From the Minister's study—

Dear Friends,

Looking at significant dates in on the “social justice” church calendar I note that Racial Justice Sunday will be observed on the 13th, Church Action on Poverty Sunday on the 27th and Fair Trade Fortnight this year will be held from the 21st of February to the 6th of March. Whether we choose to focus on any of the issues of racial justice, of poverty and of fair trade in our worship this month, or at least remember them in our prayers, I think they certainly deserve our attention and support any time of the year. And especially as many in the UK are faced with fuel and food poverty with the rising costs of energy and food, I have taken an interest in the Church Action on Poverty charity, which is a national ecumenical Christian social justice charity, committed to tackling poverty in the UK. We work in partnership with churches, and with people in poverty themselves, to tackle the root causes of poverty. It aims to put gospel values of justice and compassion into practice.

No doubt we are all concerned that in a wealthy country like Britain there is widespread poverty and hunger. A large network of foodbanks and charities across the country have to help feed those who for various reasons find themselves with little or no food. We try to do our bit by collecting for the B30 foodbank (at Bournville and Weoley Hill) and hosting Incredible Surplus (at Weoley Castle). And probably many of us share the sentiment that the large and ever-growing gap between the rich and the poor in our society (not mentioning the world) is a scandal.

In the present situation we can no longer just be charitable—giving generously—but we must also strongly advocate for an end to poverty and hunger! We have to raise our voices and help

those who are marginalised by poverty to speak out, to make their voices heard and with them work to build a fairer world. And that is what Church Action on Poverty is about and that is what all churches should be seeking to do.

Throughout his ministry, Jesus listened to people who were on the margins of his society. He made visible those who were overlooked and gave them hope. We are called to follow Jesus' example: to listen to voices from the margins and make them heard, so that things can change.

On the Church Action on Poverty website I came across this story: In 2008, Revd Derek Rigby, the leader of Trinity Methodist Church in Prestatyn, let his beard grow for three days, put on a wig, dirtied himself up, drew tattoos on his arms and put on lager-soaked clothes. He then sat in the porch to his church as the congregation arrived for a Sunday service and settled on a pew in the church, drinking from a can of beer. None of the congregation spoke to him. He then took off his wig to reveal his identity, before delivering a sermon. He said: "It was interesting to see the reaction from people—I was totally ignored."

I can certainly think of some churches where this scenario would be played out too. And I remember a church that, while it was just celebrating communion, locked its gates when a poor "beggar" was trying to make its way into the building. I have often wondered whether that was Jesus in disguise!

I hope, and I even believe, that this would not happen in our three churches. Why? Because we have elders and members who truly care, who are faithful not only "in word" but also put their faith into practice and who have created a church ethos that is really welcoming and accepting of all. Of course, we may not all

be comfortable with those who are “different,” but if we are willing to listen to their stories we immediately recognize our common humanity and the urgent need to challenge the inequality and injustice that prevents people to live the “life in all its fullness” that God wants for each one of us.

So let us raise our voices! Be it through our own campaigning or supporting CAP or any other social justice charity to do the campaigning for us.

And a prayer we may wish to pray....

Lord Jesus, you say that when someone gives food to the hungry, when someone gives a drink to the thirsty, when someone welcomes a stranger, when someone clothes the poor, when someone cares for the sick and when someone visits a prisoner, they are really doing it for you. Enable us, with the wealth of our society, to do these things, but help us first to listen to the voices of those we desire to assist and to welcome those who are on the margins, because, in their strength and love and endurance, they are your voice, your words for us today. Lord Jesus, we pray in your name. Amen
