

PCC Secretary's report

The PCC has not met in person since the last APCM, in addition there has been one Zoom meeting and one meeting using email.

The PCC has the responsibility of working with the minister of the Parish in promoting within the ecclesiastical parish the whole mission of the church: pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical. It also has the maintenance responsibilities for the church building, church hall, churchyard and adjacent field.

The following are the main points discussed during 2020/2021

- The Zoom meeting on the 28th of July was held to agree that we get a charities act report valuation for the field. In addition, the question of VAT for the church was discussed and other contract points were also discussed.
- The email meeting was held in order to get each PCC members views on various options regarding the contract for the field.

Financial Review for year ended 31st December 2020

2020 was a totally unprecedented year with the Covid-19 pandemic affecting us from mid-March. Christ Church remained open for private prayer and for public worship whenever lockdowns allowed. Financially we survived far better than many other churches, although we did continue to operate very close to the agreed reserves level of £5,000.

We are grateful to those who moved their giving to standing order during this year and would encourage all who are able to do so. Many ensured envelopes were filled weekly even though they were unable to come to church but nevertheless our planned giving levels fell by 6.2%. Plate collections however fell by 46% to £2,683.

In 2019 we had paid 85% of our Parish Share ie £25,500 and following a Discussion and Agreement meeting with diocesan officials had agreed figures for the following three years. This meant that in 2020 we were asked for £27,000 (instead of the calculated £33,740) but it was important that this was met and we are able to confirm that this was achieved. By paying on a regular basis throughout the year we have also received a £540 credit from the Encouragement Scheme.

Generally, income streams fell significantly or disappeared completely with the restrictions in place, as would be expected. Similarly, many expenses fell significantly.

The result is a deficit of expenditure over income in restricted funds of £37 and in general funds of £616.

Restricted income and expenditure relate mainly to churchyard maintenance with a need for people to access family graves.

As reported last year, whilst negotiations continue regarding the potential sale of the church field, we continue to incur significant professional fees, including our solicitor the Diocesan Registrar. Most will be paid from the sale proceeds but we did have to pay £1,500 for the required report for the Charity Commission (effectively giving us a surplus for the year in general funds of £884).

On a positive note, we benefitted from being less dependent on church hall rents and on fundraising than are many parishes. From a less positive perspective, we have a mainly elderly

congregation and are unlikely to recover completely from the effects of the past year. The position in 2021 is of great concern and currently we are operating very close to our reserve level. The financial position of the Diocese of Manchester is of great concern also. We have been asked, as in 2020, for an estimate of how much parish share we shall be able to contribute and at present I feel unable to confirm our ability to meet the agreed figure of £29,000.

As we hopefully move closer to the sale of our field, we must take our ongoing financial position, as well as the vision for the church in this diocese, into our plans for the future. To repeat what I said last year, we need to be in a position to take the Parish of Christ Church Walmersley forward as a living, vibrant, enthusiastic, growing body of Christians, with a mission to spread God's love throughout our community. We shall not do that unless we are willing to commit ourselves spiritually, practically and financially.

PLANNED GIVING & GIFT AID 2020.

As at the end of the current financial year, there are 52 members in the Planned Giving Scheme.

Receipts through the scheme for the twelve months to 31st December 2020 totalled £29,415, a DECREASE of £1,966 over the previous year.

Of the members 45 have signed Gift Aid declarations, resulting in an estimated tax rebate claim to be made of £6,779.

I would ask any taxpayers who have not already done so to consider completing a Gift Aid declaration. Each £10 given is then worth £12.50 to the church.

Independent Examiner's Report to

The Parochial Church Council of Christ Church, Walmersley

I report on the financial statements of the Charity for the year ended 31 December 2020, which are set out in the accompanying pages.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

As PCC members you are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements. The PCC members consider that an audit is not required for this year (under section 144 of the Charities Act 2011 (the 2011 Act)) and that an independent examination is needed.

- examine the accounts (under section 145(1)(a) of the 2011 Act);
- to follow the procedures laid down in the General Directions given by the Charity Commission (under section 145(5)(b) of the 2011 Act);
- to state whether particular matters have come to my attention

Basis of independent examiner's report

My examination was carried out in accordance with the General Directions given by the Charity Commission. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeking explanations from you as trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the accounts.

- As we nurture them in worship, learning, and in community life, we will respect the wishes and feelings of Children and Young People.

We managed to begin 2020 with a couple of walks in crisp winter sunshine. On 11th January we took a trip around one of our regular haunts, the three reservoirs of Bolton, namely Jumbles, Turton & Entwistle and Wayoh. From what I remember of this, it was unusually mild for mid-January. These reservoirs are always great places to visit and not too far away. Once restrictions are eased I would recommend a visit if you possess a car. Even if you do not fancy the walk, you will find it pleasant just to spend time sitting around the reservoirs.

Some of us also completed this walk again on 21st March, just before the lockdown began.

Just three of us set off on 8th February for a local walk taking in Burrs, Kirklees Valley, Irwell Sculpture Trail and Summerseat. I recall this being another pleasant day with many people about; just before a storm was to take hold causing severe flooding for parts of this area and beyond.
