## ***A positive contribution***

Dear Friends,

As I write, we are experiencing once again some of the hottest weather in recent years. Earlier in the summer, record breaking temperatures were recorded throughout the country. There is no doubt in my mind that the effects of climate change are being seen in these weather patterns and other environmental issues.

The fifth Mark of Mission states the need "to strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth". This is more than a commitment to recycling or the like. It is a fundamental change to the way in which we live as we seek to play our part in caring for God's world. There are many resources available online that help in this campaign.

Eco-church is a project that has developed in recent years to encourage churches to assess their role in this part of our mission. The Eco Church movement encourages and supports churches in their care for God's creation across five areas of church life:

*worship and teaching*

*buildings*

*land*

*community and global engagement*

*lifestyle*



Churches are asked to complete an online Eco Survey about how they are caring for God's earth in different areas of their life and work. The answers provided will collect points towards an Eco Church Award. In this Diocese each church has been asked to assess our Energy Footprint Tool. This enables us to examine how our buildings use energy and find out our "carbon footprint".

As we enter the season of Creation - which lasts from 1 September to 4 October - it is good to monitor the impact that our lifestyles have on the environment and how we can make a positive contribution to the world that God made.

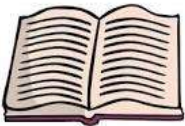

## From the Vicarage

- \* The announcement of my forthcoming move was made on 10 July. I have been appointed the Vicar of the Benefice of Christ Church, Heaton & St. Margaret, Halliwell in the Deanery of Bolton. I expect to move sometime in October. More about this in next month's magazine.
- \* The Christ Church Parochial Church Council have agreed to extend the Garden of Remembrance by way of a communal area for the interment of ashes. Subject to Diocesan approval, work will begin as soon as possible. The plots in the current Garden of Remembrance can still be used for future interments. Please have a word with me if you require any more details.
- \* At St. John with St. Mark, the application to remove some pews from the back of church has been made to the Diocesan Advisory Committee and it is hoped that this can take place later this year.
- \* Christ Church now has the facility for contactless payments. The card reading machine is situated at the back of church. If you wish to use this, please contact one of the church officers at Christ Church.
- \* Progress on the Christ Church field is currently awaiting the outcome of the planning application by Morris Homes. A proposal was made to Bury Council earlier this year and it could be some time before the result of the application is known.
- \* The Men of the Benefice (MOB) meet on the last Monday of each month. We usually gather at the Towler Inn from 8pm, although in September we are holding a farewell meal at Waterfold Farm on Monday 26<sup>th</sup>. Further details on the weekly sheets.
- \* The Parish Office is open every Wednesday evening between 6.30-7.00pm at St. John with St. Mark Church Hall. This can be for enquiries about baptisms or weddings or any other matter.

### **St. John with St. Mark PCC meeting of 28th July 2022**

- Fit and Proper Person declarations – new members need to complete.
- Faculty for removing pews at back of church – the application has now been made to the DAC and a notice has been put up in Church. We will also be removing the extra bit of carpet at the end of the aisle to make better use of the space.
- Magazine - It has been agreed to continue with the current printer and there is no desire to increase the cost per issue.
- Parish share – We have received a thank you for what we have paid this year. The 2023 Parish share however will be set based upon the figures from the income survey prior to 2020. Meetings surrounding Parish share are likely to take place soon.
- Ian has given us an update on the half yearly accounts. It has been noted that our budget for the year is so far on track.
- Vicar's report – This included the latest on the Mission Community and there has been a delay in appointing a focal leader. There was also some information about the #MoreThanSunday campaign and the Eco Church survey. The Vicar also announced that Nigel Silvester would retire in September and become AML Emeritus. The Carol service is scheduled for Sunday 18th December and it has been suggested that this year we have a service at each Church in the Benefice.
- Seedfield development. A meeting has recently taken place between residents, Church people and the bowling club concerning the housing development on the site of the former Seedfield School on Parkinson Street. A map of the proposed plan was shown to the PCC. The main concern from the residents' meeting was access to and from the site, both during building work and once the houses are built. It is likely that Parkinson Street would be the only access road and possible proposals about how that would work are being discussed.
- Plans for Interregnum – A meeting is to take place shortly with the Area Dean and other Clergy regarding service cover. The Rector, Julian Heaton, will host a joint PCC meeting on Thursday 8th September at 8.00pm in the Barritt Room.
- Church surroundings – We have a volunteer to tend the Church gardens. It has been suggested that we put together a working party and arrange a Church clean up day at some point.
- Health & Safety – Keith advised that we are still requiring first aiders for the Church.

Next PCC Meeting is on Tuesday 20th September at 7.30pm.

Nigel began by giving us an overview of the work of Trinity House, responsible for the maintenance of lighthouses across the country as well as other maritime aids. We were then treated to an array of images of lighthouses of all shapes and sizes across different parts of the Scilly Isles. All maintained by a dedicated team of volunteers, right down to the cleaning of the lenses.



The Bishop Rock lighthouse with its distinguishing helipad was a notable landmark for us to see.

The second half of Nigel's talk about lifeboats was also enlightening, starting with the earliest vessels, right up to the new modern boats. There were also some poignant pictures from days gone by of lifeboat crews. It is worth noting that these are all volunteers who put their lives at risk to help others, and some of these have been Nigel's relatives. Such is the dedication of these people that one has even been a subject of 'This Is Your Life'. All in all, a very informative talk, which was complete with the usual stunning images of the Isles of Scilly. Oh, and Nigel also does a good impression of a fog siren! There was a poignant end to this talk though, as we were reminded of the words of the famous hymn 'Eternal Father strong to save, whose arm does bind the restless wave'.

Thank you to all who have attended over the summer. As we move into autumn, we have the rescheduled talk from Julian Hartley on Wednesday 14th September entitled, "From PC to FD to I". This will be in the Barritt Room at 7.30pm and all are welcome, with tea and coffee to end.
