From the Minister's study—

REMEMBERING THOSE WHO HAVE DIED

Service of Remembrance 31 October

Dear Friends,

On the **31st of October at 6.30 PM** we will meet for an All Souls/All Saints service at **Weoley Hill Church** to remember those whom we have known, whom we have loved, in church and/or in our circle of family and friends or in the wider community, who have died in the past year (or even years). We will light candles and place stones as symbols of the permanence of the memory and legacy of those who have died. We will name them and affirm that their memory continues to live in and through us.

It is perhaps quite fitting that this service of remembrance takes place in the autumn season. Autumn is the season of “letting go” as we have had to let go of the pleasant summer months and the trees are letting go of their leaves that fall on the ground. And “letting go” is what we have had to do when someone we know and loved has died, perhaps after a long and fulfilled life or perhaps because of an illness or accident that tragically cut life short. Letting go....it is never easy, but we have had to. As the German poet Rainer Maria Rilke wrote: *“We need in love to practise only this, letting each other go. For holding on comes easily: we do not need to learn it”*

“Letting go,” we can learn it. We learn it all through life as at one time or other we have to let go of our parents, our children, our partner, our work, our hopes and dreams, our home, and probably even some of our abilities. But even with all the practise, it does not become any easier, especially when we have

to let go of someone we love. After all, we are born to live and to love. We want to hold on to life, as long as possible, even if sometimes against our better judgement. And we want to hold on to our loved ones, of course.

To hold on or to let go, is that the choice set before us? Maybe, if we think of the words of Jesus, we may come to another conclusion. It is not a matter of “letting go” or “holding on” but to “let go with trust.”

And can anyone of you by worrying add a single hour to your span of life? So do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself. Your heavenly Father knows what you need, Jesus says.

To let go is to trust. Trust that your child who leaves home will find his own way in life. Trust that you have done your best at work and now you have handed over to someone else. Trust that while you had to let go of driving because of failing eyesight, neighbours and friends will help you with shopping and bringing you to appointments. Trust that even if you have to let go of some of your dreams, your life can still be fulfilling and be a force for good, etc.

As Nelson Mandela wrote in a poem about “letting go”: *“To let go is not to regret the past, but to grow and live for the future. To let go is to fear less and love more.”*

It is wonderful to see when people can trustfully let go of their own lives or the lives of those whom they have lived with, have loved or have shared friendship with. Trust that life was good, even with its ups and downs. And, sometimes trusting that life after death will be good too. Trusting that faith, hope and love remain, and the greatest of these is love. It is trusting that just as

the tree let go of its leaves, that fall on the earth, when life comes to an end and we “fall” (return) to the earth, *“there is One who holds this falling, infinitely softly in His hands.”* (Rainer Maria Rilke)

And so we will remember those who have died, we who are the keepers of their memory.

Please do pass on the word to anyone in your circle of family and friends or in the neighbourhood who may appreciate the opportunity to remember in what will be a reflective service with music, readings from different (faith) traditions, prayers and the symbolic acts that remind us how much the people who have died still live on in our hearts and minds. We will remember, how can we forget?
