From the Minister's study—

The United Reformed Church

Dear Friends,

“When does a man express his deepest desire?” asked the Patriarch (of Constantinople). And he answered himself: “When he formulates his last will. And where do we find the last will of our Lord? In the high-priestly prayer in the seventeenth chapter of St John. Now, that prayer is all about unity and love. That is what we have so often forgotten in our theological quarrels. That is what the ecumenical movement must bring back.”

This observation made in the heydays of the ecumenical movement, in the 60s when the Orthodox churches joined the World Council of Churches, is no less true today but sadly we see more division among churches, even of the same church “family”, especially when these churches and their church leaders ally themselves with political leaders or parties while failing to be the prophetic voice that is so needed. Lack of unity of the church hinders our prophetic witness for peace and reconciliation at a time that we see so many divisions and conflicts in the world and in our society. If we do not embody the peaceful reconciliation that is ours in unity with Christ, then our words about Jesus ring hollow. The unity of the church not only enables our witness, helps our witness but the unity of the church *is* our witness. And that is why we should celebrate the 50th anniversary of our *United Reformed Church*, as will officially happen in October and as we will do in our pastorate churches too.

As a united church, among other united churches such as the United Protestant Church of France, the United Church of North India/South India, the United Church of Jamaica, the United Church of Canada, the United Protestant Church in the Netherlands, we try to embody the unity of Christ as we accommodate or overcome our theological, liturgical and organizational differences. But differences remain, of course. Within the united churches some of us like formal liturgies and

others informal ones. Some of us hold on to a traditional, orthodox faith while others are particularly keen on new insights and open to the questioning of faith. Some are evangelical, some are progressive, some orthodox and some liberal and many do not like to be labelled in any way.

My experience is that united churches are usually quite “roomy,” I told the students at Queens College at an ecumenical panel presentation earlier this year. But as we are open to many people “walking a different way to heaven,” – an interesting expression used by a faithful church member – we probably know that having “united” in our church name is not always well understood. Therefore, some URC churches mention on their noticeboard what the “united” stands for. “United” is a word we should carry in our denominational name with pride—humble pride, of course. Especially at a time that political powers or powerbrokers, sometimes of the far right, divide (and rule), not only in other parts of the world but even in our own country.

In the “Fellowship of the Ring” (the first book of Tolkien’s trilogy, “The Lord of the Rings”) there is an episode that makes a wonderful point. If you have not read the book but only seen the movie, I am afraid that this scene has not made it onto the screen so you would have missed it. It is about the men, hobbits, elves, and dwarves who accompany the ring bearer on his journey. In order to defeat the power of Sauron, the Dark Lord, these historically divided groups must try to work together to destroy the ring that Sauron wants in order to gain absolute power. As the fellowship approaches Lothlorien, the home of the elves, the elven guard (Haldir) refuses to let Gimli the dwarf pass without a blindfold. This results in tension that threatens to divide the fellowship. But Aragorn, the group leader, suggests that if one has to bear the indignity of being blindfolded, let them all be blindfolded. Legolas the elf protests: *“Alas for the folly of these days! Here all are enemies of the one Enemy, and yet I must walk blind, while the sun is merry in the woodland under the leaves of gold!”* “Folly it may seem,” says Haldir. *“Indeed, in nothing is the power of the Dark Lord more*

clearly shown than in the estrangement that divides all those who still oppose him."

There is clearly a lesson that we can draw from Tolkien's wisdom. The forces that oppose the ways of God draw strength from the disunity of God's people, *all* people. Our call is not only to proclaim God's reconciliation but also to live it, in our daily lives, in our communities and in our churches. If we fail to do so, we will be ineffective and irrelevant, only reinforcing the division that the world already knows. The division of people, races, nations, communities, religions....You name it!

Better all blindfolded than only one. Better yet, all eyes open to the God who makes us one!
