first St.John's Church was consecrated on 8 June 1770. Known as St.John's Chapel, it was originally a Chapel of Ease for St.Mary's the Virgin, Bury (the "Parish Church"). The building was situated around where the current Rock Shopping retail and leisure complex is based. It became a parish of its own in 1862.

According to the official history of the church published in 1970, *"For nearly 200 years the Christian faith was preached and practised at St.John's Church in the Rock. During that time, there were many changes. People moved to other and remoter parts of the parish and the Bury climate wrought havoc with the fabric of the building. It became obvious that a new church would have to be built and on 21 February 1914 a Mission Church was opened in "temporary buildings" at Seedfield on a plot of land given by Earl of Derby for the purpose of building a permanent church at some future date".*

After almost 50 years of having two buildings with two congregations, it was decided that the original church was no longer fit for purpose and money was raised to construct a new church building on the Seedfield site.

St. John's Church in the Rock held its last service on Sunday 31 May 1964 in preparation for the opening of the current building 6 days later.

With the closure of St. Mark's Church in the early 1980s, the church was renamed St. John with St. Mark and in 2010 became part of the United Benefice of Walmersley Road, alongside our friends at Christ Church, Walmersley.

Amidst all our celebrations for the building, it is vital to remember that the Church is not a structure with a wall and roof but a group of Christians. It is people that make a church not bricks and mortar. Buildings are both a pain and a pleasure. Much time, energy and finance is spent on maintaining the fabric and the fixtures and fittings.

Yet I believe a building gives a community a sense of spiritual orientation. The daily and weekly prayer and worship sustain us on our Christian journey. It is also an important factor in enabling the members of the parish and others to mark the stages of life – for good and ill. The hundreds of baptisms, weddings and funerals that have taken place in St. John with St. Mark's Church bear testimony to that fact.

So, 50 years on, the present Bishop of Manchester, the Right Revd. David Walker, will be attending a service to celebrate this milestone. On 8 June, there will be only one service in St. John with St. Mark's Church on that day (no 8.30am) and the 10.30am congregation of Christ Church will be also joining in the service.

It is a pleasure and privilege to share my personal celebration with that of the church. Over the last 50 years, much has changed in both church life and that of the community. But the fundamental role of a Christian fellowship – to worship God the Father and proclaim the good news of Jesus Christ the risen Son of God through the workings of the Holy Spirit – remain the same.

Long may we continue in that task and may God Bless us all as we celebrate this special anniversary.

Sybil Mills – In memoriam

A lifelong member of Christ Church, Sybil Mills died on 15 April at Limefield Court. Sybil was born in Central Drive – opposite Christ Church – and was connected with church activities throughout her 93 years. She was baptised, confirmed, and married her beloved Norman there.

She attended the church day school and as an adult, served on the PCC, sang in special choirs, helped with flower arranging and cleaning and was a member of Mothers' Union for well over 60 years. In later years she spent many an hour distributing the church magazine around the parish, invariably stopping for many chats en route.

As a mother, she brought her children to church to be baptised and into Sunday School. She was a regular member at the 9.00am Book of Common Prayer Holy Communion service until ill-health caused her to stop attending.

At her funeral service in church on 30 April, Sybil's many interests were highlighted, including cooking, brass band concerts, travelling and holidaying, especially to the Scilly Isles. She was the hub of her family unit and two of her grandchildren read the eulogy at her funeral. Helen and Diane paid tribute to her warm-hearted, generous nature and spoke of how she remained cheerful to the end. They described Sybil as a people-person, and the large turnout at the service was testimony to that – as was her large Christmas card list!

We give thanks for Sybil's contribution to the Walmersley community over the years and to Christ Church in particular. She will be sadly missed by so many.

May She Rest In Peace.

* On 30 April, Elizabeth Binns was licensed as an Interim Minister (Associate Priest) in the Radcliffe Team Ministry. Her move from his benefice to Radcliffe also sees her move from being an Ordained Local Minister to a Non Stipendiary Minister. Thanks to Elizabeth for all her work in our two parishes and may God bless her in this new position. I would personally like to thank her for all her assistance as I started work here last year. She remains of course a parishioner, the Head of the Library Service and an ever welcome presence within the benefice.



* Please pray for all those who are to be confirmed this month on Sunday 22 June at St.Anne's Tottington. It is always a special event in anyone's life and anyone who would like to support them would be welcome to attend at 10.30am.

* Looking forward into next month, two events at Christ Church should be put into the diary. On July 13, we are holding our Summer Praise at 10.30am. Two weeks later on 27 July we will again be having a Service of the Laying on of Hands.

* Nigel Silvester resigned from his role as Treasurer at Christ Church at the APCM in April. We need a replacement. I would like to thank Nigel for all his hard work in this important and demanding task.

NOTES FROM THE COUNCILS

ST JOHN WITH ST MARK PCC MEETING OF 15 MAY 2014

This was our first meeting of the new PCC year, and Dave welcomed all members, especially those attending for the first time. For the benefit of new members, Dave gave a brief insight into what to expect from a PCC meeting.

The main focus for this meeting was around our 50th Anniversary celebrations. It has been decided that a display of memorabilia will be available in the Chapel on Saturday 7th June during the Summer Fair. Paul has discovered an old Cine Society film from the early 1970's, which he hopes to be able to use. The Sunday service was discussed and it was agreed to disband the 8.30am service on this day to put the emphasis on the 10.30am, when Bishop David will be in attendance. There will be tea/coffee and cakes available after the Service. Final arrangements were also made for the 'Songs from the Shows' concert on the Saturday evening.

In readiness for this weekend, we would be arranging a clean- up day on Saturday 31st May to spruce up the exterior of the building. Volunteers would be needed.

Dave also gave us an overview of results of the Parish Census of 2011 and offered members the opportunity to discuss the findings, which produced some quite interesting comparisons from the previous Census in 2001. This led to a lively discussion about how these figures corresponded to our own Church life, in particular around the different age groups. It was felt that the age range which we struggle to appeal to is the 15-65 group and various suggestions were made as to what we can offer these people, both spiritually and socially.

Dave also provided us with an update on the Church organ following David Smith's sudden death in March. Ella Turner will play for two Sundays per month, with Nancy Hall & Cath Hilton providing additional cover.

Our next PCC will be held on Thursday 10th July at 8.00pm.

NOTES FROM THE COUNCILS

Christ Church PCC meeting 1st May 2014

Communion was held before the start of the meeting and after the vicar welcomed all the new members of the PCC.

The Archdeacon is to meet members of the PCC to discuss the way forward with the sale of the church field.

A new printing machine has been approved to replace the old one in the parish office as it no longer can be maintained. A paper on food safety has been forwarded to the church hall committee for action.

Ian Riddick was reappointed as PCC secretary and Anne Nuttall was appointed Lay Chair, the Revd. Don Altham was co-opted and it was agreed that Darren Dunne could attend as an observer. A new treasurer is needed for the PCC as the present treasurer is now no longer a PCC member and will retire from the post at the end of this year.

A Deanery Synod report was received from Barbara Taylor. Committees for Pastoral, Fund Raising, Standing, Field, Church Hall and Property were formed various members of the PCC being appointed to each one.

The PCC approved an Organ recital in church on Saturday the 13th September at 7.30pm by Geoff Stokes.

Faculties have been applied for new internal ladders in the church tower and a handrail at the vestry steps. It was approved that an engineer should visit Christ Church to carry out a structural survey of the church tower.

with dreams and signs, visions and wonders.


The Spirit came and is here today,

What is Pentecost?

Pentecost is the festival when Christians celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit. It is celebrated on the Sunday 50 days after Easter (the name comes from the Greek pentekoste, "fiftieth").

Pentecost is regarded as the birthday of the Christian church, and the start of the church's mission to the world.

The symbols of Pentecost are those of the Holy Spirit and include flames, wind, the breath of God and a dove.

The apostles were celebrating this festival when the Holy Spirit descended on them. It sounded like a very strong wind, and it looked like tongues of fire. The apostles then found themselves speaking in foreign languages, inspired by the Holy Spirit.

People passing by at first thought that they must be drunk, but the apostle Peter told the crowd that the apostles were full of the Holy Spirit.

What better day to hold our celebrations?

This picture was taken at one of St John with St Mark's monthly visits to Burrswood, when a sung service is held at and communion distributed to the residents.






10 Rules
