The Chapel Halls and Chapel Gym, Wheathampstead

What do you do if you have a Victorian church building and a 1960s church hall, but too small a congregation to manage their upkeep? After 12 years of disuse, and in disrepair, Wheathampstead United Church found the answer: set up a charity, bring in villagers and local firms to help convert the church building into a community gym, refurbish the hall for community use, and create a new, smaller worship room for themselves in the back.



The Chapel Halls in Brewhouse Hill, Wheathampstead – opposite the hugely popular Brewhouse Coffee – is now run by the charity Wheathampstead Chapel Community Hub, partly set up by two dynamic church elders, Jane and Jackie.

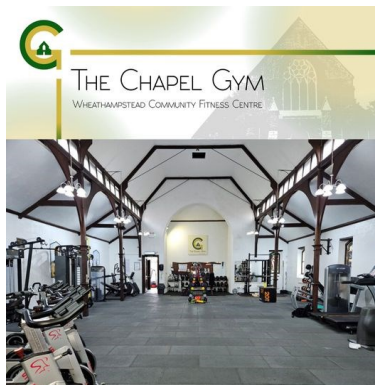
Rooms are available to hire for individuals and businesses, long or short term. One bright, spacious room can hold up to 100 people: Tai Chi, Pilates and yoga classes, fundraising and training events take place here. A smaller room holds 15 and is currently used for activities such as meetings, business breakfasts and a sports therapist. The smallest Welcome room can seat six.

Once a month, volunteers cook and serve a communal meal in the Halls to those hard up or lonely, on a pay-what-you-can basis, under the aegis of The Community Kitchen, another arm of the charity. The food is largely donated by local producers and retailers. And in school holidays, the hall has been home to a fresh food and hygiene bank.

The Hub's third arm is The Chapel Gym, a not-for-profit fitness centre in the old church. It welcomes allcomers, from beginners to gym devotees, members to day drop-ins, to exercise under the stained-glass windows. A team of volunteers assists the qualified PT staff to welcome and support users and run classes. The Gym was recently a finalist in the Mayor's Pride Awards for its inclusivity.

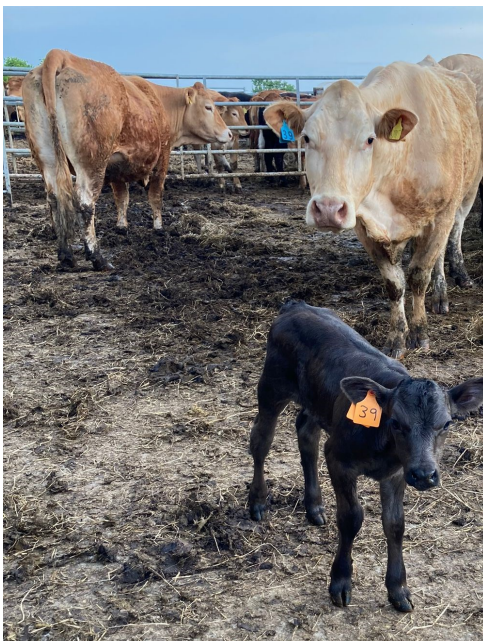
The Fifth Vicarage

Last month's reprinted article on Sandridge vicarages did not mention a fifth vicarage in Sandridge, that once stood in Church End, opposite the Queen's Head. A drawing of Sandridge Church from around 1790, reproduced in *A Newer Thraliana*, shows a substantial building on the site of the public car park, which would fit its description as being 'on an old confined site close to two roads and near the public house.' That was the opinion of the Revd John Griffith on seeing Sandridge for the first time in August 1872.

The vicarage appeared to have had nothing done to it for over fifty years and Mr Winbolt, the hard-working curate, was as a result suffering from rheumatism, 'which small alterations might have averted.' Besides, without an extension of the area around, it could not 'secure that privacy which is desirable after a really hard day's work.' By December 1872, he had persuaded Earl Spencer that it was not worth spending money on such a place, with fumes from the cesspit rising up the stairs, and had discussed his plans with the Earl's agent. The building of the new vicarage, now Lyndon, would be started soon afterwards.

W I Report

Our May meeting was our AGM at which we discussed and voted on the Resolution to be taken to the national meeting later in the year. Attention was first drawn to the D-Day commemorations ceremony on 6 June at 8.30pm at the memorial near the Chiltern Road entrance to the Jersey Farm Woodland Park: 80 poppies have been knitted ready as a tribute. Mention was also made of the play at the Abbey Theatre which we were encouraged to attend, which focuses on the meteorological forecasts at the time.

We then moved on to the Resolution which focuses on dental health matters. We heard the disturbing news that 40% of people have not visited a dentist for two years, and that currently 91% of dental practices cannot take on new adult patients and 79% cannot take children. The government has a plan to create 2.5 million extra appointments, with more training places for dentists and plans to increase retention by introducing a new contract.

The Hertfordshire Federation of WIs offers regular events, conveniently in Wheathampstead, which members who have attended greatly appreciated, including *An Evening at the Musicals*, afternoon tea at the Mid -Herts Golf Club, and a Valuation Evening. The meeting on 8 October will be an open meeting to which visitors are especially welcome, when Mike Barbakoff will talk about the history of Bletchley Park during WWII.

At our meeting on 11 June, our speaker will be Jane Dismore, to talk about *Royals, Rebels and Aristocrats*: as ever, visitors are welcome to attend. HELD ON 8 MAY 2024, THE FOLLOWING ITEMS WERE
DISCUSSED:**

TO ELECT A CHAIR AND RECEIVE A DECLARATION OF ACCEPTANCE OF OFFICE FOR THE ENSUING YEAR

Cllr Roberts nominated Cllr Leonard for Chair. The nomination was seconded by Cllr Lambert before it was unanimously resolved to elect Cllr Leonard as Chair of the Parish Council for the coming year.

TO ELECT A VICE CHAIR AND RECEIVE A DECLARATION OF ACCEPTANCE OF OFFICE FOR THE ENSUING YEAR

Cllr Hale nominated Cllr Roberts for Vice Chair. The nomination was seconded by Cllr Lambert before it was unanimously resolved to elect Cllr Roberts as Vice Chair of the Parish Council for the coming year.

TO RECEIVE AND FORMALLY ACCEPT APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

Apologies were received and accepted from Councillors Ahmed, Wells, Chalkley and Reid.

DISCLOSURES OF INTEREST

Cllr Roberts declared herself a member of the St Leonard's Parochial Church Council (see Grants).

TO NOTE THE DRAFT MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL PARISH MEETING HELD ON 10 APRIL 2024

The minutes were duly noted.

TO APPROVE AS A CORRECT RECORD THE DRAFT MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE COUNCIL HELD ON 10 APRIL 2024

The minutes of the meeting of the Council held on 10 April 2024 were reviewed. They were agreed to be a correct record and it was unanimously resolved that the minutes of the meeting be approved and signed by the Chair.

There was none.

Public Participation

There was none.

CLERK'S REPORTS

Monthly Accounts

Members reviewed a schedule of creditor payments for the period 11 April to 8 May 2024. It was unanimously resolved to approve the schedule of creditors for this month.

St Albans District Council Asset Mapping

The Clerk demonstrated the District Council's Asset Mapping page, explaining the system allows the identification of responsibility for grounds maintenance in the district and offers an option to report issues directly.

Schedule of Action Points

The Clerk proposed producing a schedule of tasks requiring action as an appendix to future minutes. It was argued this would create a quick reference point for Members and Officers without having to read through the full minutes to identify tasks. It was resolved to trial this for three months and then assess the benefit.

Minor Highways Works

The Parish Council's ability to carry out minor maintenance works such as street sign cleaning and weed control was discussed. It was agreed to form a working party to assess what could be done before reporting back to Full Council. Councillor Oakley to consider what works could be carried out before contacting other Members in this regard.

To appoint representatives of the Council to Other Bodies and Committees

Councillors put themselves forward for membership on various committees and outside bodies. It was then unanimously resolved;

1. To approve the allocation of members to committees as agreed at this meeting and;
2. To delegate to each committee the power to elect a Chair and Vice Chair (if applicable) at its next meeting.

Community Centres Biannual Report

Members reviewed a report produced by the Community Centres Manager with updates on various aspects of centre management and hire. The Centres Manager was thanked for producing a full and informative report. It was unanimously resolved;

- To approve the increase in hire charges as detailed in the report
- To approve the updated Hire Agreement (incorporating new safeguarding references)

Financial Regulations

It is a requirement of Standing Orders (18, B) that an annual review is carried out. After a brief introduction it was unanimously resolved to re-adopt the regulations as circulated for the coming year. It was noted that new NALC regulations have been released this month.

Review and re-adoption of the Code of Conduct

A copy of the Parish Council's Code of Conduct, adopted on 9 June 2021, was sent electronically to Members on 23 April 2024. It was unanimously resolved to re-adopt the Code of Conduct for the coming year.

Matters of Note

- Four rotten timber windows in the Marshalswick Community Centre toilets have been replaced with UPVC. The cost of this work came in under budget.
- The Parish Council's insurance policy, incorporating both the employee and public liability cover will renew on 1 June 2024. The policy is subject to a Long Term Agreement with Zurich Municipal.
- Four bike racks have been installed at Jersey Farm Woodland Park by Cllr Wells and Parish Office staff. It's hoped these will encourage visitors to the park (Summer Event, Parkrun, etc) to cycle and not drive.
- The 2023-24 year-end process is now well underway. The Annual Return, Internal Audit and associated documents will be brought to both the Finance Committee and Full Council in June.
- Sustfest 2024 – The Parish Council will have a table at this year's Sustfest in the Alban Arena to publicise some of what we're doing to improve sustainability. The Parish office will lead on this but volunteers are sought to attend the event on 8-9 June.
- The large tree in front of Marshalswick Community Centre has had its crown reduced. The new Christmas lights can now be installed as previously agreed.
- The faulty defibrillator case at the Village Hall has been replaced. This was installed without charge by a local electrician, Powering GB.

COUNCILLOR AND COMMITTEE REPORTS

Grant Applications

- Sandridge School Library Bus – New initiative
An award of £500 was made under spending power S.137 LGA 1972

- Sandridge Cricket Club – Grounds Maintenance
An award of £1,320 was made under spending power S.9 & S.10 Open Spaces Act 1906
- St Leonard's Church – Cemetery Maintenance
An award of £2,500 was made under spending power S.214 LGA 1972

Parish Council owned Car Parks

Member considered a request from Cllr Leonard for Members to form a working party to address congestion issues within some Parish Council owned car parks. It was agreed that Cllrs Leonard, White and Chachulski would meet before reporting back to Full Council.

Highways Flooding

Councillors discussed and noted a report by Cllr Hale on local flooding issues.

D-Day 80 Commemoration – 6 June 2024 at 8.30pm

Cllr Twidell provided a final verbal update to Members on next month's event to be held at the Jersey Farm Woodland Park.

Parish Summer Event

Cllr Roberts provided a final update on plans for the Parish Summer Event to be held on 1 June 2024 at the Jersey Farm Woodland Park. Members were asked to come forward to offer assistance on the day.

Closure of the B651

Cllr Hale proposed that Sandridge Parish Council writes to the Chief Executive of Hertfordshire County Council expressing its objection to the planned closure of the B651, St Albans Road, for up to 6 weeks in July and August. The letter to request that the utility companies are asked to identify alternative ways of working to allow the continued use of the road. Also that The Council considers that this closure is being approved for the convenience of the utility companies and developer without consideration given to the residents of Sandridge village.

It was proposed by Cllr Hale, seconded by Cllr Leonard and unanimously resolved to ask The Clerk to write to the County Council as above.

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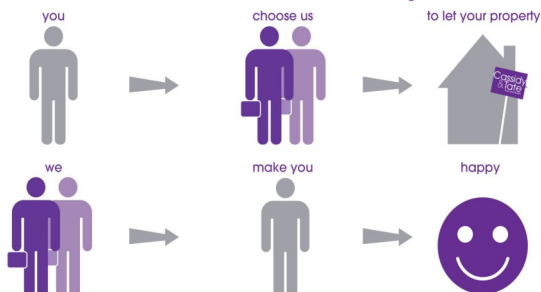


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
