

Looking down on creation

Do you remember that song by the Carpenters "I'm on the top of the world looking down on creation"? It came into my head as I stood at 1581 feet above sea level, about to launch myself off over the edge of a Welsh Slate mine on a zip wire. This was one of the most desolate scenes I have ever observed, it was almost barren, just the odd tuft of vegetation and below me sharp shards of slate in man-made holes, almost apocalyptic. It was like no other mountain top I've ever been on. I was surrounded by the destruction of the landscape by humankind.

What have we done to creation? Could the whole earth look like this if we're not careful? Nigel and I are in the midst of watching the latest series by Professor Brian Cox on 'The Planets' and it's brought it home to us that it doesn't take much for a planet to become unviable. Is that where we're heading?

Here in Manchester Diocese everything we do as a church (and individuals) should be measured against the 'Five Marks of Mission', the last of which is 'To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation, and sustain and renew the life of the earth'.

It sounds like a mammoth task and ask doesn't it! But if we break it down into small bits it might just become something that's do-able for each one of us never mind our age!

I truly believe that God and therefore Jesus had his hand on the creation of our planet and therefore it is my duty as a Christian to do my bit in preserving this planet. Don't stop reading this now!! I'm not going to go on about how, etc; I'll leave that to Sir David Attenborough or Hugh Fearnely-Whittingstall.



Not only is the planet a creation of God, but each one of us too. One of my other vivid recollections in song was standing on a lush Austrian mountainside, with a large group of Christians, on a holiday and was singing the song 'I am a new creation, no more in condemnation, here in the grace of God I stand'. I hope you know the one – if not look it up on YouTube if you can.

Each one of us becomes a new creation when we give our lives back to God and it's by the power of the Holy Spirit that we can! It's by God's grace and Jesus' sacrifice that we have inherited the earth and all the bounteousness that it provides for us. So what shall we do? As the song says 'tell of all that he has done'. Show the world how much we care for each other, the planet, and ourselves. There is an old adage that says actions speak louder than words; so live lightly and kindly and be ready to tell folks why we do.



From the Vicarage

- * Christ Church are again planning to open church each Tuesday afternoon during the summer months. If you able to help between 2-4pm please sign up on the sheet at the back of church. We hope to be able to be open each Tuesday until the end of August.
- * Thanks to everyone who prepared and supported the Summer Fair at St.John with St.Mark last month. These are always special occasions for both the church and local community. The Christmas Fair is scheduled for Saturday 30 November. Please also look out for a Festive Afternoon Tea at Christ Church around that time.
- * Next year sees two significant milestones as we mark both the 10th anniversary of the creation of the United Benefice of Walmersley Road and 250 years since the parish of St. John was formed. We will be celebrating these events in a number of ways throughout 2020.
- * A service of Holy Communion with hymns takes place at Burrswood House on the last Thursday of each month at 2.00pm. The residents and staff are always keen for people to join them at this service. Everyone is welcome to attend.
- * Please let a member of the ministry team know if anyone is ill and requires a home or hospital visit. At the heart of our ministry to the parish is pastoral care. This is not the exclusive concern of the clergy but part of each Christian's duty to love one another.
- * Any enquiries about baptisms or weddings / marriage banns etc should be made at the Parish Office at St.John with St.Mark's Hall any Wednesday evening between 6.30-7.00.
- * The Ministry Team consisting of all the Clergy, Licensed Readers and our Authorised Lay Minister meet every month – usually on the second Monday evening. If you have an issue that you would like us to discuss, please contact one of the team.

* Porch Boxes is always in need of food items to meet current demand. A box is available at the back of both churches. Items are also sometimes donated to the Booth Centre in Manchester. The Centre was previously based at Manchester Cathedral and aims to bring about positive change in the lives of people who are experiencing homelessness or at risk of homelessness - to help them plan for and realise a better future. Thanks to those who regularly support these worthy causes.

* Regular attenders to church are encouraged to join our planned giving scheme. If you would like to do so or would like some further information, please speak to one of the Treasurers or Wardens.

NOTES FROM THE COUNCILS (1)

St. John with St. Mark PCC meeting of 29th May 2019

Paul has sent a message thanking us all for the donation given to him prior to his licensing at St. Stephen's Elton.

Upcoming social dates include: Scout's cream tea on Saturday 6th July; coffee morning at Pam Cowie's on Saturday 13th July and coffee morning & book fair in the Church Hall on Saturday 20th July.

A list of actions from the Quinquennial, both completed and outstanding, has been sent to PCC members. It is likely we will set up a small team to identify and work on any minor jobs. However contractors are likely to be required for others.

The new flexistep lift, linking Church to Hall, was installed on the day of the meeting. PCC members took the opportunity to see how this works and to ask questions. This starts off as a set of steps and can be converted to a lift for the use of wheelchairs, prams and people with limited mobility. It was also noted that the path at the side entrance has been widened.

The 250th anniversary of the Parish of St. John is next June 2020 and a small sub-committee will meet to discuss ideas for marking this occasion. It will meet at the Vicarage on Wednesday 26th June.

It has been observed that several memorial items are being left on the Garden of Remembrance. It has been agreed that a notice should be placed to advise families that PCC permission needs to be sought before items can be placed there and guidance to families of relatives who have ashes interred will be given going forward.

Following the Electoral Roll review we now have 90 names on the roll, as opposed to 120 from six year's ago. It has also been noted that very few people have completed the GDPR section on the forms correctly and this will be chased up.

Items of expenditure and income since the last meeting were discussed.

The Vicar passed round an updated Mission Action Plan following the joint PCC meeting in March. There was a brief discussion on this including ecumenical links and how we have adapted to the closure of the library 18 months ago.

The next PCC meeting will be held on Thursday 25th July at 8.00pm.

NOTES FROM THE COUNCILS (2)

Christ Church PCC meeting report for the 12.06.19.

1. In matters arising, on the outstanding decision on the type of new chairs, it was decided to order grey black chairs the same as existing chairs in the church hall.
2. The election of lay chair was passed to the next PCC meeting.
3. The treasurer's report was presented and it was agreed that we pay £1500 per month ongoing towards the parish share.
4. The sale of the field was discussed and it was reported that the Heads of Terms have been agreed and the contract is being prepared for signature.
5. The Friends of Walmersley had sent an email to the vicar requesting answers to questions about the sale; these were discussed at the PCC and the vicar will respond.
6. The war graves commission signs have been installed at two points on the churchyard wall. A leaflet giving information regarding the graves will be prepared for visitors to church.
7. Vocations, Ian Banks commissioning and Nigel Silvester's re-commissioning ALM service, will be at the cathedral on the 22nd September 2019 at 2.30pm.
8. Barbara Silvester is to be appointed reader Emeritus on the 14th July at 3pm in the cathedral.
9. It was noted that the church will be open every Tuesday afternoon in the summer (June, July, August) between 2 and 4 pm.
10. There will be a brass band Christmas concert on the 7th of December at Christ Church.
11. The Mission action plan was discussed by the vicar and he asked the PCC to think if anything else should be added to the mission action plan.
12. Next year the Benefice is 10 years old and it was decided to put this on the agenda for the next meeting to determine how it should be celebrated.

13. It was decided to ask Bury Council to continue cutting the grass in the church field.
14. It was also decided to have the grass cut in the church yard as soon as possible and again at a later date in the year.
15. The garden of remembrance was proposed by the vicar to be extended towards the east of the existing garden, at the vote all the PCC were in favour. The plan for doing this was then discussed. The gates at the side of the garden of remembrance will need to be removed and a wall built in place of them.
16. The question of trimming or cutting down certain trees in the churchyard was discussed and the secretary will speak to the church architect before any action is taken.



We invite you to use this prayer as a basis each day for your own intercessions, which will doubtless change from week to week.

A Prayer for each Day of the Week was written by a Mothers' Union member, Dr Richard Appleton and is published in "Dear Lord".

Sunday is for Service:

to serve God and serve others first and ourselves last.

Lord, we pray that we will serve you and our neighbour in all and not just some of the things we say and do and think.

Monday is for Materialism:

for many there is simply no place, space or need for God.

Lord we pray that we will never forget that all we have has been gifted by you. Grant us a Christ-led and Christ-filled approach to how we use our money and gifts.

Tuesday is for Threat:

we live in a world that is full of threats – threats to our physical, emotional and spiritual lives; threats that can easily separate us from God.

FORMBY RETREAT 2019



This year's retreat to the St. Joseph's prayer centre near the National Trust reserve in Formby was once again held the week leading up to the second May Bank Holiday.

The theme for our bible studies this year was the 'Miracles of Jesus' and we had several thought provoking sessions on some of these miracles and

how they relate to our daily lives in the year 2019.

We looked at the earliest miracle, the changing of water into wine at the Wedding in Cana; the healing of the demon-possessed man; Jairus' daughter; the feeding of the five thousand; Jesus walking on the water and the story of Lazarus. It was good to be able to look at some of these very familiar stories in more detail than we are usually used to.

Each of the morning sessions was preceded by Morning Prayer, whilst we closed our later sessions with Evening Prayer using the booklets set aside for 'Thy Kingdom Come' week. It was felt that this gave a different voice and feel to the services in a more informal atmosphere. This has since resulted in some of us subsequently leading worship during the week of 'Thy Kingdom Come' from Ascension Day to Pentecost.

SHOEBOX APPEAL 2019

North West Air Ambulance ~ Mothers' Union



Sarah was our invited speaker for the evening on 5th June, and gave a very interesting talk about the North West Air Ambulance and how it operates.

It was founded as a rescue service in 1999. The AA (Automobile Association) recognised that the North West did not have a rescue air ambulance service and that they were far behind the rest of the UK. The AA funded the set up and operation for 3 years for it to get off the ground. Hence the colour yellow of the helicopter.

Sarah told us of the many varied situations that the team, pilot and paramedics have to face and the difficulty they have landing the craft in some areas of the country. The time it takes the helicopter to get to the emergency is far quicker than an on road ambulance, saving many lives by being able to attend to the patient much sooner and getting them to the nearest hospital much quicker by avoiding road congestion. The training is also a key factor as the paramedics also have to undertake pilot training and have a vast medical background.

To run a helicopter it cost nearly £1000.00 per hour for fuel alone. There are various medical kits on board to provide the correct immediate care for adults and children in an emergency. In some situations the helicopter cannot be used due to the location and then a ground vehicle is used to transport the injured to the helicopter for immediate air lift.

It cost 8.4 Million pounds a year for the service to be maintained. This is all achieved by fundraising and donations. In many situations a person who has been assisted in a crisis goes on to fundraise in the future.

Our evening was well attended and raised £204.71. Our members and visitors made voluntary donations and purchased items from the gift shop that Sarah brought with her. We thank everyone for their generosity.

On Wednesday 12th June the Open Group welcomed Nigel Silvester. Nigel had first visited us last year to discuss his own personal life journey and we realised after there was scope for a part two. This time around Nigel offered to talk about the Isles of Scilly, where he spent his childhood. Apparently none of our members have ever been so it was new to us all. We were advised this was not a history of the islands (that's perhaps the theme for another meeting), but merely an insight into life on the islands and what there is to do. This was aided by photographs on the projector screen (Nigel & Barbara looked extremely relaxed sat outdoors with a glass of white wine each).

We started, rather appropriately, with how to get there. Ferry is one option, but for those not keen on the water then there is always the SkyBus aircraft, which will hold around 8 people. It's like sitting in the back of a taxi apparently!

Our evening's entertainment included a look across most of the islands, including St. Mary's, St. Martin's, St. Agnes & Tresco. There was some great scenery and landmarks featured, including some shots of St. Mary's Parish Church in Hugh Town. The area looked extremely peaceful and I observed how beautifully clear the water looked. We also received a brief history of the politician Augustus Smith, who was largely responsible for the Islands' economy today.

As well as being a good advert for the Isles of Scilly, Nigel's talk was very light hearted and included the story of the Isles of Scilly football league consisting of the same two teams who play each other each week and also the hunt for a Sunday newspaper, which comes out on a Monday!

The main industry on the Isles of Scilly is tourism, which accounts for around 80% of the islands' income, and Nigel did his bit tonight with his talk and also the various travel brochures for us to take away. Nigel thinks there is mileage for part three next year if we agree to have him back, which I'm sure we will. Thanks for an insight into these lovely islands and the stories we heard.


