Preparing for Easter

Dear Friends

The date of Easter is determined by the phases of the moon. Easter Day is always the Sunday following the paschal full moon date - 20 March. Thus Easter can begin any date between March 21 to April 25.

This year, Easter is regarded as "late", falling as it does on 21 April. Lent therefore begins on Wednesday 6 March – forty days before Easter, excluding Sundays.

Ash Wednesday is so called because of the tradition in the ancient world of "sitting in sackcloth and ashes" as a sign of sorrow and repentance. According to the book of Jonah when the prophet preached to the people of Nineveh that they should turn from their wicked ways, the population responded by donning sackcloth and ashes.



On Ash Wednesday churches use ash – often gathered from the burning of the previous year's palm crosses – to make the sign of the cross on people's foreheads. The words "*Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return. Turn away from sin and be faithful to Christ*" are used in the liturgy.

An important principle in the Lent season is that of repentance. For Christians this means not merely saying sorry for our sins but turning away from our wrongdoing and moving in a different direction.

This Lenten prayer sums up the essence of this important part of the Church Year.

Lord our God, grant us grace to desire you with our whole heart; that so desiring, we may see and find you; and so finding, may love you; and so loving, may hate those sins from which you have delivered us; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen

May God guide and bless us as we seek to have a holy Lent in preparation for a joyful celebration of Easter.







IN MEMORIAM: Alan Standring

Alan George Standring was born in Bury on 12 May 1939. The family lived on Brook Street in the Freetown area from where Alan attended St. Mark's School.

For the past 49 years Alan & Christine have lived in the family home on Trent Drive. He was a very significant figure in the community known as the Rivers Estate and in the parish of Walmersley.

Alan had a generous nature and in the words of Christine, "he would do anything for anybody." That generosity even extended to providing some Bury black puddings to the Vicar who married him & Christine at St. George's Church Stockport in 1970. From that time on family was Alan's priority and he was a loving husband, father & grandfather.

Alan was a happy, smiling man, with a good sense of humour who was both positive and practical. That positivity was vital when in recent years ill health made life so very difficult. That practical nature was vital when he became Church Warden of Christ Church in 1996. He was the Vicar described as a hands-on warden. Welcoming to everyone who entered the building – especially young people – and someone who would turn his hand to most things.

He also served as sidesman and vergger.

At his funeral, Margery Spencer mentioned that the reason we were able to sit in church warm and dry was in no small part to Alan's persistence in making sure the new roof was built to a good standard.

Alan had a wide range of interests notably woodcarving and the Spotland Road woodcarving group in Rochdale cancelled their meeting on the day of his funeral so that they can attend the service.

In recent years Alan's ill-health meant that he was significantly restricted in his mobility and he was lovingly cared for by Christine.

He regularly received Holy Communion in his home.

Alan died at Bury Hospice on Sunday 27 January.

We give thanks to God for the life of Alan Standring.

May He Rest In Peace and Rise in Glory.



We continued through the whole of the Burrs, some of us going our separate ways at various points, alongside the River Irwell & country park waterfall before heading back onto Woodhill Road, which we walked along for a short distance before crossing back along the path towards Castlecroft Road and the second of our 'Brewery Stops', The Clarence.

Overall, we covered around 10 miles and despite the sometimes tricky conditions underfoot, the weather remained lovely and we enjoyed another super day out.



Looking beyond our boundaries

"Mary, the Mother of Jesus, in the Christian and Muslim faiths"

was the topic for our discussion in January. Father Francis Wadsworth of St Joseph's and St Marie's shared his understanding of Mary in the Christian Faith with additional words by our Vicar, the Revd Dave Thompson.

Eight members of our Benefice attended and were surprised at the respect and reverence given to Mary in the Muslim Faith. Saqib Shah told us that Mary, the mother of Jesus is the only woman mentioned in the Quran. Chapter 19 of the Quran is named after her and the name Mary, or Maryam, is mentioned in 12 chapters, (34 times in all).

The talks were followed by lively discussion groups before supper was served.

John Wesley

This talk, to our Mothers' Union group, was the second in a series by David Andrew on important figures in the Protestant Church. The first, in October 2018, was on Martin Luther. This evening we heard about John Wesley and how he founded the Methodist movement.

John was born in Epworth in Lincolnshire, one of nineteen children of Samuel Wesley and his wife Susanna. Ten of the children survived to adulthood. John's brother Charles is also noteworthy, having written thousands of hymns, of which 156 appear in the Methodist Hymn Book. About 38 survive in the Anglican hymn books, including "Hark! the herald angels sing" and "Love divine, all loves excelling".

Samuel was a priest in Epworth but had debts and spent time in prison, leaving a debt of £100 on his death. The children had a rigorous education, with six hours of lessons per day. They were taught the Lord's Prayer and made to say it morning and evening. They learnt the alphabet on the first day and Greek language by the age of ten! Both John and Charles had a public school education; John at Charterhouse School and Charles at Westminster School. Both then went to Christ Church College, Oxford.

When Samuel became ill, they walked 150 miles from Oxford to Epworth, then walked back to Oxford. Typically they walked 25 miles a day. John became a fellow of Lincoln College, Oxford and went to work in Epworth. Later he went as a missionary to Georgia, in British America. This was not totally successful and he returned to England after 2 or 3 years.

In the Church of England of the early 18th century the majority of clergy had little inclination to improve the spiritual welfare of the congregation. Communion was infrequent and performed carelessly. The clergy lived almost entirely amongst the upper classes. John Wesley worked to try to improve the status of Christianity. Methodist meetings were held in the open air around the country. In February 1742 a new meeting room in Bristol needed debts to be defrayed. It was suggested that each person would pay one penny a week. He arranged collection of clothes for the poor. He tackled the unemployment of the day by setting up what we would call a cottage industry. Why was he so successful? His message was life-giving for the poor, and encouraged upward mobility. Lives were changed because of his message and people genuinely felt that their lives were touched by the power of God.

It was emphasised that no Methodist teaching was intended to usurp the Church of England, and no meetings were arranged which would clash with the Anglican services. Methodist societies sprang up in the Midlands, Yorkshire and Newcastle. He became very popular and a circle of friends ensured that each meeting was well-prepared.

John's 22 Questions of Accountability seem as relevant now as then.

1. Am I consciously or unconsciously creating the impression that I am better than I really am? In other words, am I a hypocrite?
2. Am I honest in all my acts and words, or do I exaggerate?
3. Do I confidentially pass on to another what was told to me in confidence?
4. Can I be trusted?
5. Am I a slave to dress, friends, work or habits?
6. Am I self-conscious, self-pitying, or self-justifying?
7. Did the Bible live in me today?
8. Do I give it time to speak to me every day?
9. Am I enjoying prayer? *(Get help from a minister or trusted Christian friend if you aren't – there are many ways to pray)*
10. When did I last speak to someone else about my faith?
11. Do I pray about the money I spend?
12. Do I go to bed on time and get up on time?
13. Do I disobey God in anything?
14. Do I insist upon doing something about which my conscience is uneasy?
15. Am I defeated in any part of my life?
16. Am I jealous, impure, critical, irritable, touchy or distrustful?
17. How do I spend my spare time?
18. Am I proud?
19. Do I thank God that I am not like other people? *(See Luke 18: 9-14)*
20. Is there anyone whom I fear, dislike, disown, criticize, hold a resentment toward or disregard?
21. Do I grumble or complain constantly?
22. Is Christ real to me?
