

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

3. Matters Arising: There were no matters arising.

4. Churchwarden David Whyman's Introductory Remarks:

First of all, may I thank you on behalf of Bob and myself, for the confidence you have placed in us as churchwardens. We both count it as an honour and a privilege to serve St. Andrew's Church in this way, and trust that we will serve you well and faithfully as churchwardens in the year ahead.

This last year has been unusual to say the least! After some 19 years of James' ministry, his announced new appointment in the Oxford Diocese left us with an interregnum. The whole issue of appointing a new vicar is both complex and time consuming, and involves working with a whole range of people, especially within the Diocese. I must acknowledge and give huge thanks to the PCC for their help and support during this time. For a number of us, it has been a whole new experience and, dare I say, "challenge", which at times has been frustrating. The Standing Committee – Bob, David Millington, Carole Taylor and myself together with our two Churchwardens Emeriti David Challis and Jackie Daniels, coopted onto the committee – have together steered the whole process. To them, I give my heartfelt thanks for all they have put into this whole process. James, before leaving, spoke of "Team Shottery" – the working together in a most complementary way of so many people – is to be praised. To each one of you on the PCC and Standing Committee, I applaud you and thank you so sincerely for all you have done, and are still doing for St. Andrew's Church.

I feel I must make mention of our clergy. This year, the interregnum has put great strain on our resources for preaching and leading worship. Both Revd. Mary Crameri and Canon David Capron have been unstinting in taking services, both on Sundays and mid-week Eucharist services throughout the year. Together with our Readers, Jan and Sarah, Canon Alan Boddington, Alan Minchin, Bob Macvie and Revd. Joan Whyman, every service has been covered. This is no mean task – we thank each one for their service to God in covering our pulpit requirements. This has brought a diversity of approach, together with a richness of spiritual development for us all. Thank you again for your prayerful, dedicated time, energy and resources in giving to God.

As I look around this group today, each and every one is involved in some way or other in sustaining and promoting our Church. – some contribute

in ways small and some large, some behind the scenes and some upfront. As you read this year's Annual Report Booklet, we have a whole variety of groups, interests and activities and this makes our church what it is – and may I thank you, everyone, for the way you bring your skills and gifts to God's work here.

May God Bless You Each One.

5. **Electoral Roll**: Anne Challis reported that there were 148 on the Electoral Roll, which is a decrease of 30 from last year, but this is a new Electoral Roll. Anne was thanked for her help in keeping the Roll up to date.

6. **Elections**:

- a. PCC Members: Two members of the PCC came to the end of their three year term, Chris Susnik and Jane Ireland and were eligible and willing to restand for a second term. Fran Kibblewhite also agreed to stand for election. There being three vacancies, all three were eligible and willing and after a show of hands all three were duly elected to the PCC.
- b. Sidespersons: There were a few reductions to the number of Sidespersons. Thanks go to all for your diligent work.
- 7. **Presentation of Accounts**: The Accounts had been circulated and, in the absence of Richard Prior, Carole Taylor talked the meeting through the key points of the Financial Year to end Dec 2018.

The accounts showed a surplus for the year of \pounds 1,368, giving Total Funds Carried over of \pounds 106,950 – up from \pounds 105,582 the year before.

Incoming Resources at £112,875 were £6,735 lower than those for 2017. Resources expended at £11,507 was some £3,944 higher than the previous year, mainly due to an increase in the Diocesan Share.

In answer to a question from the floor about the level of the Diocesan Share, Carole said that it was an amount which had been agreed at Deanery level, with more healthy parishes giving some support to less healthy and rural parishes. She explained that neither the fact that we had had no incumbent during more than half the year, nor that the Diocese took all the rental from the vicarage, were factors in the level of our Share. Thanks were extended to Richard Prior and his team for producing the Accounts. The meeting agreed to accepting these accounts.

- 8. **Appointment of Independent Examiner:** The chairman proposed that we once again appoint Chris Wilshire as Independent Examiner and this was agreed by the meeting.
- 9. **Reports:** David Millington as PCC secretary was thanked for producing the booklet of reports.
- 10. **Tabled Questions**: There was one tabled question (from Janet Insoll):

What plans did the PCC have to make the church and its services more Disability Friendly:

David Millington responded that the church endeavoured to provide facilities which met the perceived needs of people with various disabilities. Wheelchair access, through the welcome area was used by several members of the congregation; Large print service sheets had been added to tie with the existing large print hymn books for those with sight problems. Whenever new issues are raised they are treated seriously by the PCC and necessary actions taken.

In response to a further point from Janet about automatic lighting around the west porch, it was agreed that this would be investigated for urgent action.

The congregation thanked the churchwardens and the "St. Andrew's team" for their hard work throughout the year.

With this, David Whyman closed this annual meeting.

Vicar's Comments

As you read this, I will be fifteen months into the role as your vicar! What a journey since June 2019. Sue, Elliot, Gus and I arrived at the vicarage a couple of weeks before my licencing with Bishop Christopher on June 26th. We have been welcomed so well and have been bowled over by the warmth and love of everyone. A colleague advised to me however not to underestimate how long it takes to arrive in a new place. It does take time to settle in, get to know people

and to get your head around the ways of St. Andrew's but it is a great place to be and we are thrilled to be here with you. I felt very strongly that God was calling me here to grow the church both spiritually and numerically and this is at the heart of my vision for us – to grow. I have been drawn to Acts 2.42-end as I have reflected on this:

"They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer. Everyone was filled with awe at the many wonders and signs performed by the apostles. All the believers were together and had everything in common. They sold property and possessions to give to anyone who had need. Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, praising God and enjoying the favour of all the people. And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved."

Based on this I want us to be a church that has four main 'blocks' on which we build:

- 1) Worship and prayer
- 2) Teaching and learning
- 3) Fellowship and community
- 4) Mission and outreach

If we want to grow spiritually and numerically, we must think about how we do this - we need to think strategically and plan. To help us with this we have just completed our 'Eight Essential Qualities of Growing Healthy Churches' survey. When we receive the results, we will then need to address our weakest areas and work on improving them. I am hopeful that the PCC will be able to spend a day with me looking at these areas in depth and then planning the way forward.

We have already begun to see growth in our children and family work. I am delighted with the new 'Illumin8' team of leaders and the new impetus this has brought to church and our worship. I am very grateful to Becky Beverley who has worked tirelessly in keeping 'Fellow Travellers' going with her dedicated team and I am pleased that Becky continues to be part of the new Sunday group and has been instrumental in shaping the new style.

Music is always so crucial in church worship. I want to pay tribute to Rosemary and Larry Robson who continue to lead the choir, resource music for us and play for 2/3 of our evening services during the month along with Jackie Whiteman and others. I am grateful to Matt Penn who is now our organist on Sunday

mornings and for the way that the team our working so well together – we are very blessed indeed!

Dag Hammarskjold famously said; "For all that has been, Thank you. For all that is to come, Yes!". May these be our words too as go forward together into the adventure that is God's kingdom, and may we see more people coming to Christ and becoming part of his church.

REPORTS

Churchwardens' Report

Once again this year, Bob and I have been nominated by the APCM and were duly sworn in at the Archdeacon's Visitation Service to "faithfully and diligently discharge our duties as Churchwardens". Throughout the year, we have endeavoured to do this to the best of our abilities.

This year, our Church has seen major changes with the resignation of Revd. James Warren as Vicar, after 17 years. The whole process of appointing a new vicar was new to many of us. With some experience in such matters, we enlisted the help of David Challis and Jackie Daniels, our Churchwardens Emeriti, who proved sources of such valuable advice and suggestions. With help from the Diocese, and a wonderful team spirit, we went through the process as a church of constructing a Profile, advertising the post and the whole process of interviewing candidates. We did this prayerfully and, wherever possible, involving the opinions of the whole church body. In brief, we were looking for someone, male or female, who would move our church forward, involve families and young people and spiritually enliven and deepen our faith in the God we love and serve. I suppose the rest is history – Revd. Craig Groocock was duly approved by Bishop Christopher and appointed as Vicar of St. Andrew's Church, Shottery on 26th June, 2019. Revd. Craig, Su and family have now been with us some 7 months and already we are seeing changes in worship style which is attracting some families and young people from around Stratford - thanks be to God! We are delighted to have Revd. Craig with us, leading us prayerfully and spiritually.

For some time during the past year, negotiations have been taking place to increase our team of organists. We are most fortunate to be able to say that, in January 2020, we welcome a new organist, Matt Penn, who takes up his post. We welcome him, his wife Caroline and their two small girls into our fellowship.

I report to you that our church building and premises are generally in good order, being faithfully maintained by a number of our congregation. Our genuine thanks to those many people who clean our church each week, maintain decorations and flooring, drains, roofs and gutters etc. We appreciate your (often unseen) loyal service to our fellowship. I also report that I have checked that all silver, vestments, fixtures and fittings, as recorded in the Church Property Register, are all present and in good order.

This year has once again been an honour and privilege for Bob and I to serve as your Churchwardens. We are most grateful to the church, the Standing Committee and PCC who have supported us - as together we serve God and seek to bring praise and glory to His name.

Fabric Report

I am sure we all appreciate coming into a warm, clean, comfortable church building each week. This year, circumstances have led us to do the cleaning of all the property ourselves. This hasn't been an easy task – we are all busy in various ways and the cleaning responsibility has fallen to a small group of willing volunteers. So, right at the beginning of this report, our grateful thanks to the team who keep our premises sparkling bright each week – and along with that a plea to anyone who could possibly help in any way - please, please have a word with David Millington who can point you in the right direction!

Our thanks to those who have kept the gardens and grounds neat and tidy, especially David Challis who loyally maintains our flower beds, trees and various aspects of our grounds. Thank you, David! Over the years, our gardens were beautifully maintained by our gardener John Faulkner. Sadly, after his illness he has recently died. We miss John's skills and commitment and wish him God's peace. Whilst mentioning our grounds, comment has been made with reference to the car park, the top surface of which is beginning to break up and

the white lines are beginning to disappear. The white line problem is in process but needs dry weather for us to replace it.

To the best of my knowledge, all the required annual checks have been maintained or are in process. 2020 is the year in which we are required by the Diocese to have a Quinquennial Survey by a qualified surveyor. In preparation for this survey there are a number of checks/tests to be made some by appropriately qualified people. Our Survey will take place later in the Autumn. The PCC have approved, and I have arranged for, all the wooden windows to be painted by a professional painter in early Spring (March/April). Whilst the present paintwork is in quite good condition it will ensure the window frames are protected for future years and will also comply with the Quinquennial Survey.

Throughout the year, there have been numerous essential routine maintenance tasks – checking alarms, clearing drains and gutters, re-laying uneven slabs, replacing light bulbs etc. Many of these could go unnoticed except for a team of observant helpers – thank you each one.

For some time now, we have been planning improvements to our church lighting, postponed due to the Interregnum, which is now all but obsolete being very difficult to replace broken lamps. Our proposal is to replace the lighting with an LED lighting system together with proposed screens, cameras and projectors and with benefits of linking with a Wi-fi system. This all takes time and is quite complicated and is in the process of Faculty application from the Diocese.

Again, our grateful thanks to those many people who help maintain our premises to a very high standard.

Parochial Church Council (PCC)

A reminder of the function of the PCC:

'It shall be the duty of the Minister and the PCC to consult together on matters of general concern and importance to the parish. The PCC works in cooperation with the Minister in promoting in the parish the whole mission of the church: pastoral, evangelical, social and ecumenical.' During 2019, the PCC met together 8 times; the first meeting of the new PCC, after the April APCM, was held at The Redhill Christian Centre near Stratford. Other meetings were at the Parish Centre.

At the APCM in April 2019, three members were elected to the PCC – Chris Susnik and Jane Ireland, both of whom were re-elected to another term of 3 years (hard servitude), and Fran Kibblewhite who was a new recruit to our group. We welcome all three and look forward to a productive and responsive period ahead.

During the interregnum period to June 2019, David Whyman and Bob Macvie, our valiant churchwardens, were also required to continue their roles as Sequestrators, running the parish for the Bishop, in the absence of a vicar. David Challis as Churchwarden Emeritus was also co-opted onto the PCC to "beef up" our experience and resilience during this difficult period. Our heartfelt thanks to all three of them.

During the year, the PCC discussed the Parish Share, Outside Giving, Safeguarding, Finance, a project to improve lighting and visual presentations in church. We had regular updates from members about the Deanery and Diocesan Synods, Coventry Cathedral (from our Cathedral Parish Partner), Stratford Churches Together, the Worship and Parish Centre committees, and Pilgrimages.

Revd Craig joined us, in the chair, for our August meeting, as he started the difficult process of understanding what had gone before, how we as a team worked and thought, and how best to lead us in the future. What a brave man!

Working with Craig has been remarkably easy. When we recruited him, we said we wanted someone who would lead us away from our comfort zone, to embrace change which would help our church and ministry grow – but that we didn't want to leave any behind on this journey. Slowly but surely, small but important changes have been, and are being, made in music, children's groups, website and other aspects of our church life – with very positive effects.

Little did any of us know, prior to March of 2020 and the pandemic, just how far from our comfort zones we would be required to move – and just how important that desire to leave none behind would become. Craig continues to shine as a beacon of good leadership, inspiring whilst nurturing – caring, cajoling and communicating.

This current period is difficult for us, indeed for all churches, but we are doing our very best in the face of this adversity, learning new skills and developing new ways of working with each other – so character building! Indeed, this next APCM in October 2020 will be the first ever to be conducted over zoom. How many of you had even heard of zoom this time last year?

Deanery Synod

Shottery lies in the Fosse Deanery, which groups us with other parishes and benefices across South Warwickshire: Stratford-upon-Avon, Alveston, Wellesbourne, Barford, Mid-Fosse, Edgehill, and Dassett Magna. There are two Joint Acting Area Deans: Rev Patrick Taylor (of Holy Trinity, Stratford-on-Avon) and Rev Barry Jackson (Edgehill Benefice, which includes Kineton). Orion Johnson from Shottery is the Lay Chair, and Helen Gunton from Edgehill has supported synod as Secretary. Anthony Woollard, from Stratfordupon-Avon, advises on parish share and Fosse Deanery's contribution to the Diocesan Support Fund, from which clergy stipends are paid.

Parish Safeguarding

The Disclosure and Barring Service checks all members of organisations within St. Andrew's if they have any connections with children or vulnerable adults.

During the year, I attended further training courses on Safeguarding and encouraged others in St. Andrew's to attend the CO and C1 courses as appropriate. I had already conducted a Safeguarding course for the PCC at level CO.

New initiatives have taken place in church on Pastoral Care and on Children's groups and all leaders and helpers have either been checked or will be checked as soon as practically possible. Similarly for Team Shottery, more recently

Whilst the requirement for significant numbers of volunteers within the church to undergo various levels of safeguarding training can at first seem onerous and a little overawing, it is right that the church takes all necessary steps to prevent abuse and also to be seen to be doing whatever it can in this respect.

As requested by the Diocese, the PCC of Shottery St. Andrew has re-adopted *The Safeguarding Policy for the Diocese of Coventry*. All members of PCC had a copy of this updated policy, and a copy is posted on the PCC board in the Welcome Area of St. Andrew's.

Safeguarding is now an agenda item on all PCC meetings and at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM).

The parish has copies of all the resource documents listed in the policy. The policy may be downloaded from the Diocesan website.

Music Report

2019 was a challenging year for St Andrew's Music Department. For the first half of the year, with the church still in interregnum, there was the additional work of keeping music going without the input of a full time Vicar. So, a good way to begin is to give our grateful thanks to Rev. Mary Crameri and Canon David Capron for all their help and encouragement during this time and beyond.

As we enjoyed our annual Choir meal at El Greco in early February, we could not have predicted that we were to face 2019 without so many of our regular choir members. Denise Andreo, one of our core altos, left the area early in the year. We lost another alto, Mavis Gray, who regularly sang with us for evening services, due to ill health. The irreplaceable Bob Wright was away for nearly eight months during his illness. Gary Collins was also away for many weeks while recovering from surgery and Mary Crameri was unable to sing with us as often, due to her increased workload. In addition, the significant loss of Gareth and Lily leaving for University in September marked the end, for the time being, of a Junior Choir. Not an easy year, but we continue to encourage new people to join the wonderful family that is our choir at every possible opportunity!

In spite of these setbacks, we worked hard to provide all the necessary special extra music, beginning with Lent through to Easter. There is always much to be prepared with Ash Wednesday, Mothering Sunday, Palm Sunday and Maundy Thursday Services. Lily took charge of much of the rehearsing, and kept us on

our toes with many tips from her growing experience with RSCM. Our Good Friday service, as always, contained some very special music. As it was their last Easter full time with us, we had solos from Gareth, who opened the service with *Let not Your Heart be Troubled* (Eric Thiman) and Lily who sang *Pie Jesu* from Faure's Requiem. One of the highlights of the service was a simple but lovely piece *Christ has no Body now but Yours* by David Ogden with clarinet solo.

As Summer approached, we continued work on music for Ascension, Pentecost and Trinity Sundays. A number of us went to sing at a Wedding on June 1st at St James's Snitterfield. It is always good experience to sing in the choir stalls at another place of worship.

Our big annual music event in June was of course RSCM Music Sunday, which this year coincided with Trinity, when we offered a range of anthems from ancient to modern. We introduced a new hymn, *When Miriam's Daughters Rise and Sing*, written a few years ago for use on Music Sundays, and also a new anthem commissioned for this year by Joanna Forbes-L'Estrange, *God the Holy Trinity*. We also included a beautiful anthem in communion that we had sung on Good Friday, *Morning Glory, Starlit Sky* by Geoff Weaver. We sang descants to all the hymns, and Larry and Lily shared the conducting. David Capron, who kindly led the service for us, paid tribute to St Cecilia and the occasion also raised £273 for the RSCM.

With the end of June came the long-awaited arrival of Rev. Craig. The excitement and anticipation of this was huge, as the relationship between Music Directors and Vicars is key (excuse the pun!). It was very clear from our first meeting that Rev. Craig was keen to encourage the continuation of the Choir and other areas of established music. It was great to give back control of the setting of hymns each month. Craig has been amazingly easy to work with, and over the summer we were able to negotiate plans for the future, to allow some degree of stepping back for the Robsons in 2020.

We enjoyed our Summer Choir Party, in the garden at Pathlow, and were overjoyed that Bob and Margaret Wright were well enough to join us. We gave our St Andrew's tribute to Norman Warren (Priest, Composer and great encourager of our music) who died this Summer, on Sunday 28th July by singing and playing his compositions at the 10am Service. The Choir helped out at a wedding on August 31st in an otherwise quiet holiday period. We were able to provide instrumental music and chants for two special Sunday evening Services (Celtic and Taize) organised by Craig.

In October, we sang for Harvest and also the *Time to Remember* Service. We said goodbye to Gareth and Lily as they headed off to Oxford and London in the happy knowledge that they would be back to sing during holidays when possible. We gratefully welcomed back Bob Wright, now recovered enough to rejoin the choir. Rosemary and Larry were able to take some planned holiday in the Autumn and we are grateful to Jackie Wightman, David Capron, Karen Reaney and Margaret Cox for playing at various Services.

We continued to enjoy the challenge of Craig's input of occasional "new to us" hymns on Sunday mornings, as we worked on preparing music for Advent and Christmas. Our Advent Carol Service included old favourites like Margaret Rizza's *Magnificat*, as well as new music, such as *King of the Ages* by Stuart Townend and Keith Getty, and *Here in this Place* by Marty Haugen. Sadly, the organ was too out of tune to use at this service, but it has become more stable with permanent use of a heater. There are certain improvements which our Organ Tuner has recommended, and these have been put to the PCC.

Musical highlights at the Nine Lessons and Carols were the classic *Sans Day Carol* arranged by Rutter, a lovely arrangement by David Willcocks of the French carol *Quelle est cette Odeur Agréable?*, and a lively modern Moravian carol *Angel Tidings*. We were pleased that Su Groocock was able to sing with us at this Service, and this is perhaps a good moment to thank those who swell our ranks on important occasions during the year, in particular Helen Hall, Anthony McIsaac and Hilary Capron. As the year closed we were privileged to be asked by Holy Trinity to provide extra singers for the Memorial Service for Saskia Jones, who was killed at the London Bridge attack, and four of us were able to do this.

Going forward into 2020, we keenly anticipated the appointment of our new Organist Matthew Penn, who has been contracted to play for Sunday morning services. All other musical duties will continue without change.

We always value the support and interest of everyone at St Andrew's in our endeavours to enhance worship through music, and hope and pray that others will soon be moved to join our wonderfully loyal choir members in this rewarding way of serving God.



Open The Book in Schools

Open The Book recently celebrated 20 years of service to schools. There are now 3,000 schools taking part and receiving a team from their local Churches.

We had another very busy year, thoroughly enjoying all the challenges of the different seasons. Listening and Prayer Ministry

By telling someone we can trust to keep things confidential, we are enabled to work things through. God listens and can prompt us.

We also have a prayer box in the welcome area and anyone using the church and hall can drop a prayer request into the box and we will lift that concern up to God.



Shottery St Andrew's C of E Primary School

Our School continues to thrive - competently and efficiently managed as always by our headteacher Sarah Marshall. The staff, as always, provide a strong, friendly and encouraging environment where the children accomplish so much and are inspired to always take that extra step, make that extra effort. They continue to work with smiles on their faces, kindness in their hearts and minds and a welcome to all visitors.

This has been an eventful year. All the main Christian events are marked by visits to St. Andrew's Church: Christmas, Easter, Harvest (a huge contribution to the Foodbank was made) and of course the end of year celebration event. However, in the past year the school also participated in the Diocese Celebration Events at Coventry Cathedral with other Primary children from Church of England Schools in the area. Their behaviour, as always, was exemplary. They enjoyed the singing, they listened attentively and prayed hard.

An additional honour was to receive the Cross of Nails earlier in the year and this became a great event for all. During the chairmanship of Rev Mary Crameri, additional church visits were made. For example, a special visit was arranged to participate in a Baptism: this was a special RE lesson, in Church, where there was an explanation of what initiation into the Church means and then a demonstration took place using a doll at the font! Over Easter the children from school also attended a Good Friday event, again organised by Rev Mary where Easter Gardens were crafted and feet were washed amongst other activities. This event was to be repeated in 2020, but unfortunately Covid19 prevented this.

Our "Open the Book" team are regulars at school and are thoroughly appreciated with their innovative approach to understand the Bible. Rev Mary Crameri, sadly, stood down as Chair of the Governors and was replaced by Mr Larry Gravelli. However, Rev Craig Groocock is making his presence felt and is a frequent visitor to school, taking assemblies and livening up classrooms and bible story times. He is also proving a committed member of the Governing Board.

Academically, the school is doing well. The recent Ofsted report awarded a "Good" standard. Given the cramped conditions in school and limited provision for large community/communal events within the premises, it is often difficult to showcase the true excellence of St. Andrew's School. Efforts continue to

improve Maths, English and French learning, - items picked out in the Ofsted Report and when the repeat visit comes, St. Andrew's will rise to the challenge, no doubt? In classroom activities, in the playground or out on visits for sporting competitions (many awards!), theatre visits (RSC – Boy in a Dress, of course), Castles (Kenilworth) the Shakespeare properties -to name but a few, the children respond impeccably to instructions and rise up to the occasion. Always!

Unfortunately, due to a medical condition, I have had to stand down as Foundation Governor this Spring, but I am delighted that I am being replaced by Ann Millington who will provide a reassuring, kindly and insightful presence in school and on the Governing Board. I wish Ann and the other Governors – and of course, the Head, the Staff and, above all, the children - much success and happiness in the time to come.

Outside Giving

During the year 2019, a grand total of \pounds 3,950 was given by St. Andrew's Church to the twelve nominated monthly charities. This compares with a figure of \pounds 3,389 for the previous year.

However, with other monies given to Traidcraft, St. Andrew's School, Cyclone Appeal, British Legion, the Donkey Sanctuary, Great Ormond St Hospital (on St. Andrew's Night) and for the South Yorkshire Flood Appeal, the total figure given amounts to £5,274.

Several new charities were chosen for support and these included: **Water Aid, Mission to Seafarers UK and British Red Cross.** As usual we also included some charities we have supported in previous years, such as **The Samaritans**.

A variety of charities are chosen by the Outside Giving Committee to support international mission and local mission. Some charities we support yearly such as **World Vision**, through which we sponsor Edgar Villca Charca who lives in Mosoj Punchay in the south of Bolivia. Our giving to the **Church Mission Society** helps support Dan and Phillipa Munday in Nepal who work in education and health – these have recently been replaced by Andrea and Andrew Young, also working in Nepal. We also donate annually to **Christian Aid** and the **Shakespeare Hospice**.

If there is a particular charity you feel strongly that we should support occasionally the Outside Giving committee would be pleased to hear from you. Either speak to myself or to Hilary Mattocks, Sylvaine Gravestock, or Liz Talbot and it will be considered.

Extra special thanks should go to Hilary Mattocks for keeping account of all the money collected and for sending it on to the various charities throughout the year.
