

#### Summary of St John with St Mark meeting on 28th March 2023

- The Diocesan DBS & safeguarding statement has now changed to amalgamate both the policies for young people and vulnerable adults. This will be discussed and approved at the APCM. In the absence of an Incumbent, we need to appoint a registered officer.
- Mission Community: Please refer to the page in the magazine for updates on the Bury Mission Community.
- Seedfield proposed building work: Meetings are due to take place between residents and representatives.
- Finance: The DEC appeal for the earthquake in Turkey and Syria has raised £430.00; It was noted that the magazine has now had the price removed from the front cover and a notice inside concerning a suggested cost, as the previous 50p asking price is no longer covering the printing costs; We are shortly due to receive a card reading machine for offertory and other donations.
- Warden's report: Thanks to Ray Smith and John Brennan, who have recently re-laid the floor tiles at the back of Church to remove the bump which had appeared.
- The service rota has been compiled for April to June, however it
  was noted that the Wednesday and Thursday services have
  been the difficult ones to cover, as opposed to Sunday
  mornings.
- Future dates: The coffee morning and book fair has been moved to Saturday 15th April. There will not be one on the 29th.
- The APCM is on Sunday 16th April at 12noon. Some members' terms of office are up and they will need to be re-elected at the APCM if willing to stand.

#### **Summary of Christ Church meeting on 12 April 2023**

- 1. Opening prayers were led by the Lay Chair.
- 2. Minutes for the 6<sup>th</sup> March 2023 were approved.
- 3. A letter was received from the Area Dean and the Deanery Budget Secretary to thank us for payment of the diocesan parish share in full.
- 4. A concern was expressed by members at the reduction in the amount of giving in the communion plate.
- 5. The audited accounts were approved by the PCC. The accounts were signed by the treasurer and one of the church wardens.
- 6. The bill for £1,764.00 for the repair of the heating and improvement of the heating controls had been paid.
- 7. Regarding the mission community, it was decided that the secretary would offer the use of church hall at Christ Church during the visit of the new Bishop of Bolton to the Mission Communityon the 19<sup>th</sup> July 2023.
- 8. Thanks were given to Geoff Stokes and Jennifer Wood for their attendance at the training course for the new contactless giving device in church. A discussion was held regarding the security and location of the device. It was decided to keep the earlier device for use when paying fees for weddings or funerals.
- 9. The secretary confirmed that he was still working on the answers to the questions raised by the diocese on the faculty application for the new garden of remembrance.
- 10. The safeguarding officer confirmed there was nothing to report.
- 11. We are still awaiting a response from the diocese regarding the appointment of two new trustees for Christ Church Walmersley.
- 12. The property committee had not reported back on the woodworm issue in the church hall main room; the secretary will contact the property committee to find out their decision.
- 13. Easter cards and a flyer had been distributed around the parish.
- 14. The fund-raising committee gave an update on the forthcoming Coronation event in the church hall on 7<sup>th</sup> May 2023
- 15. A request had been received from Barclays bank regarding the Baldingstone trust, a form was required to be filled in by the trustees.

The meeting closed with prayer.

The meeting took place on Sunday 16th April at 12noon and began with the election of Church Wardens.

- The approval of the new amalgamated policy for the safeguarding of young people and also vulnerable adults was discussed and then formally approved. In the absence of an Incumbent, our safeguarding officer is the person of responsibility.
- Ian presented the accounts in the usual detailed manner however this time there was an opportunity to look at the changes in the finances over the last 10 years. There were some notable changes, particularly with the reduction of people in the planned giving scheme, but also of the increase in hall rentals. The independent examiner's report was approved.
- The usual reports from Church life were in the booklets ahead of the meeting for people to read beforehand.
- Thanks were made to all those who have covered services from across the Mission Community, and beyond, since the Interregnum began.

There was the election of representatives to the Deanery Synod, PCC and Deputy wardens. The following are now members of the PCC at St. John with St. Mark, who should be contacted if you have an issue which you would like raised:

# #MoreThanSunday



The Bury Mission Community #MTS group met on Saturday 22nd April at St. John with St. Mark for a discussion on the seventh shift of the course, focusing on 'Communication and Information'.

Before this, there was an opportunity to hear from the Church of the Resurrection and St. Barnabas, in Beswick, about how they have considered further action from the last session on 'Commissioning'. A suggestion has been shared as to how the set Gospel readings for certain Sundays could be the basis for commissioning different groups of people. This month's session began with a look at the different ways we share our information around the wider Church. There is a need to cater for different groups of people. Our regular worshippers, who may not be as used to electronic communications on offer, are still very reliant on a weekly pew sheet, monthly magazine or notice boards to update them on goings on. But, how do we get this information out to the wider community? It is important that our Churches now have an attractive website, which is kept updated and refreshed, and Churches can also be found on the 'A Church Near You' site. Social media feeds are increasingly important, not just to tell us what happens on a Sunday, but also for sharing events and news from our groups which meet during the week. As a Benefice, we are currently very good at using all the methods of communication available to us, both electronic and paper. It is also important to ensure that our communications do not just contain information, but to spread the word about Jesus and our faith. Jesus himself did not have a Church building, but spread the good news of his Kingdom through the people in the wider community. There was also some guidance as to how we can make our online tools safe places, and do not become a source of confrontation. It was concluded though that the most important form of communicating our Church life is through ourselves as its members.

As this was the last Saturday Diocesan session, thanks were given to everybody who has been involved across the Deaneries, and for giving up their precious Saturday morning to share a part of this journey. There is one final session, when we will take a look at next steps, further action and an opportunity to meet members of the #MoreThanSunday team. This will be on Thursday 25th May at 7.30pm at a venue to be confirmed, although this is likely to be the new Diocesan offices at St. John's House on The Rock.



A recent meeting, led by Archdeacon Jean, was lively and different as we learnt a little about Sacred Pathways, based on the book of that name by Gary Thomas. Jean gave examples of various ways to connect with God before inviting everyone to complete a questionnaire. This gave an indication of our individual profiles, highlighting areas on which we may choose to focus our attention going forward. Is your pathway Activist, Ascetic, Caregiver, Contemplative, Enthusiast, Intellectual, Naturalist, Sensate, Traditionalist, or most likely a combination? Some members were happy to share their scores with friends over a cuppa, whilst others took the opportunity to ask Jean questions. We thank her for giving this time to us, away from sorting and packing before moving to Winchester, and we assured her of our prayers.

At our meeting on 3 May Barbara Taylor will speak about the Royal Maundy and share her recent experience as a recipient.

Julia Rowlands will be our speaker on 17 May, telling us about the work of Porch Boxes, a local charity supported by both our churches. We shall have a collection at this meeting or you may prefer to bring an item you know is needed by the families they support.

Both these meetings begin at 7.30pm in the Hall.

On Thursday, 11 May at 7pm we shall join with members from across Bury and Rossendale for our annual Deanery Festival, being held at Bury Parish Church. Our deanery leader, Tricia Stokes, has invited Revd Paul Sanderson to preach at this service.

Especially in the first few years, the worldwide Mothers' Union has played a vital part in the success of Thy Kingdom Come, a global prayer movement from Ascension to Pentecost. See page 20 for more information and please get involved.

My thanks to those members who have recently cleaned, refreshed, replaced the items we provide, in bags and cases, for children to use during our services. Also thank you to those members who undertake to check these each month. This is just a small way in which we can make it easier for families in church.

Please don't forget the "New Neighbour" cards – a project instigated by us – to welcome anyone moving into your locality and these are available in church.

There is still time to get tickets for our Annual Gathering, "Transformation in Action" on Friday September 22<sup>nd</sup> at York Barbican. Tickets are available from the main Mothers' Union website £23.50. There will be a keynote address by Sheran Harper, our Worldwide President, prayer and reflections with Bishop Emma, our Central Chaplain, and inspiring member stories from here and overseas. This will be followed by Evensong at York Minster with the Archbishop of York. Please have a word with me if you would like more details.

The Men of the Benefice met on Monday 27th March at The Towler for a talk that was probably unexpected for our group, and that was on the theme of midwifery. The meeting was led by Larissa Heath. We were not quite sure how we would find this one, but it was a pleasant surpise to see how

the group interacted and how informative we found the talk. Larissa, who qualified as a midwife in 2013, opened with an introduction of herself and then on the origins and history of midwifery. It dates back further than what you would think.

The talk then continued with the development of the practice and how it became a full profession, and there was also a link to witchcraft. Larissa told us about some of the history of midwifery across other countries of the world.

Later we focussed on midwifery in this country since the 1900's, which have seen some big scientific and medical advances, including the introduction of the NHS. You will have seen some of these developments if you are a fan of 'Call The Midwife'.

Larissa then went on to tell us how a baby is developed during the course of a pregnancy, something I have to confess I had not given much thought to previously, but it was quite informative to see. The various types of birthing options were also explained.

Finally, we ended with a quiz. How did we get on? Surprisingly, quite well, and it did get competitive between the two tables.

Thank you to Larissa for an extremely interesting evening and for educating us on a subject that some of us had possibly not previously given much consideration to.

The Open Group resumed for their first meeting of the year on Wednesday 22nd March. As it was Lent, I thought it would be a good idea to have a look at the Stations of the Cross posters we have

hanging in Church. Our poster images were designed by the Benedictine Sisters of Turvey Abbey. We took an old-style theme of looking at each of the 15 posters individually, with their various designs and images, from Jesus' condemnation to death to his burial in the tomb. Then we reflected on each one with a bible verse, the stage of Jesus' journey to the cross and how we could relate that stage to our own lives. Thank you to everybody who attended that, as it was another 'first' for me to lead a session of that nature.

Our meeting on 12th April was led by Ian and the theme was a lady who was very much a part of our lives for a good number of years, the Reverend Doctor Una Kroll. Una was a regular face in our congregation from 2003 after retiring here, and it was good to hear a bit about her history, as possibly not many of us knew as much about Una as we should.

Ian's talk began with the early days of Una's life and her family, before going on to focus on her journey of faith and ministry. Una was a key voice in the ordination of women to the priesthood in the Anglican Church. We were reminded of the passionate life that Una had with the Church and of course the moment in 1978 when she called down from the gallery at General Synod, "we asked for bread, and you gave us a stone". Una was eventually ordained by the then Bishop of Monmouth, Rowan Williams.

Una's life spent with us was always memorable, including her visits to study group, leading worship and support to lay people. At the end of the meeting the floor was then opened to those present to offer their own memories of Una.

Una was also an author of several books and Ian brought a selection to the meeting, along with various pictures and newspaper cuttings. If you are interested in reading any of Una's books, including her autobiography 'Bread not Stones' then please see Ian.

## Thy Kingdom Come



These ideas are taken from the Thy Kingdom Come website. Different suggestions will appeal to different people, or fit better into your family life. All have been tried and tested in the years since 2016 when the

Archbishops encouraged us to pray at this time. So, from Ascension Day to Pentecost (18<sup>th</sup> to 28<sup>th</sup> May) let's each find ways to pray for each other. There would still be time to organise one or two of these ideas but many only need you to focus for a few minutes each day for just 11 days.

Let's pray together, for our friends, neighbours and communities to know the love of Christ. Why not simply commit to praying for 5 people during Thy Kingdom Come? They could be members of your family, neighbours on your street, or colleagues at work.



There are so many creative ways to do this. You could write down the names of the 5 people you're praying for on your phone, on your mirror or on a little card as a reminder to pray for them throughout the day. You could use a band and tie 5 knots, each one representing one of your 5 or maybe each time you drink a cup of tea or coffee you could remember to pray for them. Or perhaps you could pray during your daily exercise such as running or walking – holding one person each day in prayer then praying for them all collectively on the last day.

If two or three could spare a little time to get together beforehand, why not set up a trail in the churchyard or garden? Go to cheekypandas.com for resources.

'Say One for Me' is simply asking people "If you could pray today, what would you pray for?" Then taking those requests and lifting them to God.

At some point could we find the opportunity to open our churches for continuous prayer? It doesn't need to be 24/7 – any time we spent focussing on people's needs would be valuable.




'Pray On The Hills' - standing physically above a village or town can be a great spur to prayer. It could be a small or larger group, it could be you on your own, but to look down to pray for, pray over and bless the community, then to pray in the opposite direction reminding ourselves we are part of something bigger and are interconnected as the family of God.

Morning, Evening and Night Prayers – some people have a commitment to praying in this way. Could we stream them on social media, bringing people together in spirit if not in body? Would anyone be willing to go live on Facebook for example – very easy to do.

Could we gather to pray around a map of our benefice?

A great prayer activity for all ages is to make paper chain prayers, where each chain represents somebody being prayed for – this interactive idea is a brilliant way



to demonstrate that we are connected in our communities and how connected we are, from young to old.



Write names of people on a fish and hang on a fishing net as you pray for them.

Do you like to walk? If so why not use that time to pray for all those whose houses you pass. Or stop to pray at key points – pubs? nurseries? shops? You will have your own ideas.

We could, with a minimum of organisation, commit to praying for each of our schools at specific times or on certain days.

Connect with the local community by posting a 'prayer postcard' into nearby homes and encouraging them to send in prayer requests and visit one of our churches.

We could make great use of our social media – Facebook, Twitter, Instagram.

We could even upload some videos to our YouTube channel.

And if there is nothing here to suit you, either use your imagination or visit the Thy Kingdom Come website where there are more ideas than we could possibly entertain.
