From the Minister's study—

Dear Friends,

With many eminent scientists in our congregation, in the past and present, I should not draw attention to my ignorance of the sciences, but ignorant I am! However, I do enjoy glancing through science magazines and I read the articles within them when their headlines spark my interest. Also, I am occasionally handed an interesting scientific article to read at our monthly discussion meeting at the Manse, which I am very grateful for. I must agree with all who are excited about science and technology, it is interesting and exciting indeed!

Now let me ask you a question: Is faith “exciting?” I hope you say yes, but I have a feeling that many of you would not use the word “exciting” to describe faith. Science is exciting as its search for new discoveries, new facts, new solutions to problems seems open-ended. There is a genuine sense of discovery, of venturing and exploring in science. And science is challenging, of course, as from new discoveries and technological developments ethical questions arise.

In contrast, faith has come to be seen by many as past-oriented and a fossilized set of ideas. Faith seems to discourage too much exploring and questioning. There is the traditional set of beliefs that have been handed down to us and that we have grown up with. No need to question them, or is there? Well, I think there is, and that is just what theology is all about: thinking, questioning, challenging old ideas and exploring new ones.

New scholarship, new insights about the life and teaching of Jesus, new ways of thinking about God are being discussed by many theologians and people of faith (or no faith), in and outside of the church. Actually, that is really exciting!

We should never be afraid to be open to these new ideas; we should rediscover the sense of adventure in faith. Faith invites us to be life-long seekers. It calls us, as it called Abraham and Sarah, to set out on a journey, even though we do not know where it will lead us. There is so much to explore and discover in the Bible as we recognize its historical setting and its human interest. It is full of myths and metaphors, with a very rich meaning to discover which is relevant for us today. And it is exciting how secular learning, among which science, is challenging and enriching our faith, how theology is seeking to bridge the gap (among which the language divide) between church and society and how “thoughtful” faith wrestles with the challenging and difficult moral and ethical questions we are faced with.

Really, our journey of faith is never boring if we love God with all our heart, all our soul, all our strength and....all our MIND!

And so I hope that many of you will join a Lent Study group in which we will look at some Bible passages that “set our hearts on fire,” that have inspired writers and musicians, and we will consider how these passages speak to us today. Also in the months, and years (!), to come I hope that in reflection/study days we will do more thinking and exploring together and, hopefully, share a real “excitement” about our faith, just as much as we may be excited about science or any other discipline of interest.

If you have any suggestions for a next study/reflection day to be planned for the spring/summer, do let me know!

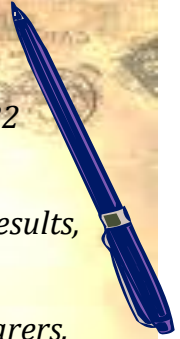


Personalia

Burkina Faso Update

The last edition of this church magazine reported jihadist attacks on Christians in Burkina Faso in November. More attacks on Christians have been reported in the press recently. 46 people were killed or wounded while at worship on Sunday 16 February while others were kidnapped. Still more were killed during the previous week. Hundreds of thousands have fled from their villages in the north of the country. Attacks on Christians are frequent in many West and North African countries.

The groups will all use Churches Together material, *Setting your heart on Fire*—What biblical text sets your heart on fire?

This phrase is drawn from one of the most evocative and treasured New Testament episodes – the account of a mysterious stranger who meets two people journeying on the road to Emmaus, whose identity is eventually revealed as the three of them break bread together (Luke 24: 13-38). After the realisation dawns that their fellow traveller was none other than Jesus himself, the two disciples say to each other: 'Were not our hearts burning within us...'

Taking this biblical story as its starting point, the course invites us to 'open the scriptures' and read them with hearts and heads.

ALZHEIMERS SOCIETY

This month's retiring collection is in aid of the **Alzheimer's Society** which was founded in 1979 by Drs Ann and Brian Hunter and is celebrating its fortieth anniversary this year. It is a care and research charity for those with dementia and their carers. Dementia is a broad term used to describe a number of different conditions affecting the brain including Alzheimer's Disease, Pick's disease, vascular dementia, frontotemporal dementia and others. These diseases cause nerve cells to die, damaging the structure and chemistry of the brain and currently there is no cure. However there are drug and non-drug treatments which can lessen symptoms and people can still live well with dementia. It is **not** a normal part of ageing and it is **not** just memory loss. The society works to provide advice and support, and demonstrate best practice, for anyone dealing with any form of dementia, to influence the state and society in general to enable those affected by dementia to live as they wish to live, and to carry out research into causes and cures.
