THE INTRODUCTION

Light a candle and spend some time in silence if you can.

Today the Church gives thank for the great sacrament of Our Lord's Body and Blood, given for the life of the world. As we give thanks for such a great gift, you might want to sing or say this hymn:

ORD, ENTHRONED in heavenly splendour, First-begotten from the dead,
Thou alone, our strong defender,
Liftest up thy people's head.
Alleluya, Alleluya,
Jesu, true and living Bread!

- 2. Here our humblest homage pay we; Here in loving reverence bow; Here for Faith's discernment pray we, Lest we fail to know thee now. Alleluya, Alleluya, Thou art here, we ask not how.
- 3. Though the lowliest form doth veil thee As of old in Bethlehem,

 Branch and Flower of Jesse's stem.
 Alleluya, Alleluya,
 We in worship join with them.

Then, making the sign of the Cross, say:

▶ In the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen. *Spend some time in silence, calling to your mind your sins. Then say,*

Lord Jesus, you are mighty God and Prince of Peace: Lord, have mercy.

You heal the wounds of our sin and division: Christ, have mercy.

You intercede for us with the Father: Lord have mercy.

Remind yourself of the gift of God's forgiveness, by reading these words from 1 John 1.9: If we confess our sins, he who is faithful and just will forgive us our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness.

Then say the Collect: O God, who in this wonderful Sacrament have left us a memorial of your Passion, grant us, we pray, so to revere the sacred mysteries of your Body and Blood that we may always experience in ourselves the fruits of your redemption. Who live and reign with God the Father in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen

THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

Then read today's appointed readings:


- *Deuteronomy 8.2-3 and 14-16: He fed you with manna.*
- 1 Corinthians 10.16-17: There is only one loaf: we form a single body.

Alleluia, alleluia! I am the living bread which came down from heaven, says the Lord. Anyone who eats this bread will live for ever. Alleluia!

• John 6.51-58: I am the living bread which has come down from heaven.

Spend some to time, if you can, in quiet contemplation, asking the Holy Spirit to show you what the scriptures have to say to you today.

And then spend time praying for the Church, the world and all its needs.



SPIRITUAL COMMUNION

Say the Our Father. Then make your act of Spiritual Communion. Spend a moment meditating on Jesus' love for us and your own longing for the fullness of resurrection life in union with him. Then pray:

Y JESUS, I believe that You are present in the Most Holy Sacrament. I love You above all things, and I desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot at this moment receive You sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace You as if You were already there and unite myself wholly to You. Never permit me to be separated from You. Amen.

Spend some time in silence, giving thanks, and then say: Blessed, praised and adored be Jesus Christ on his throne of glory, and in the Most Holy Sacrament of the Altar. Amen. Alleluia!

In thanksgiving, you might want to sing this hymn

Friday, 19th June 2020

The Sacred Heart of Jesus, pierced by our sins and for our salvation, is the symbol of that love with which the divine Redeemer continually loves the Father and all human beings without exception. Spend some time meditating upon that love, and then say or sing this hymn:

On earth thou art an exile's rest,
In heav'n the glory of the blest,
O Sacred Heart.

The readings are:

- Deut. 7.6-11: The Lord set his heart on you and chose you.
- 1 John 4.7-16: God is love.

You might then like to say this litany of the Sacred Heart:

Heart of Jesus, of Infinite Majesty. Heart of Jesus, Sacred Temple of God. Heart of Jesus, Tabernacle of the Most High. Heart of Jesus, House of God and Gate of Heaven. Heart of Jesus, burning furnace of charity. Heart of Jesus, abode of justice and love. Heart of Jesus, full of goodness and love. Heart of Jesus, abyss of all virtues. Heart of Jesus, most worthy of all praise. Heart of Jesus, king and centre of all hearts. Heart of Jesus, in whom are all treasures of wisdom and knowledge. Heart of Jesus, in whom dwells the fullness of divinity. Heart of Jesus, in whom the Father was well pleased. Heart of Jesus, of whose fullness we have all received. For an opening hymn, you may wish to sing or say:

The Nativity of S. John the Baptist

Wednesday, 24th June 2020

In place of a hymn, you might like to say the Benedictus, the song sung by Zechariah on the circumcision of his son S John the Baptist. This is the version from the Book of Common Prayer:

Blessed be the Lord God of Israel: for he hath visited, and redeemed his people;
And hath raised up a mighty salvation for us: in the house of his servant David;

As he spake by the mouth of his holy Prophets: which have been since the world began;

That we should be saved from our enemies: and from the hands of all that hate us;

To perform the mercy promised to our forefathers : and to remember his holy Covenant;

To perform the oath which he sware to our forefather Abraham : that he would give us;

That we being delivered out of the hands of our enemies: might serve him without fear;

In holiness and righteousness before him: all the days of our life.

And thou, Child, shalt be called the Prophet of the Highest: for thou shalt go before the face of the Lord to prepare his ways;

To give knowledge of salvation unto his people : for the remission of their sins,

Through the tender mercy of our God: whereby the day-spring from on high hath visited us;

To give light to them that sit in darkness, and in the shadow of death: and to guide our feet into the way of peace.

The readings are:

- Isaiah 49.1-6: I will make you the light of the nations.
- Acts 13.22-26: Jesus, whose coming was heralded by John.

Alleluia, alleluia! As for you, little child, you shall be called a prophet of God the most high. You shall go ahead of the Lord to prepare his ways before him. Alleluia!

• Luke 1.57-66: His name is John.

As a hymn in thanksgiving after your act of spiritual communion:

N THIS HIGH FEAST Day honour we the Baptist, greatest and last of Israel's line of prophets, kinsman of Jesus, herald of salvation, chosen forerunner.

Lo, from the heavens Gabriel descending, brings to thy father tidings of thy coming, telling thy name, and all thy life's high calling duly announcing.

When Zechariah doubted what was told him, dumbness assailed him, sealing firm the promise, till, at thy naming, lo, his voice resounded loud in God's praises.

Greater art thou than all the sons of Adam, lowly in Spirit, faithfully proclaiming Israel's Messiah, Jesus our Redeemer, thus we exalt thee.

For an opening hymn, sing or say:

- 2 Kings 4.8-16: This is a holy man of God, let him rest here.
- Romans 6.3-11: Having died with Christ, we shall rise with him. Alleluia, alleluia! Open your heart, O Lord to accept the word of your Son. Alleluia!
- Matt. 10.37-42: "He who loses his life for my sake will find it."

As a hymn in thanksgiving after your act of spiritual communion:

- 1. Fight the good fight with all thy might, Christ is thy strength, and Christ thy right; Lay hold on life, and it shall be Thy joy and crown eternally.
- 2.Run the straight race through God's good grace, Lift up thine eyes, and seek his face; Life with its way before us lies, Christ is the path, and Christ the prize.
- 3. Cast care aside, upon thy Guide, Lean, and his mercy will provide; Lean, and thy trusting soul shall prove Christ is its life, and Christ its love.
- 4. Faint not nor fear, his arms are near, He changeth not, and thou art dear; Only believe, and thou shalt see That Christ is all in all to thee.

For an opening hymn, sing or say:

For thy true servant Peter bearing high the keys, And Paul whose fervent word proclaimed thy mysteries, By cross victorious and by sword-stroke triumphing, Now share the glorious court of life's eternal King.

O kindly pastor, unto whose apostolate The royal Master gave in charge the heavenly gate, In sin's defiling bondage be our joy to gauge The reconciling virtue of thine embassage.

Alleluia, alleluia! You are Peter, and on this rock I will build my Church. Alleluia!

• *Matt* 16.13-19: *I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven.*

As a hymn in thanksgiving after your act of spiritual communion:
